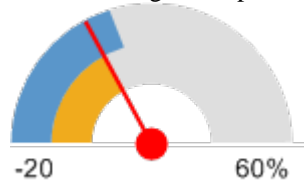

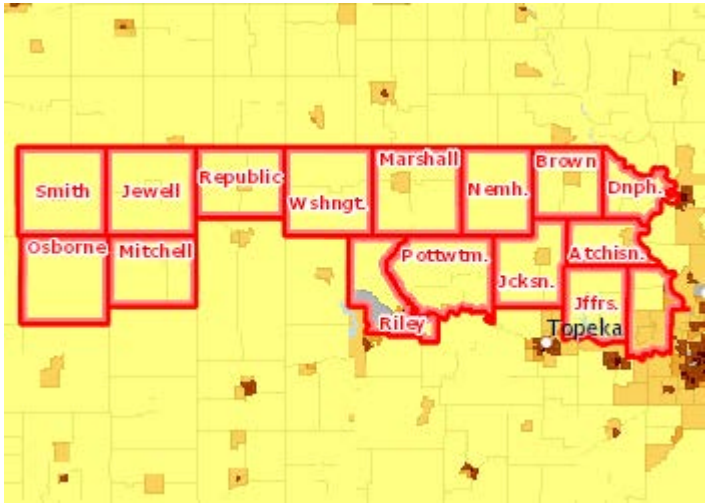
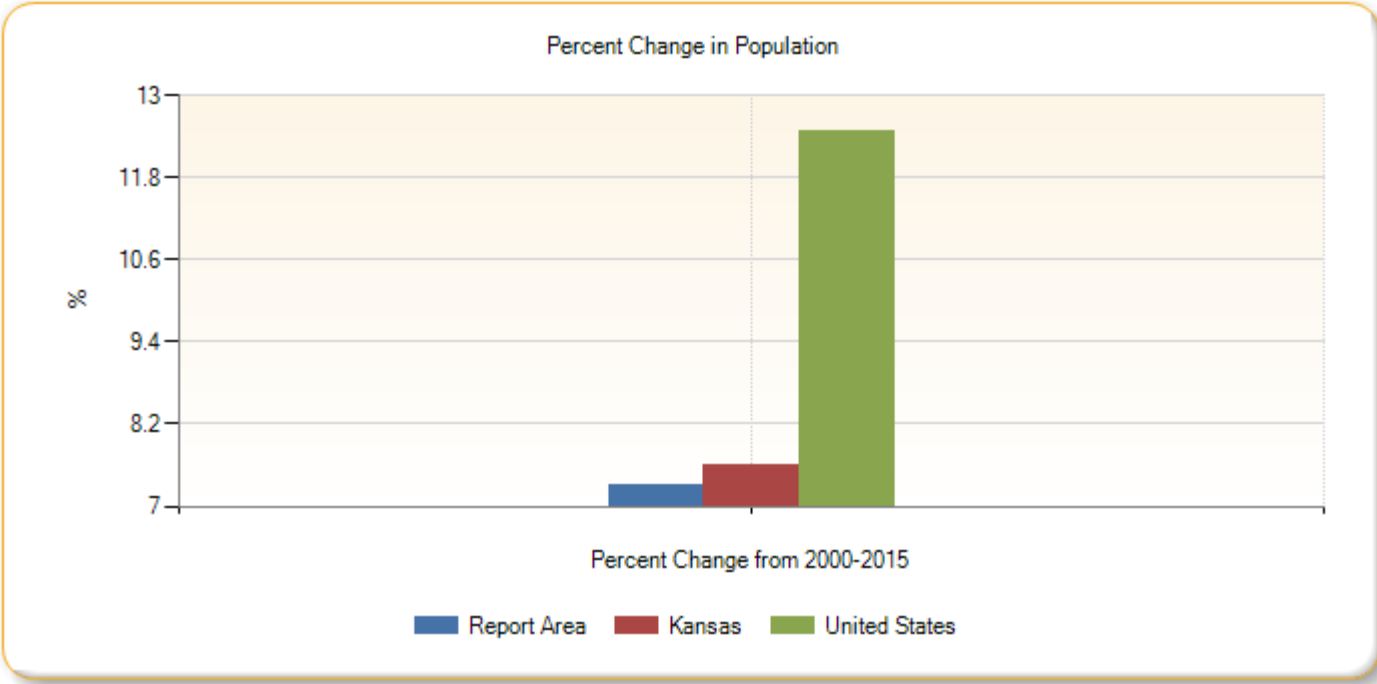
Population Change

Population, Density (Persons per Sq Mile) by Tract, ACS 2011-15

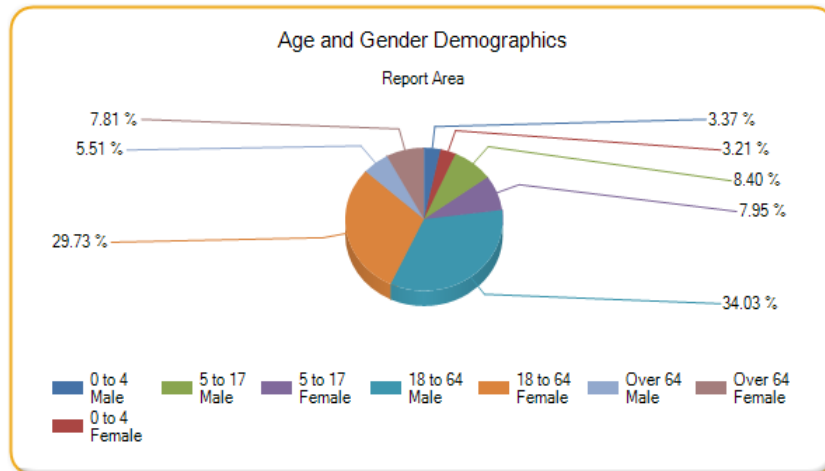

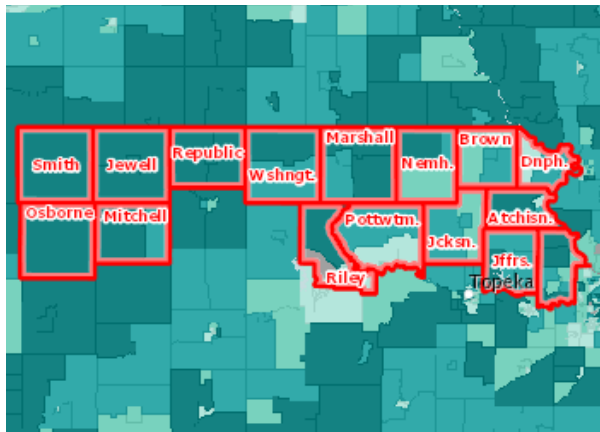
Age and Gender Demographics

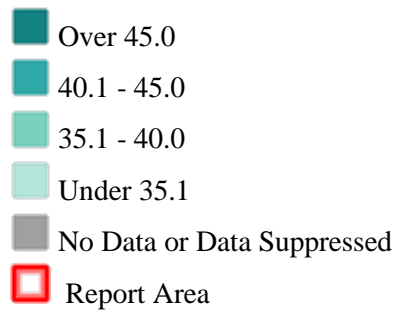

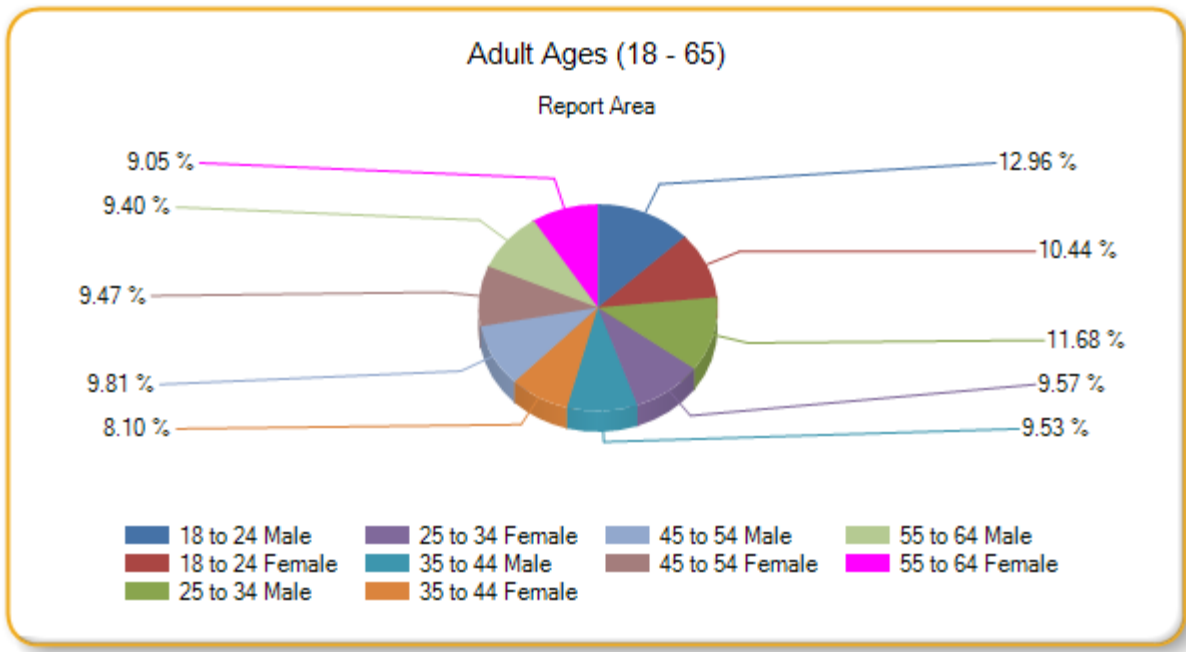


Median Age by Tract, ACS 2011-15



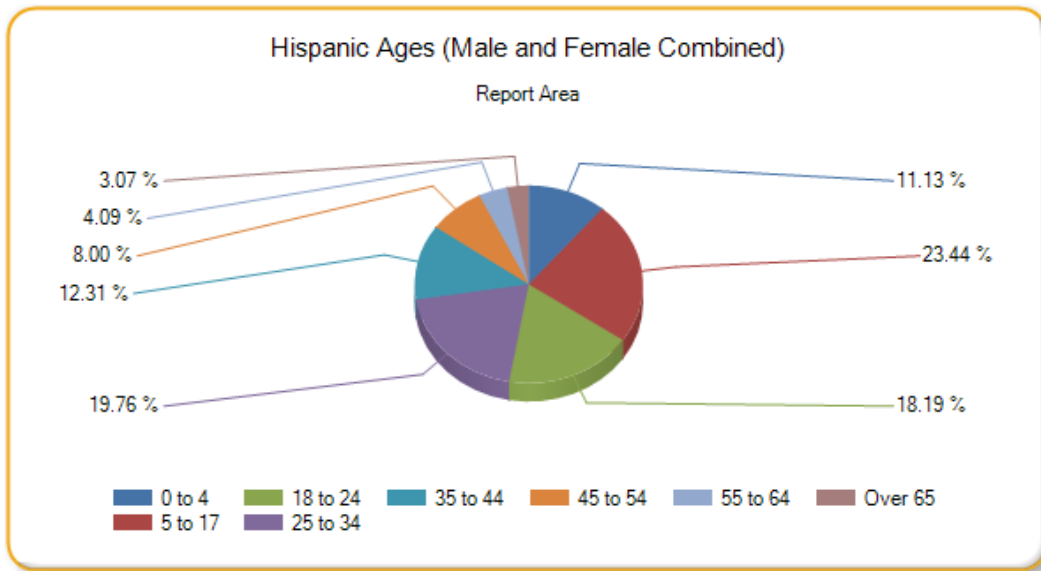

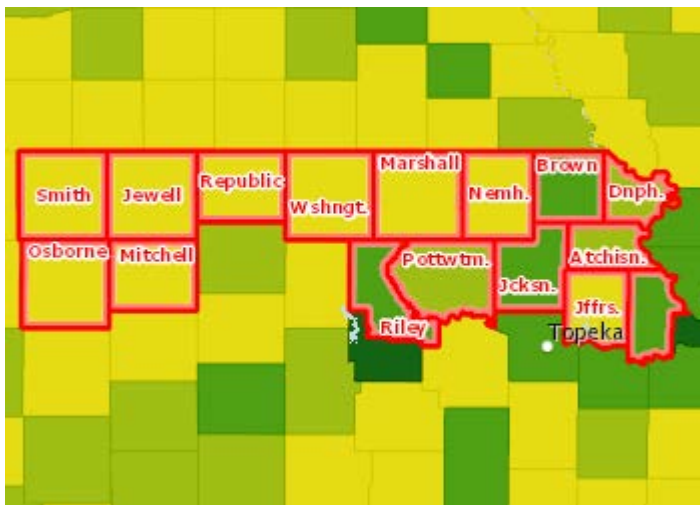
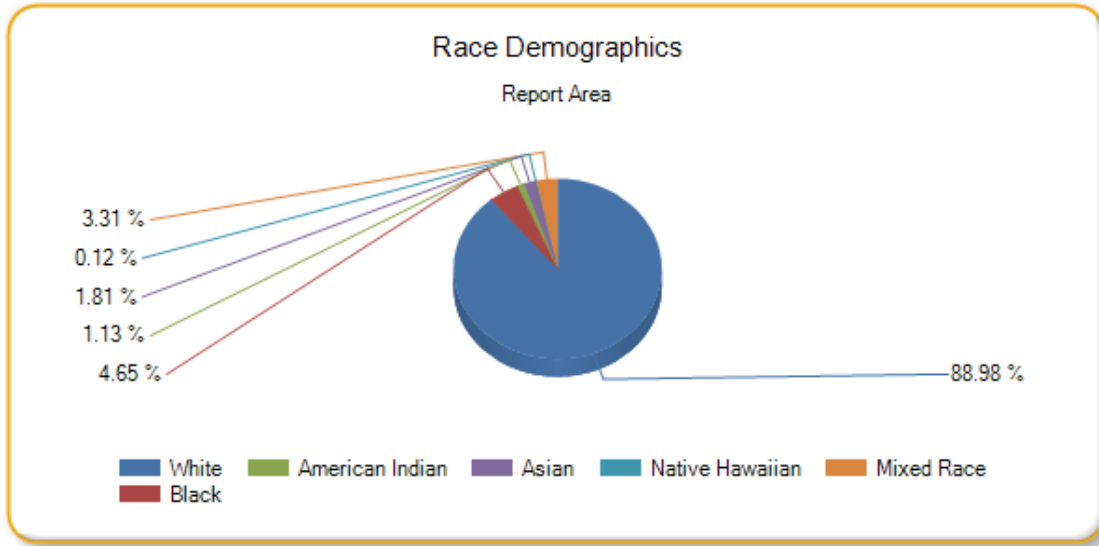
Race Demographics

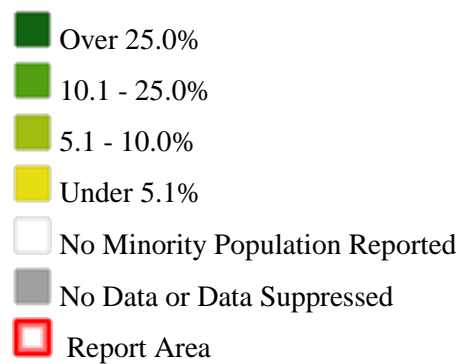

Population, Minority (Non-White), Percent by County, ACS 2011-15

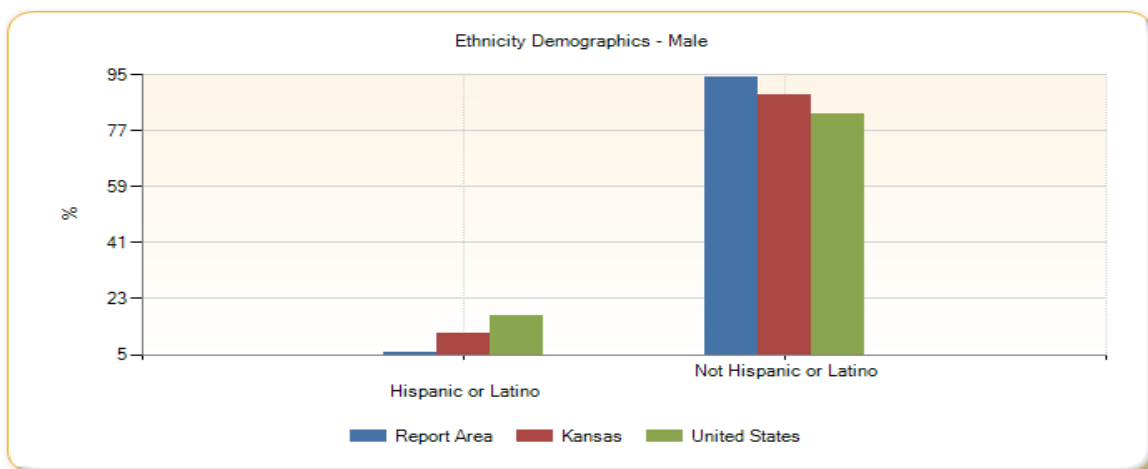

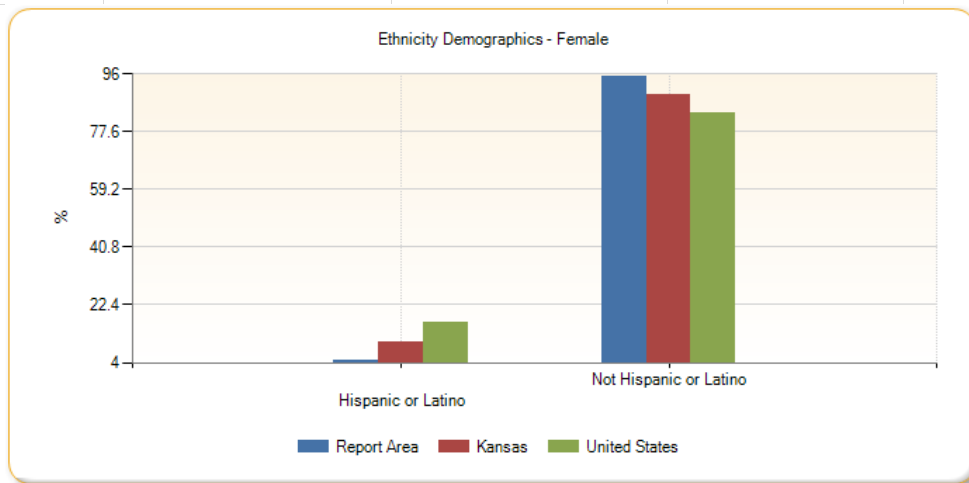

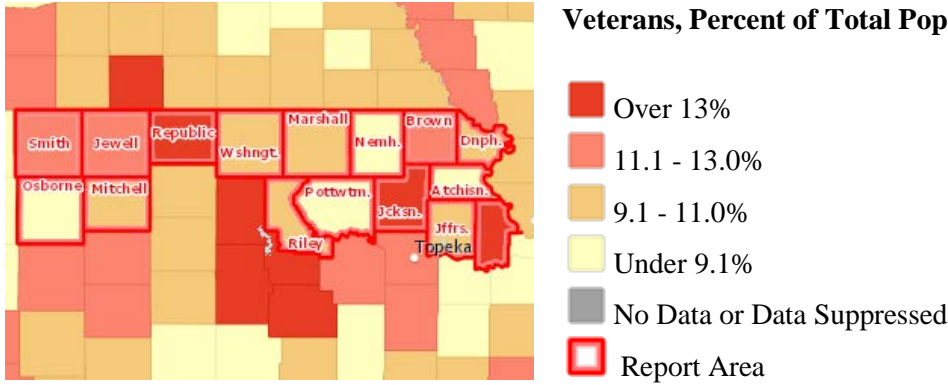
Veterans, Age and Gender Demographics

Veterans, Percent of Total Population by County, ACS 2011-15

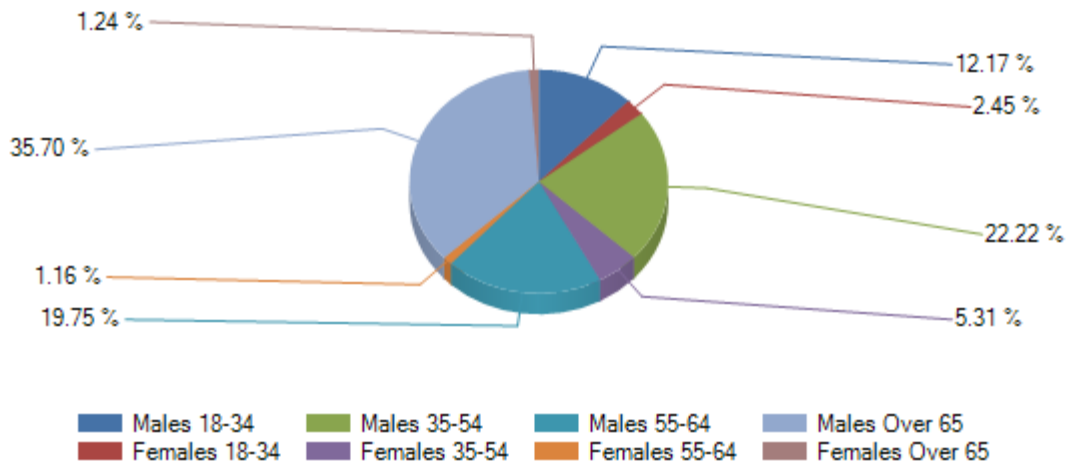

Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, SAIPE 2014

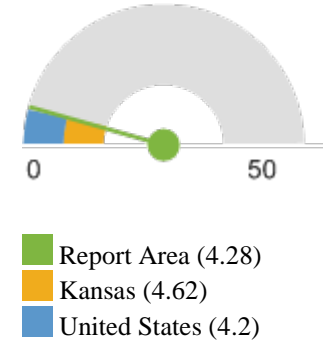

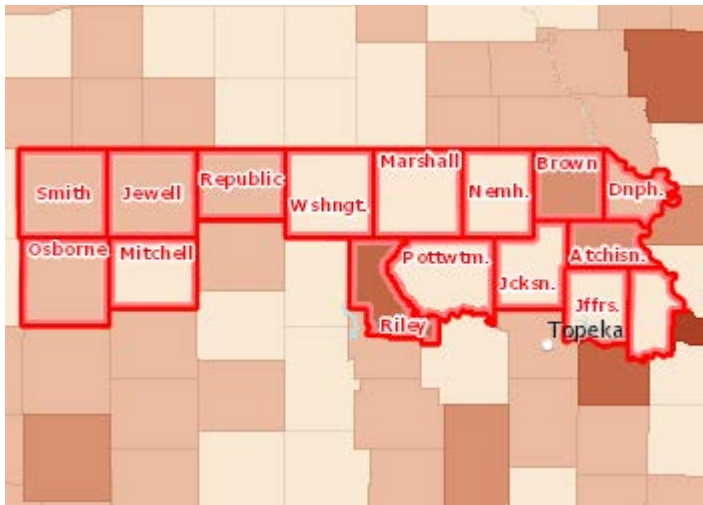
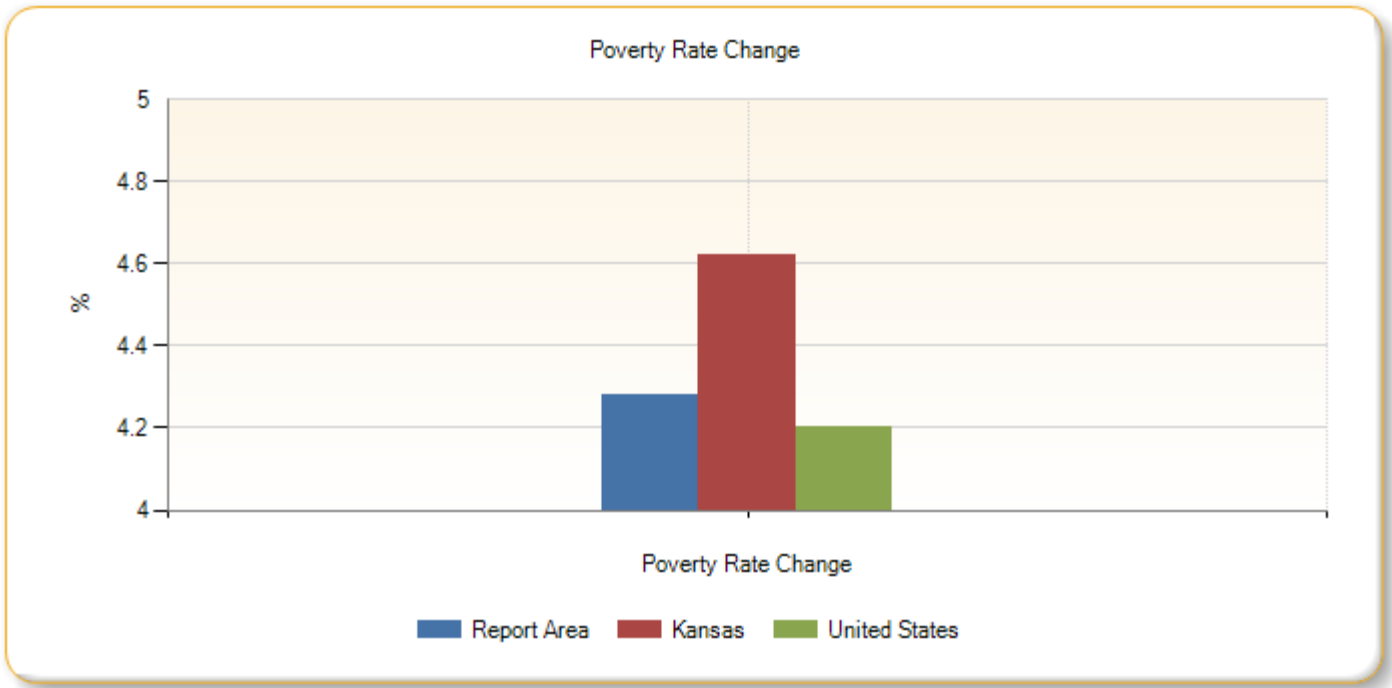

Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, SAIPE 2014

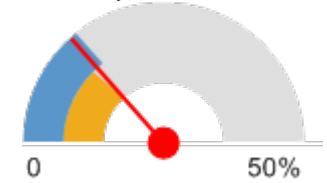

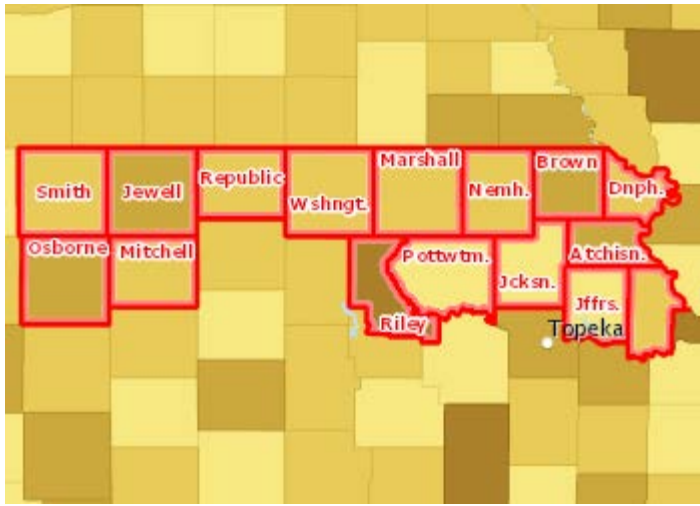
Poverty Rate (ACS)

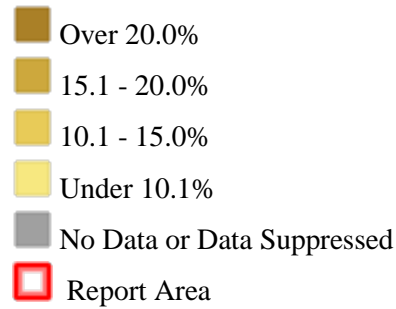

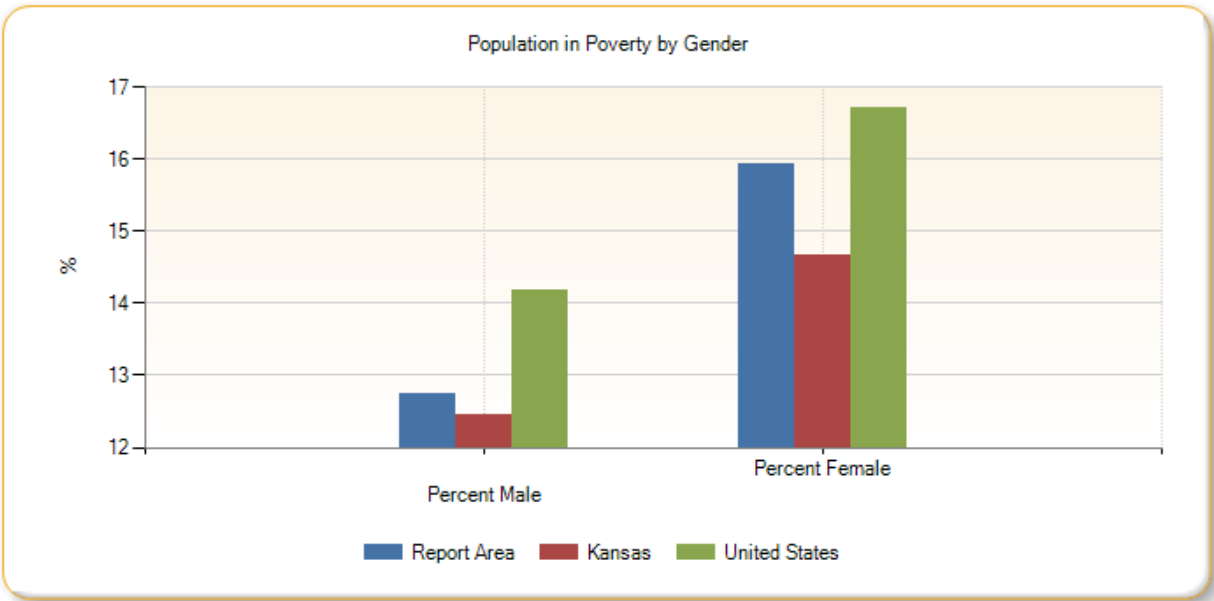


Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, ACS 2011-15



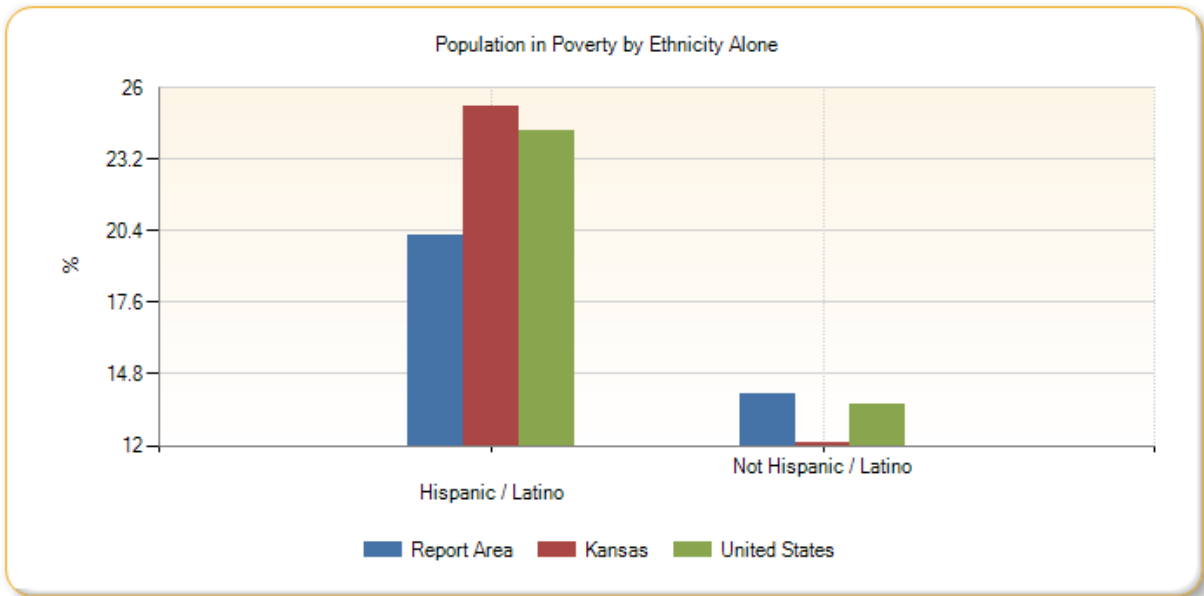

Married Family Households Living Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, ACS 2011-15

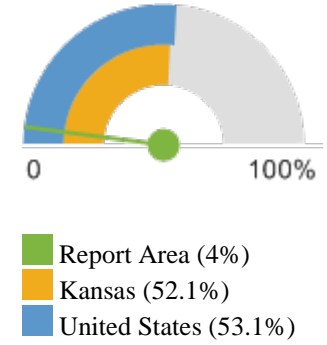

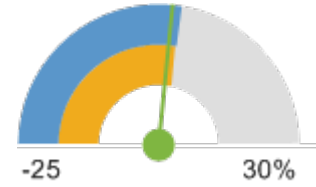

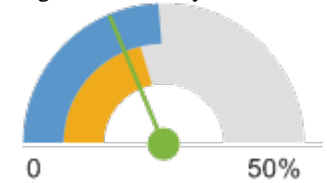


Child Poverty Rate (ACS) Ages 0-4

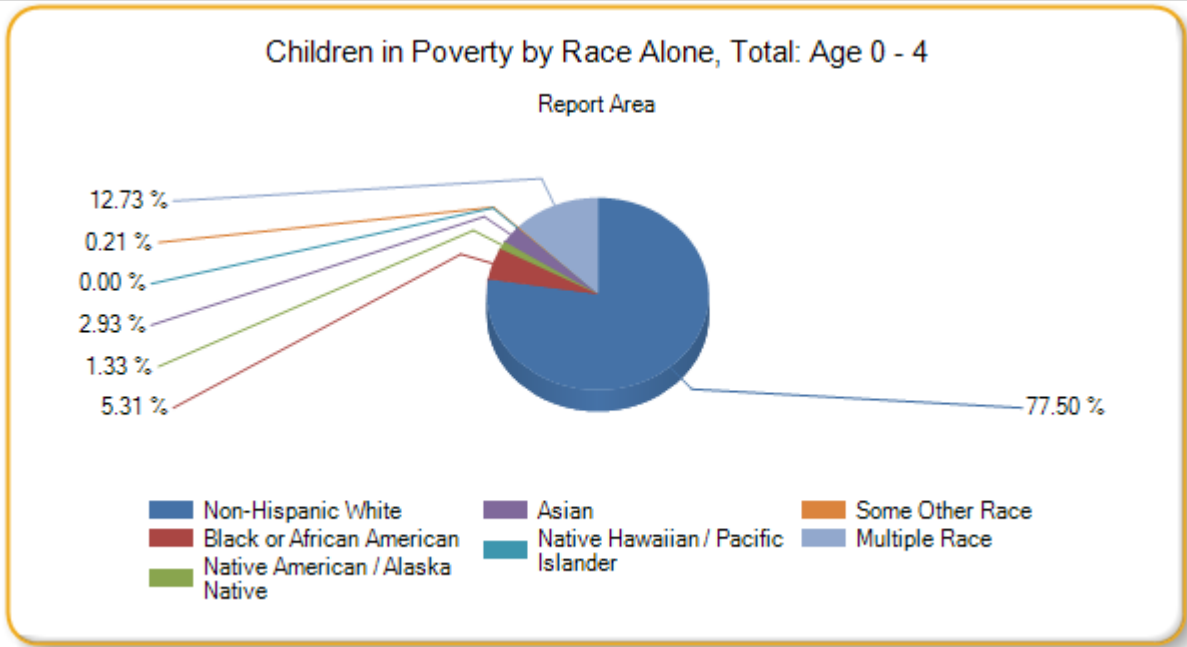

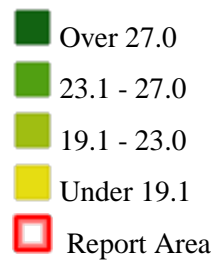

Average Work Commute Time (Minutes), Average by County, ACS 2011-15



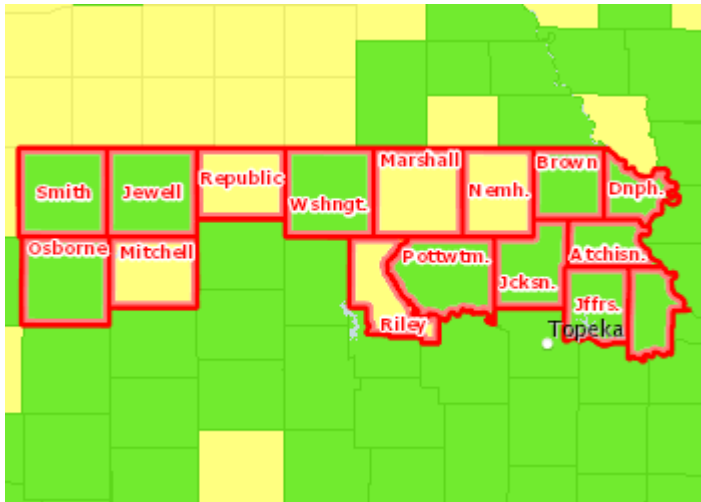
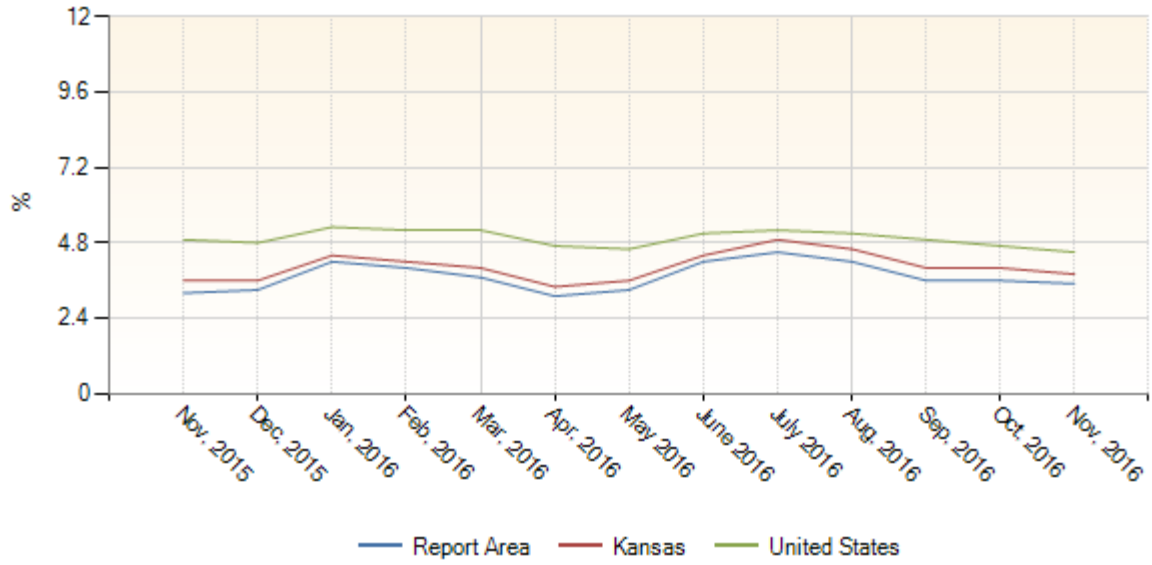

Thirteen Month Unemployment Rates



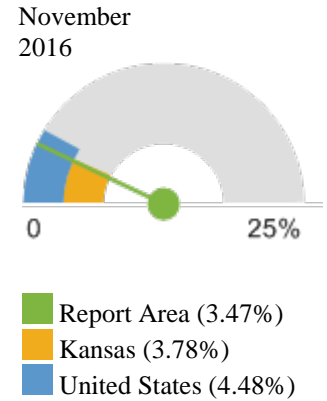

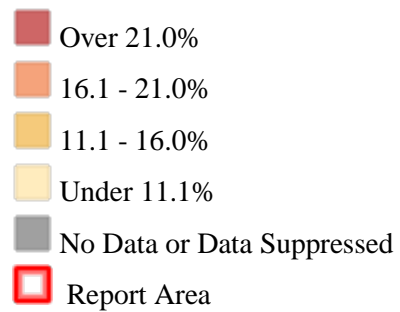
Percent Population with No High School Diploma

Population with No High School Diploma (Age 18), Percent by County, ACS 2011-15

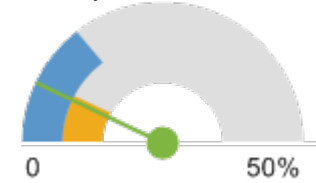

Owner-Occupied Housing Units, Percent by County, ACS 2011-15

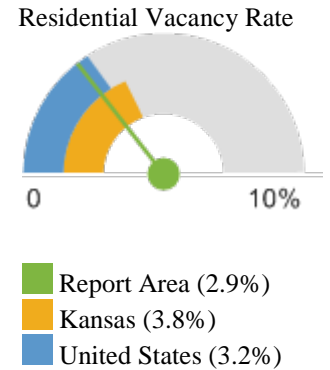

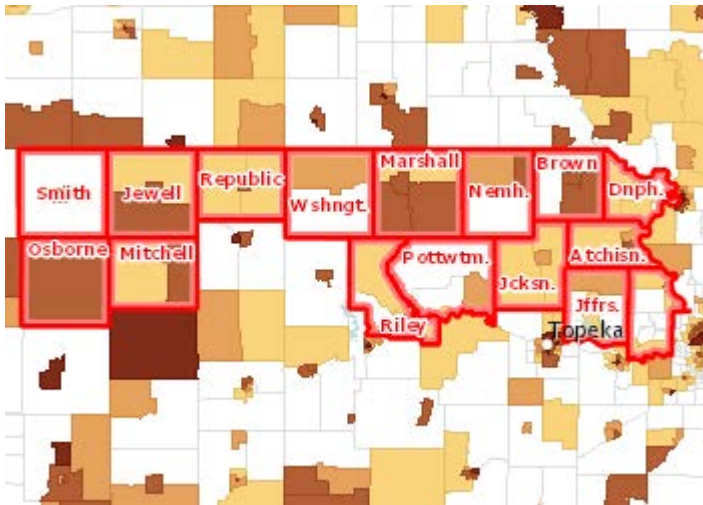
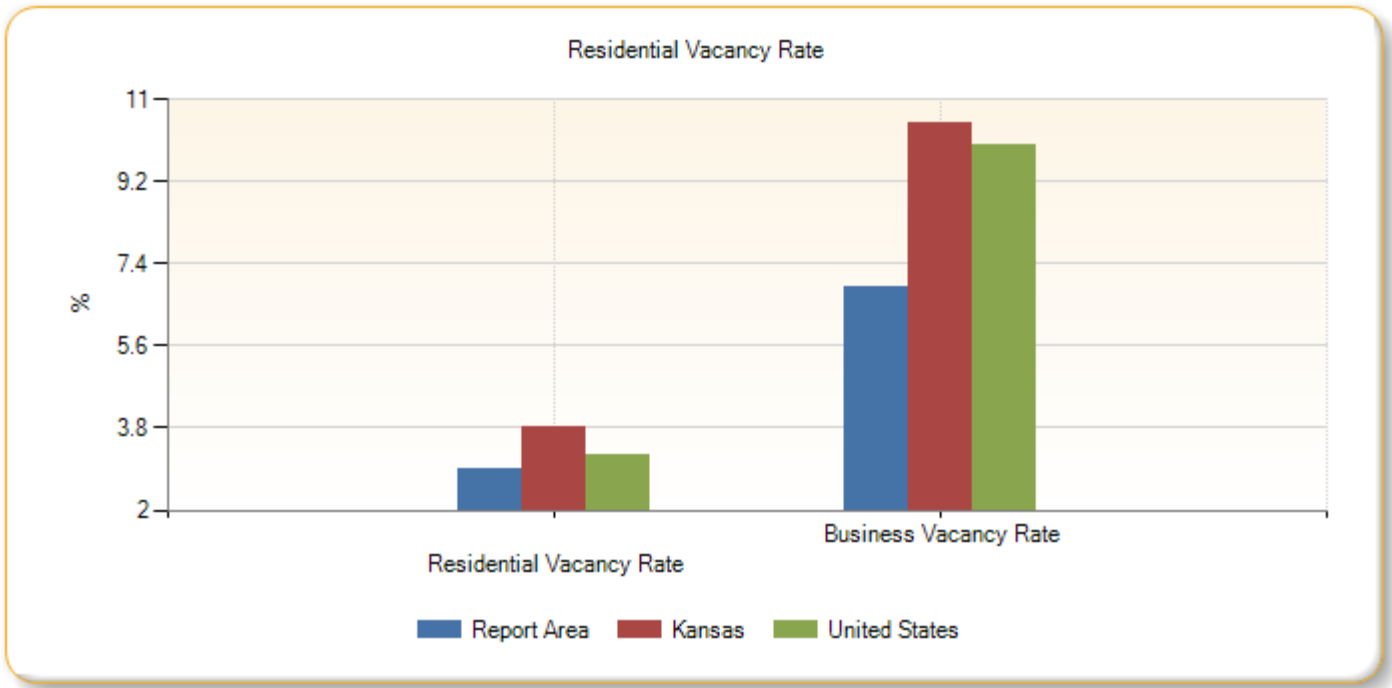

Residential Vacancies, Percent by Tract, HUD 2015-Q1

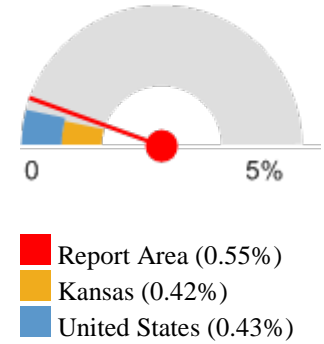

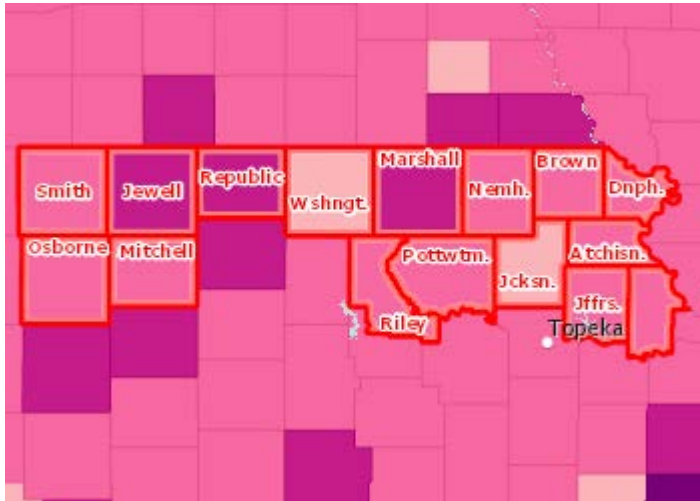
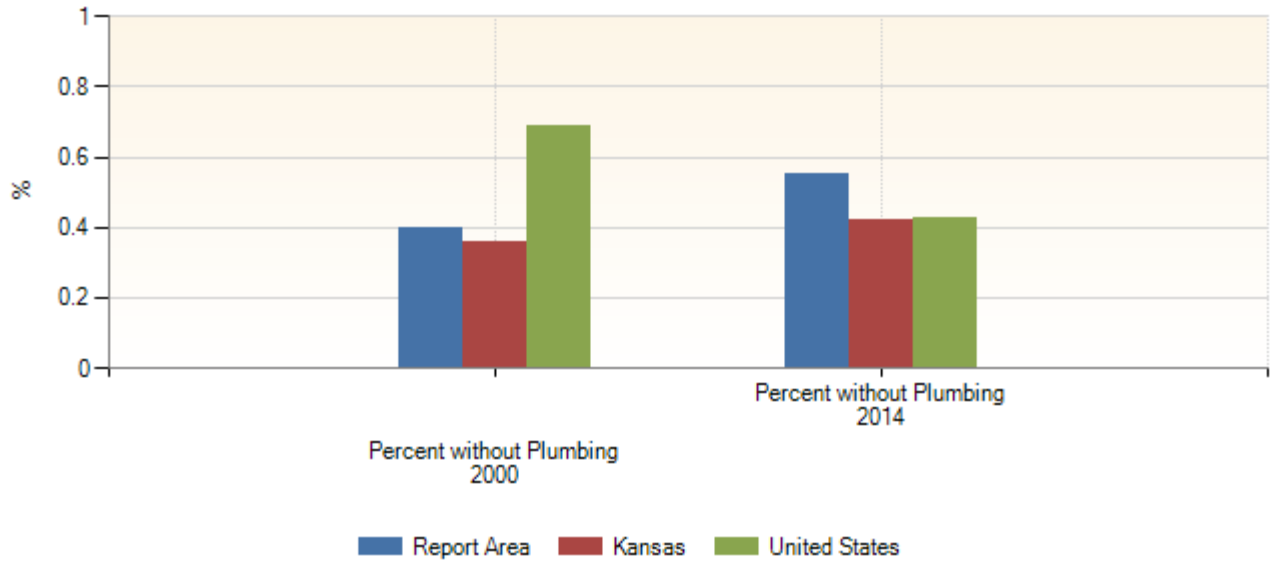

Percentage of Housing Units Without Complete Plumbing Facilities

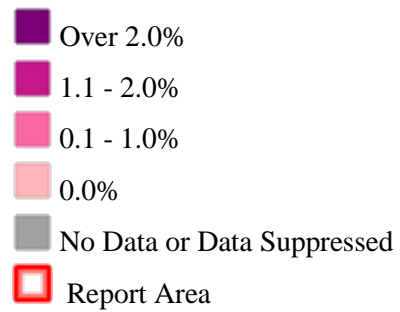

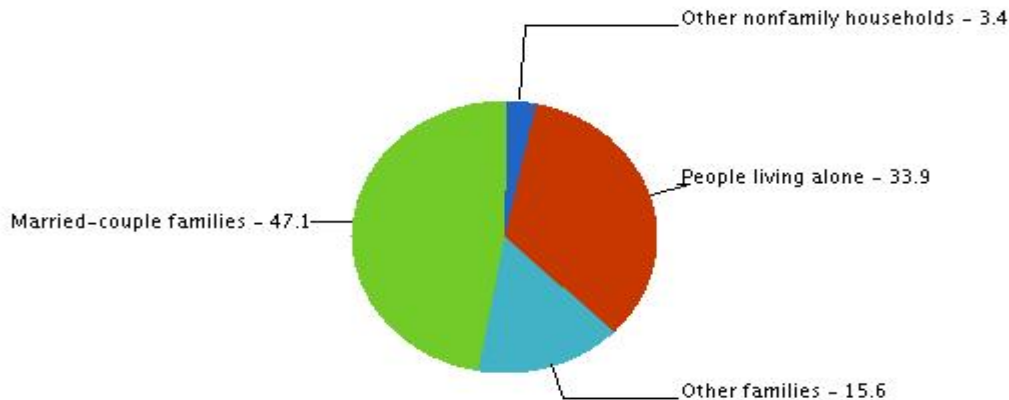

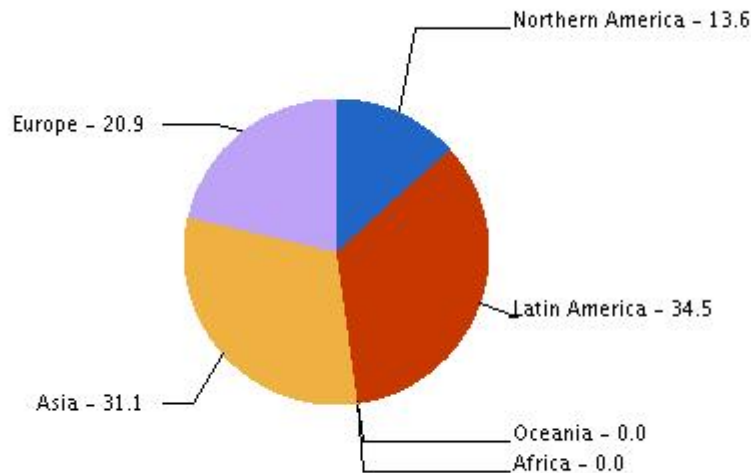

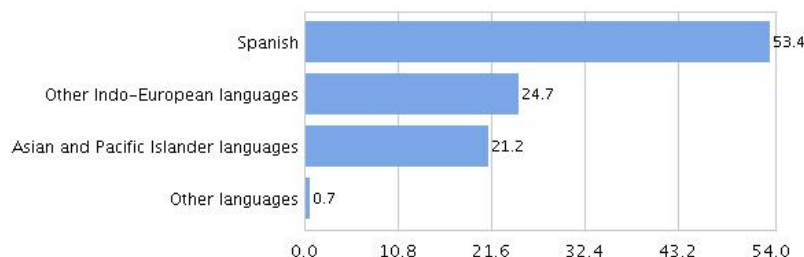
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

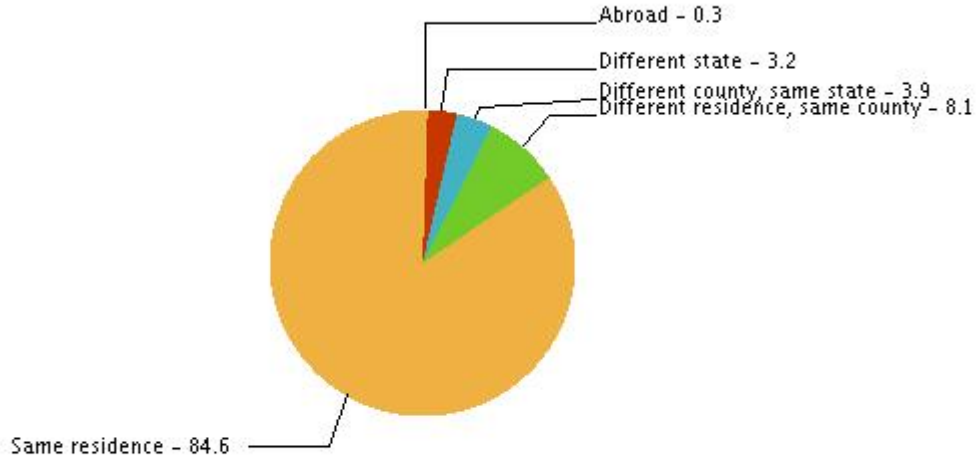
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

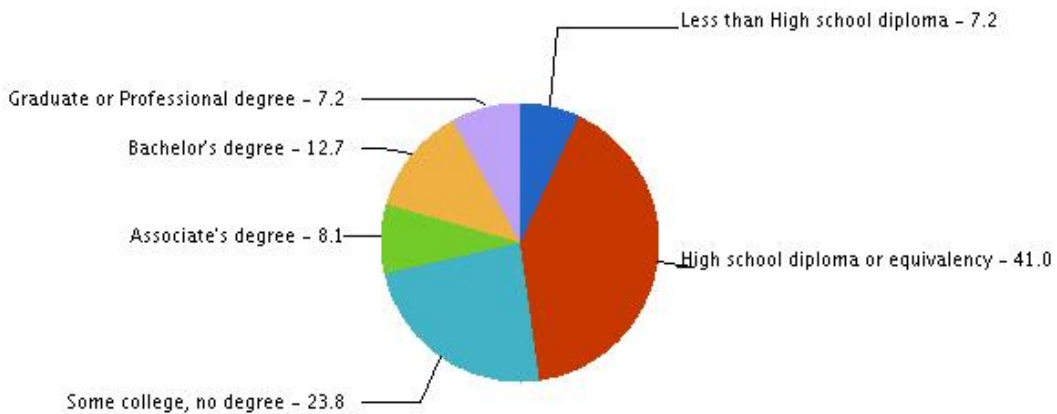

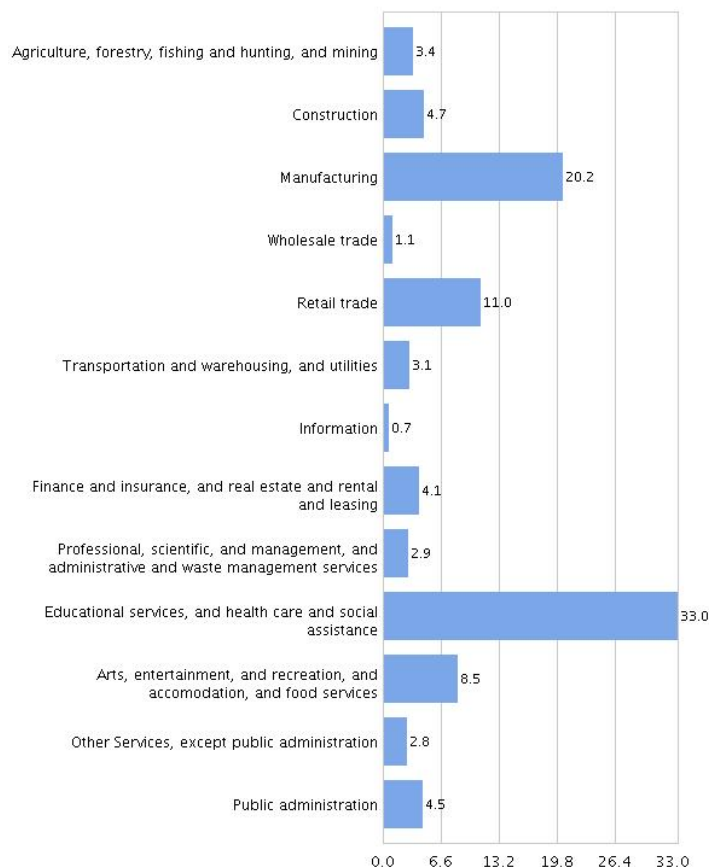

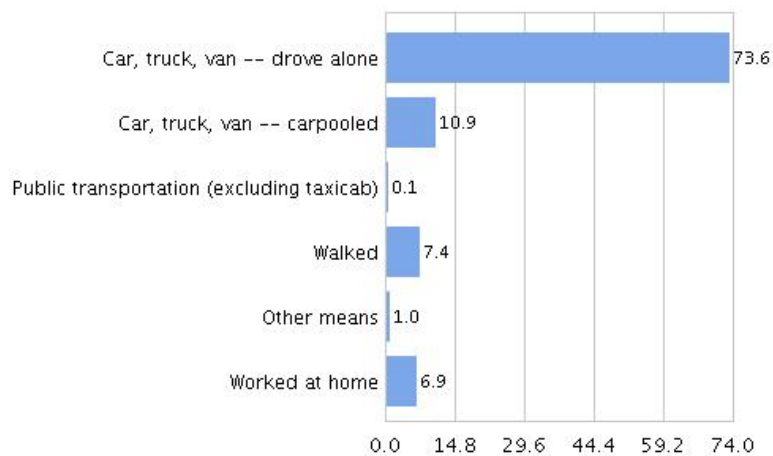

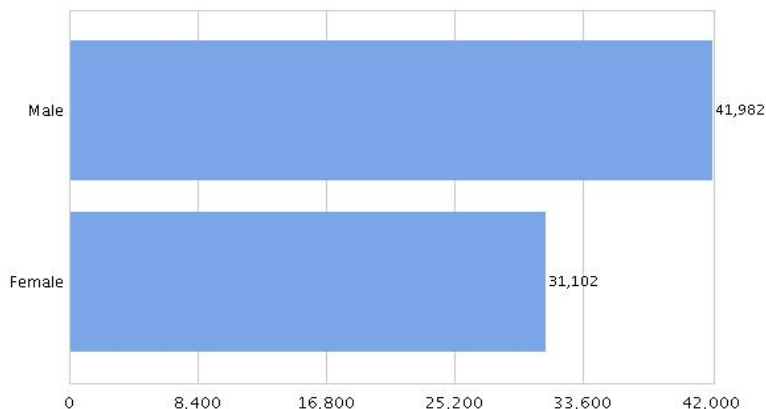
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

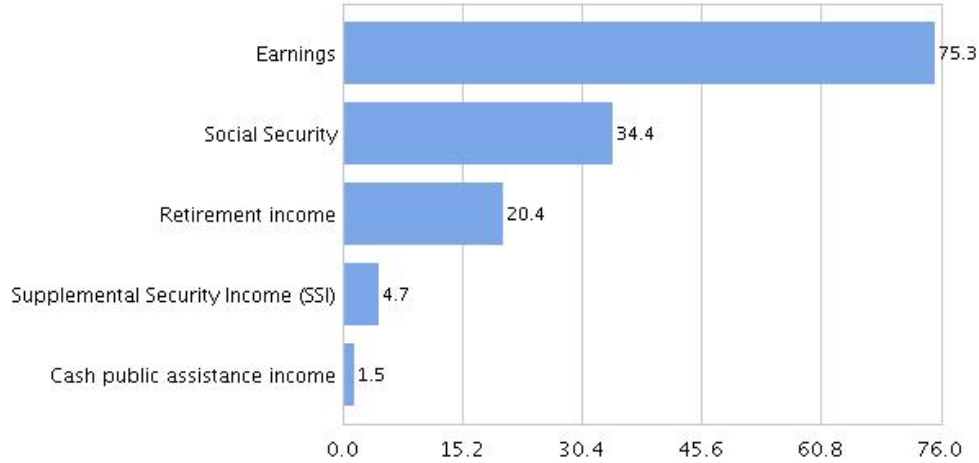

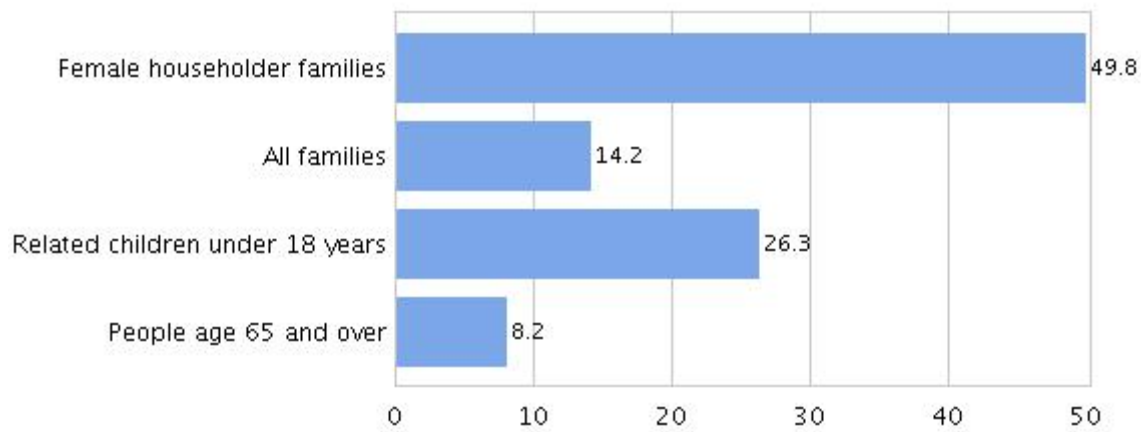
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015



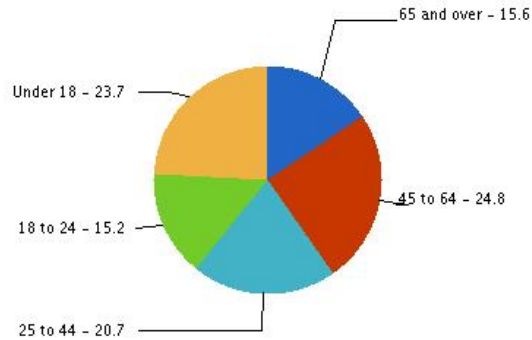

Age Distribution of People in Atchison County, Kansas in 2011-2015

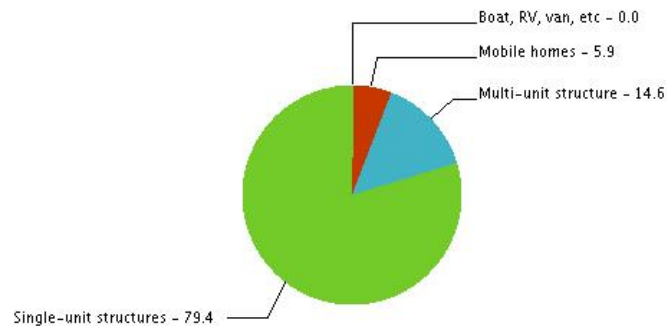

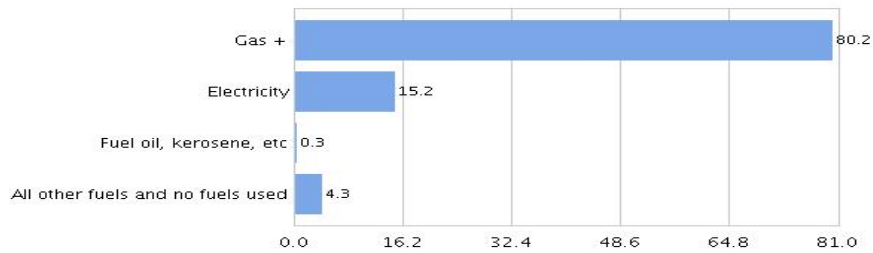

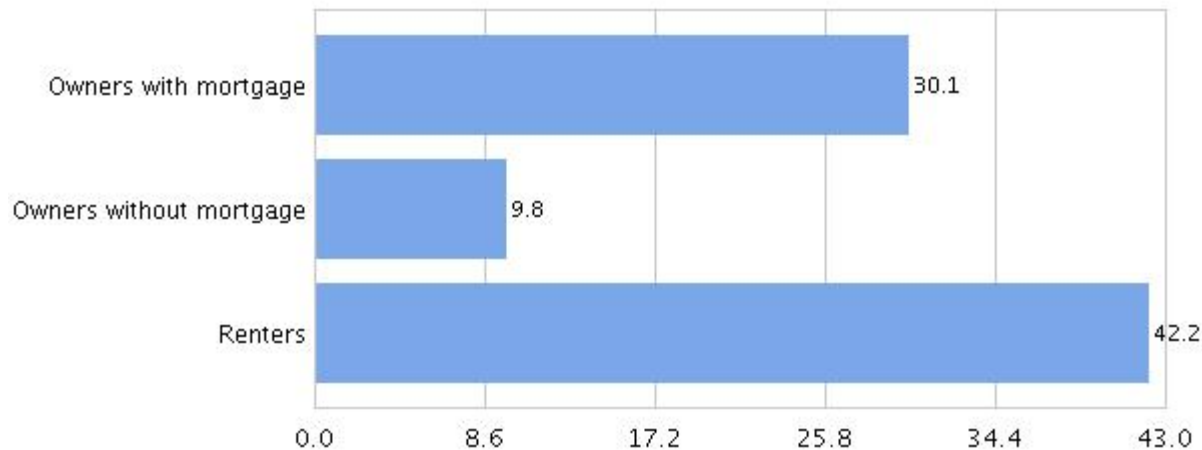

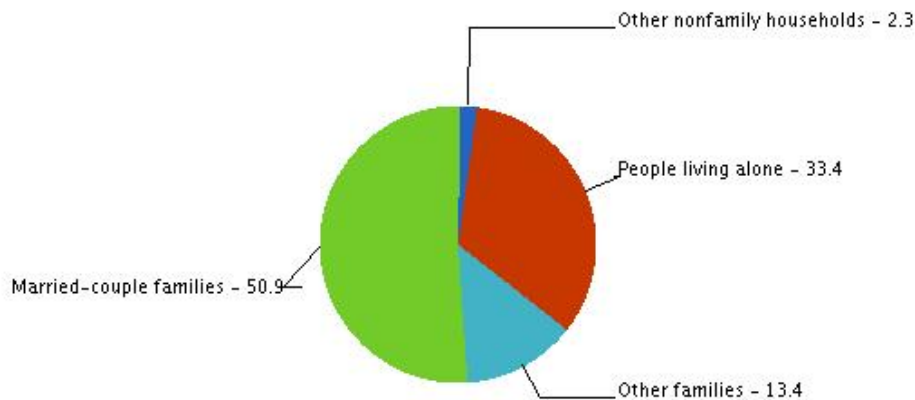

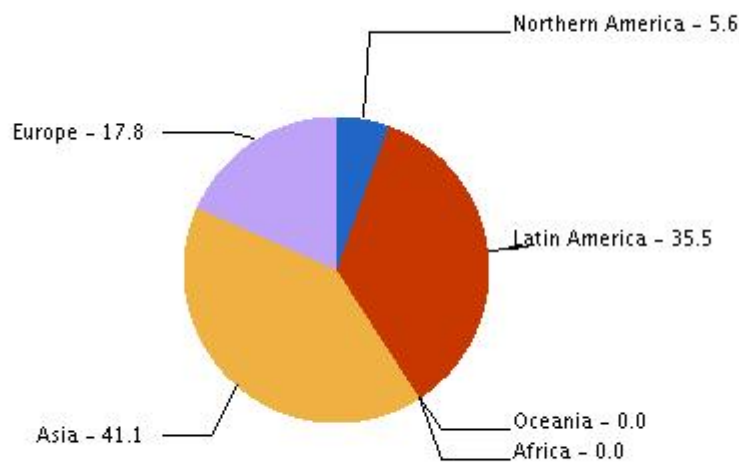

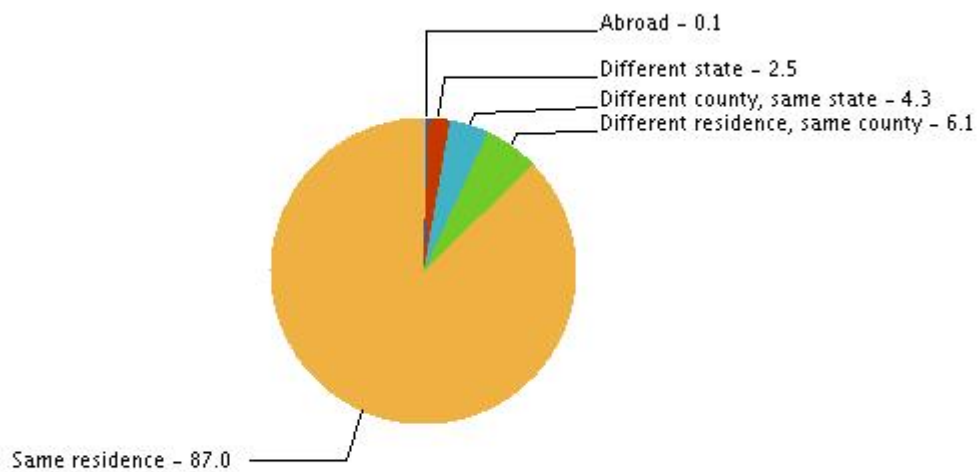
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Brown County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Brown County, Kansas in 2011-2015

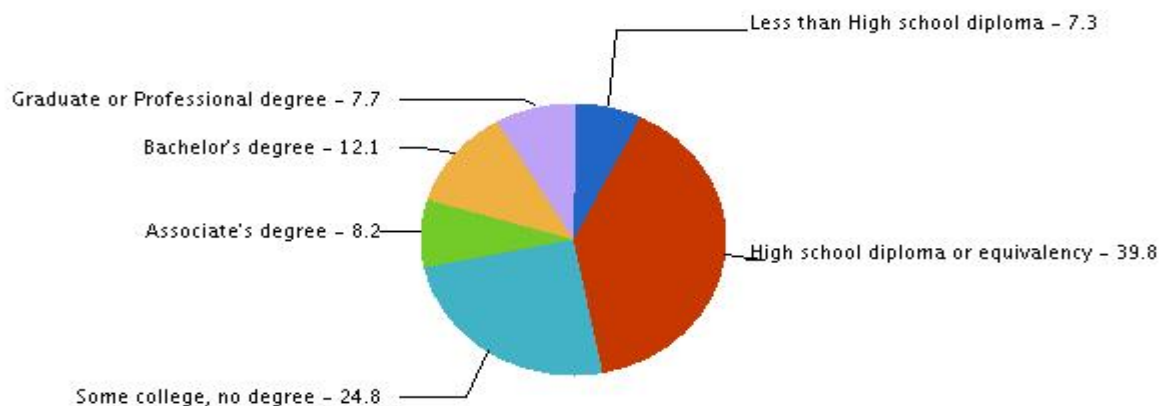

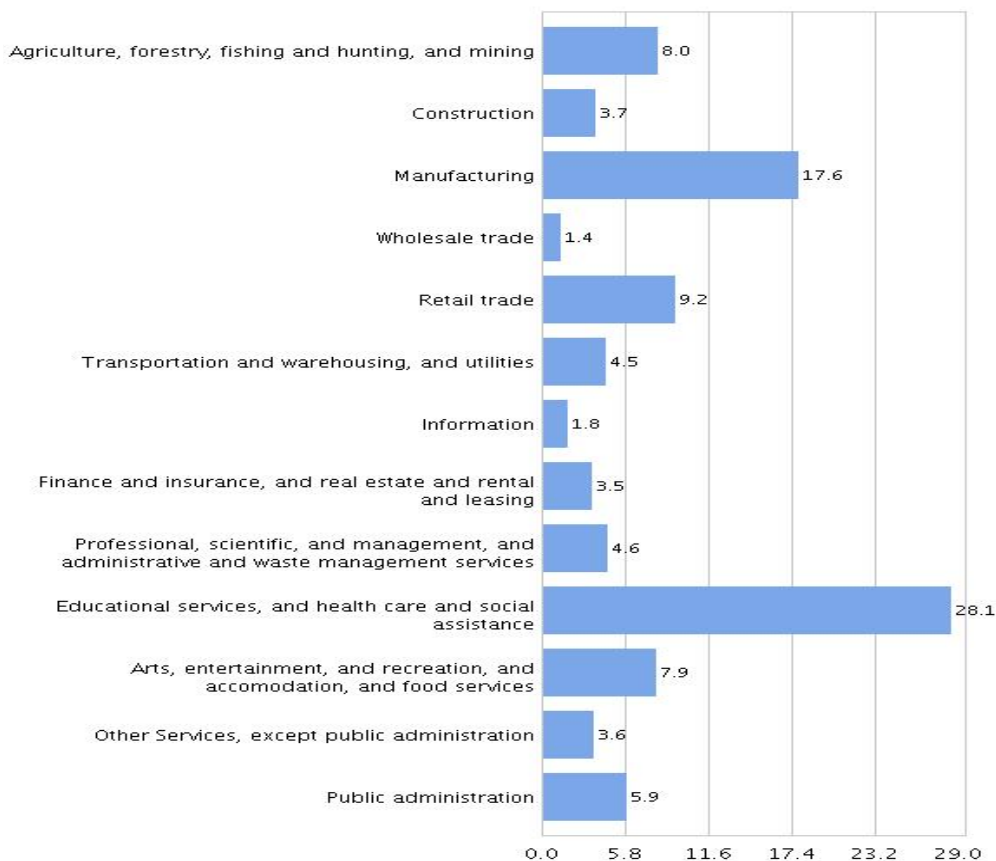

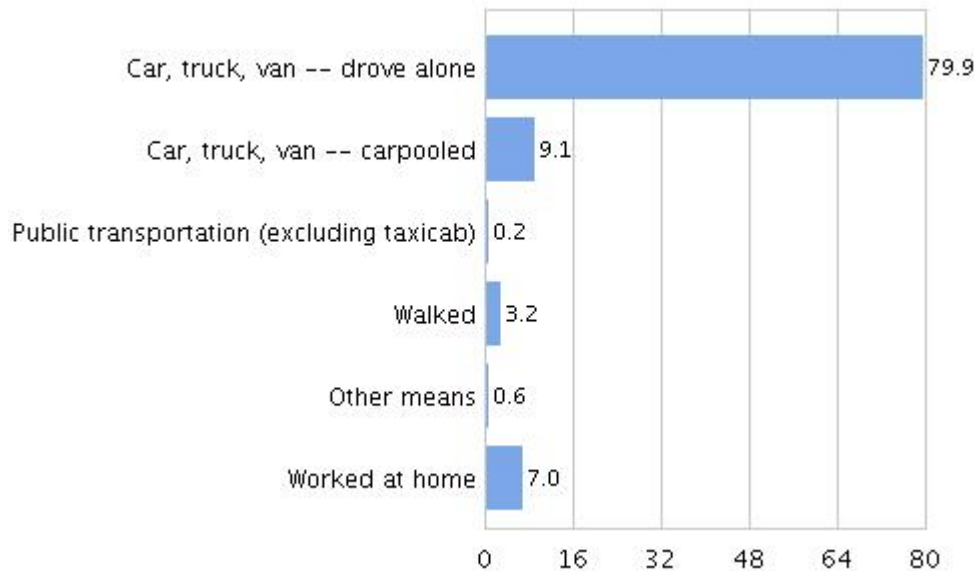

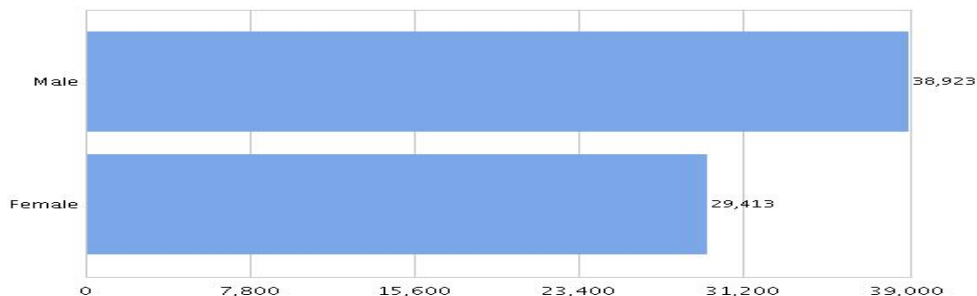
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Brown County, Kansas in 2011-2015

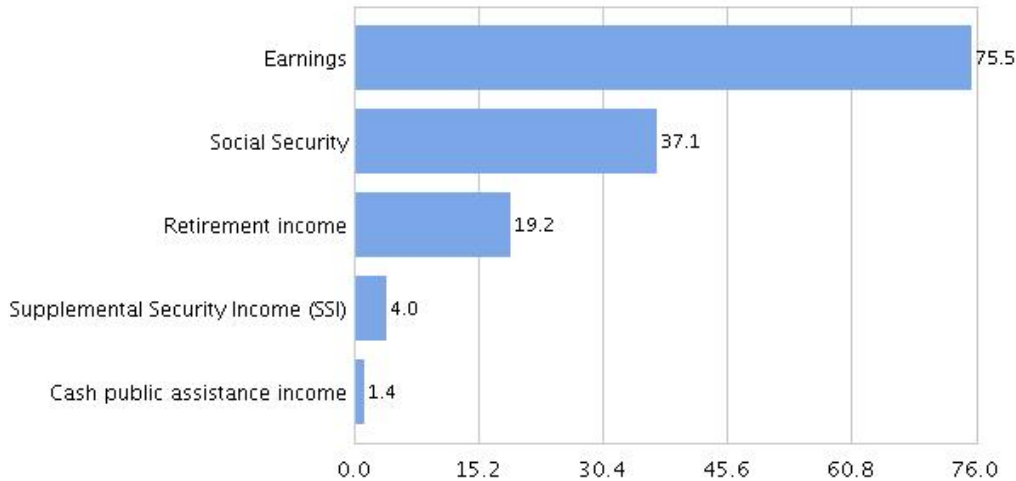

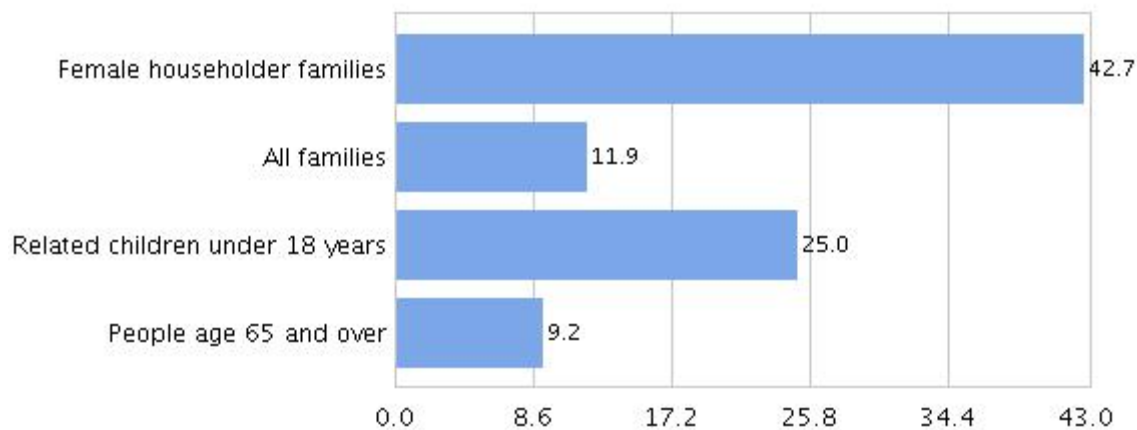
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Brown County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Brown County, Kansas in 2011-2015



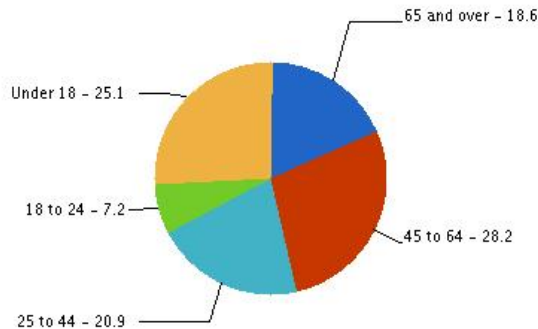

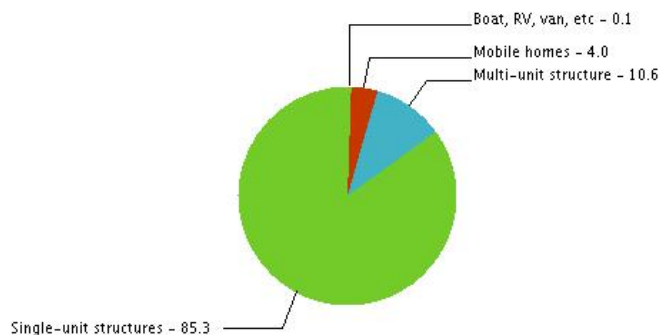

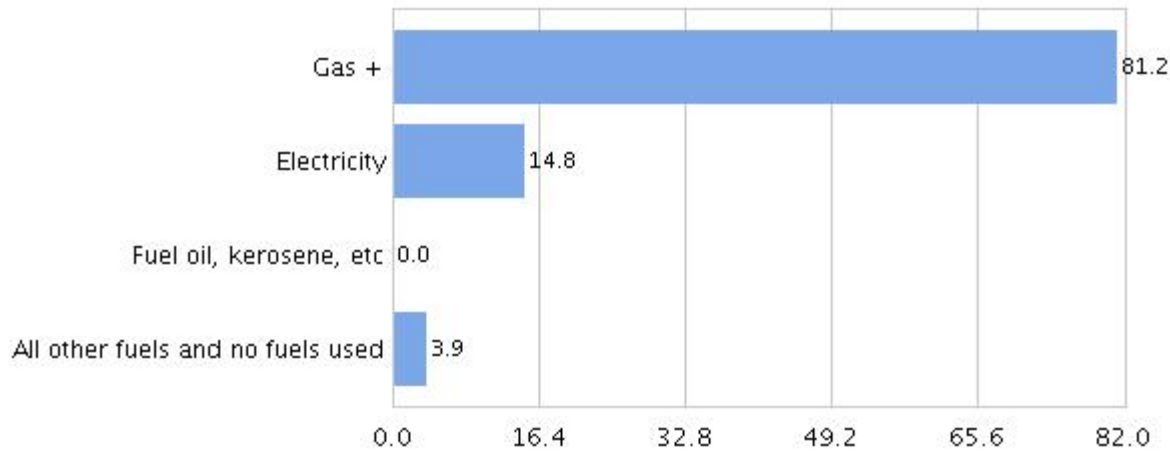

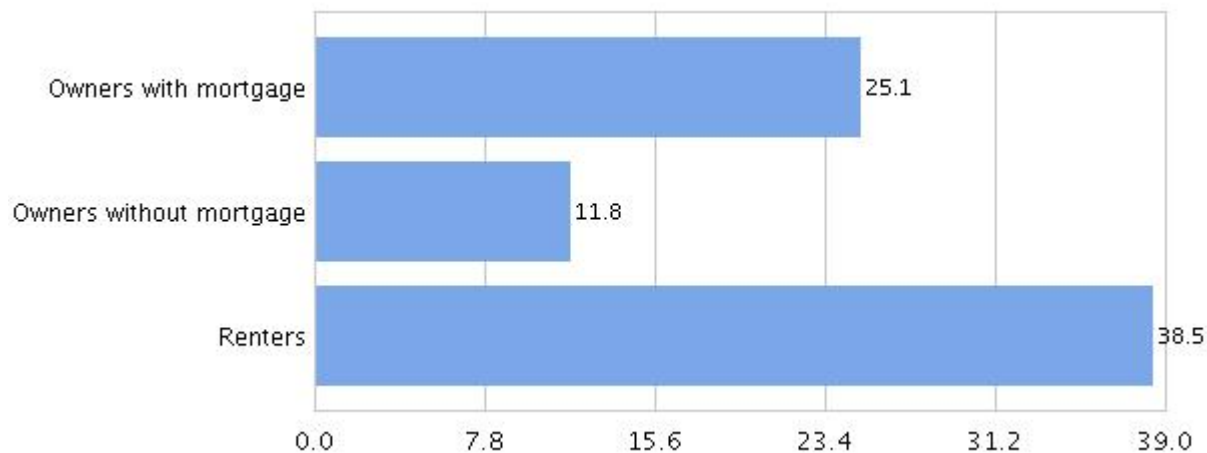

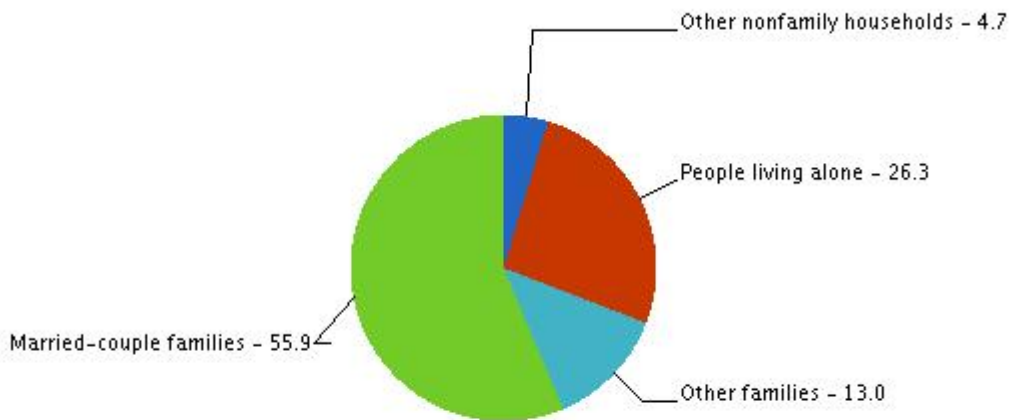

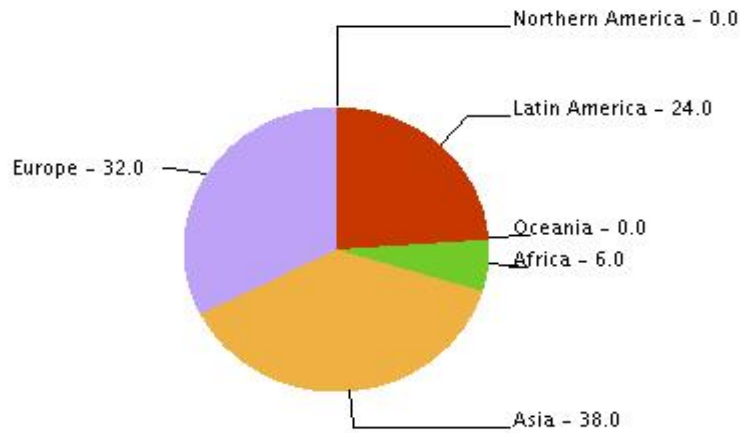

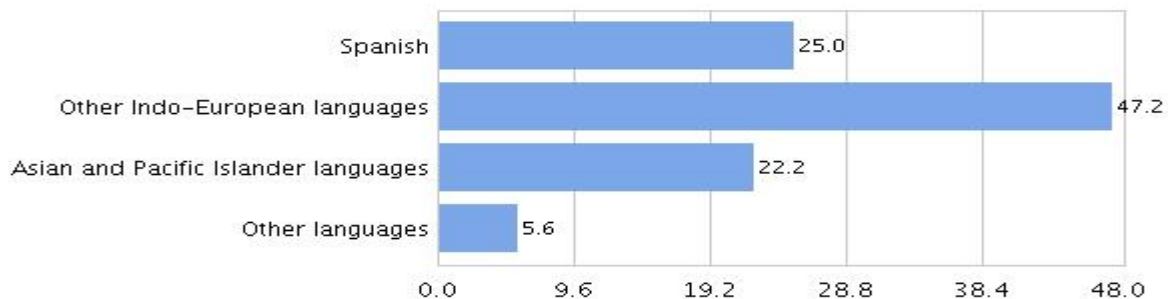
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

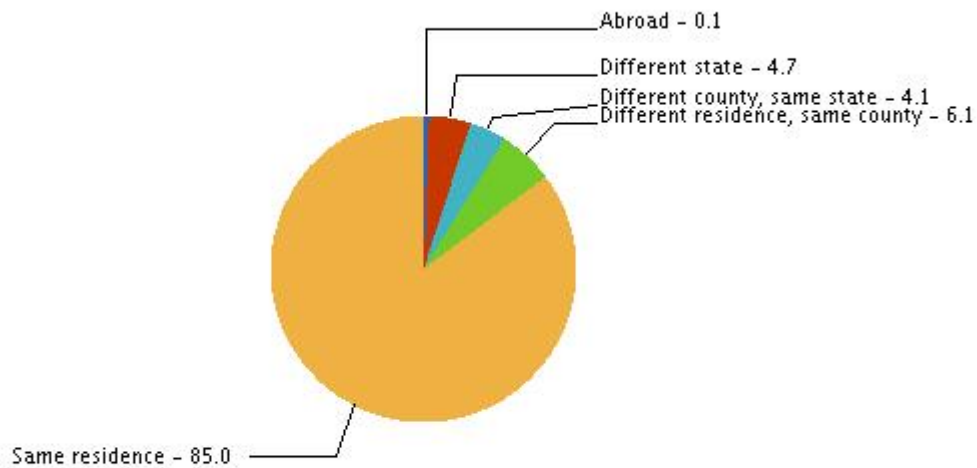
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

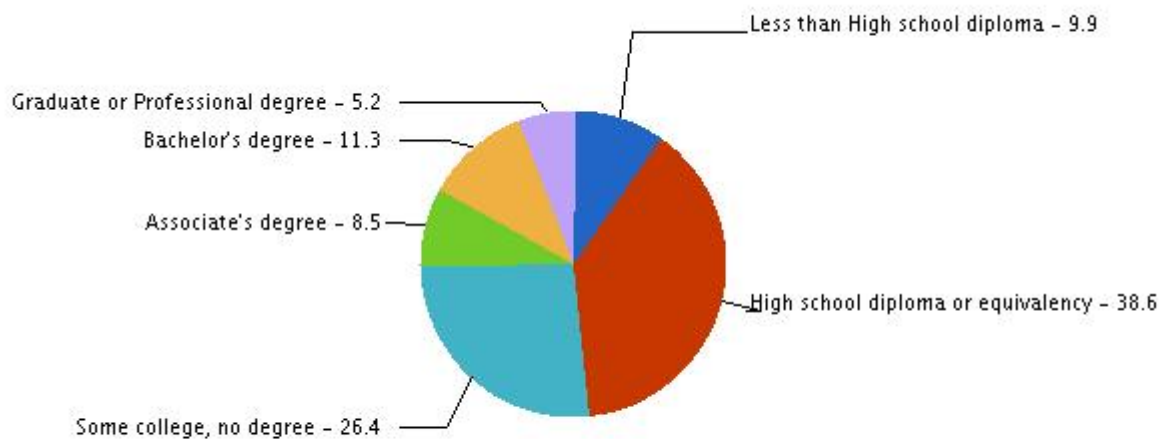

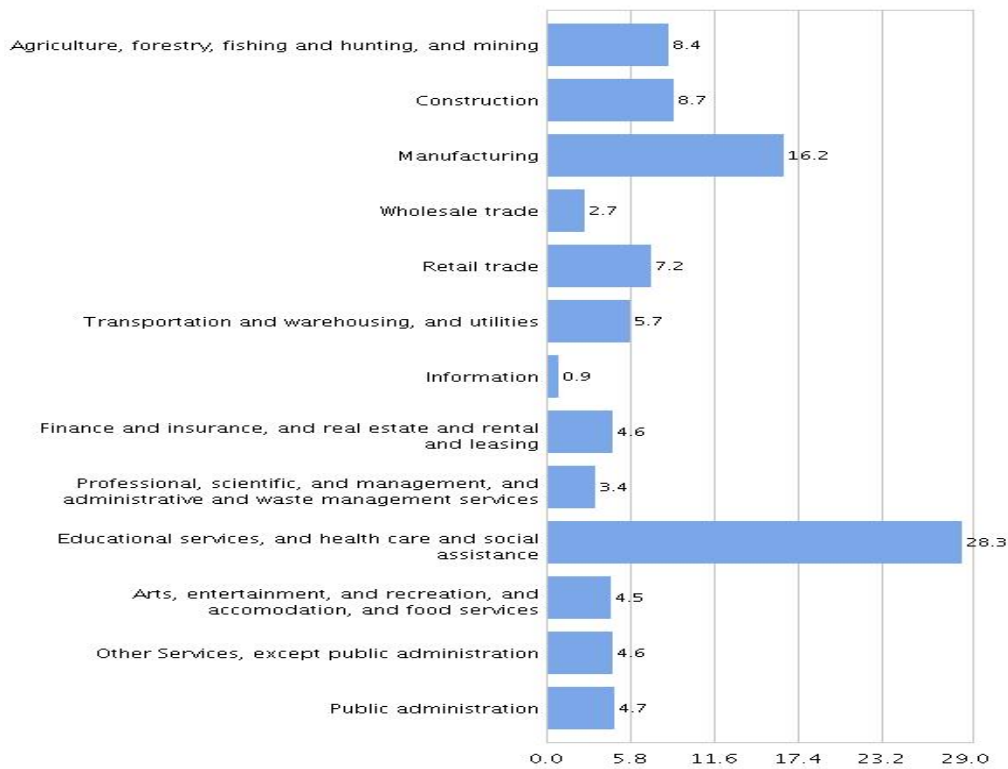

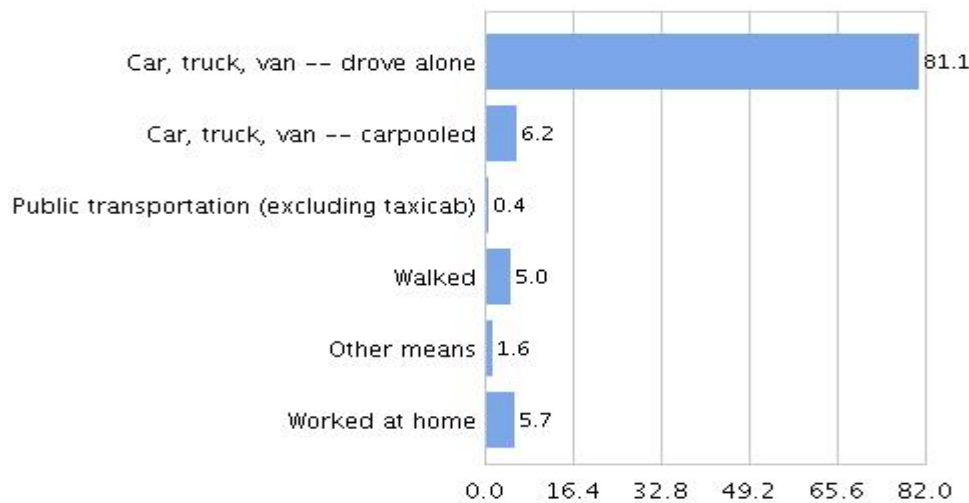

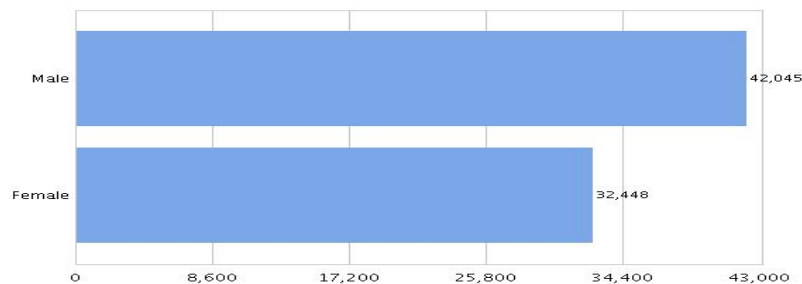
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

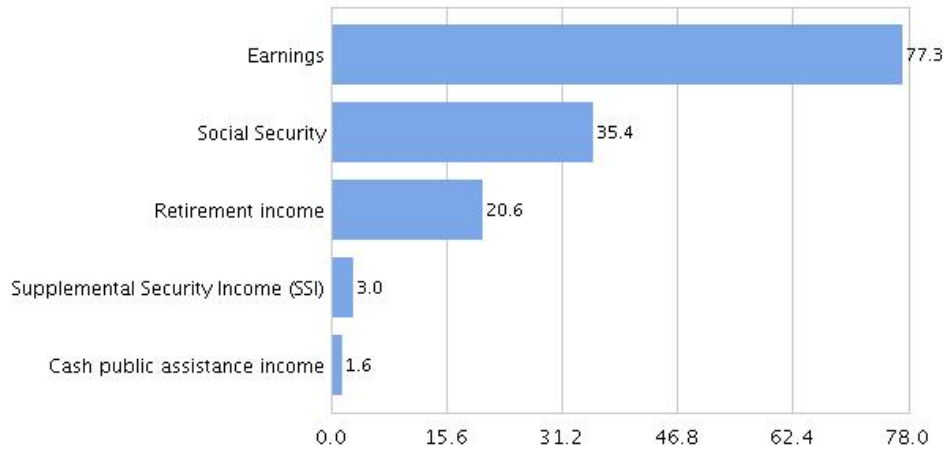

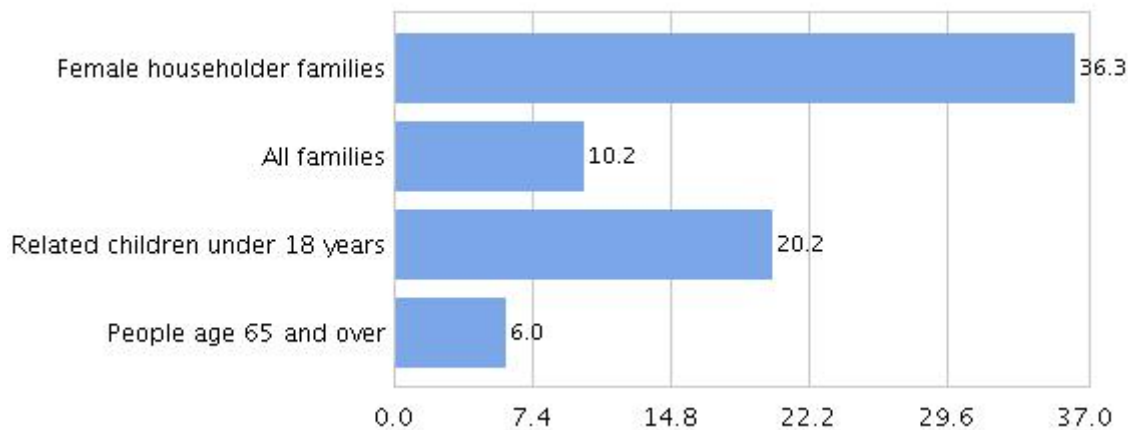
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015



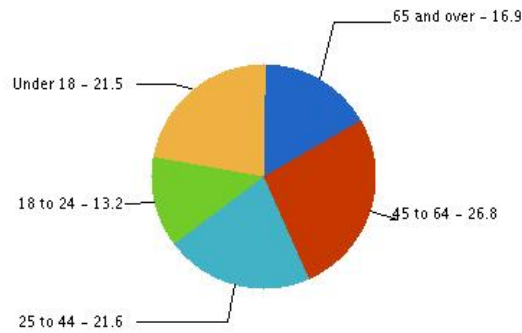

Age Distribution of People in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

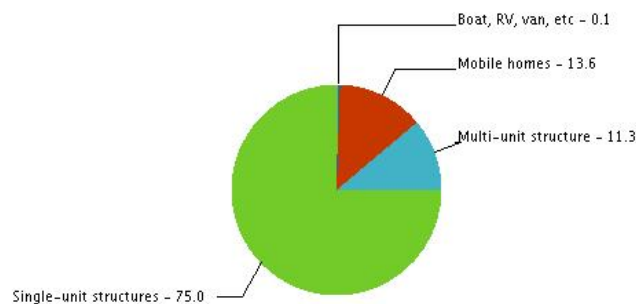

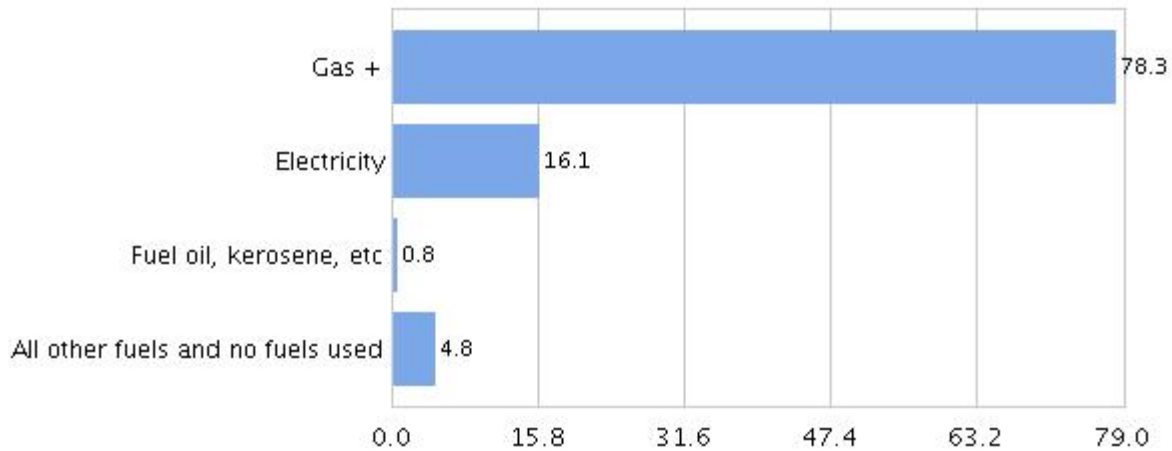

House heating fuel used in Doniphan County, Kansas in 2011-2015

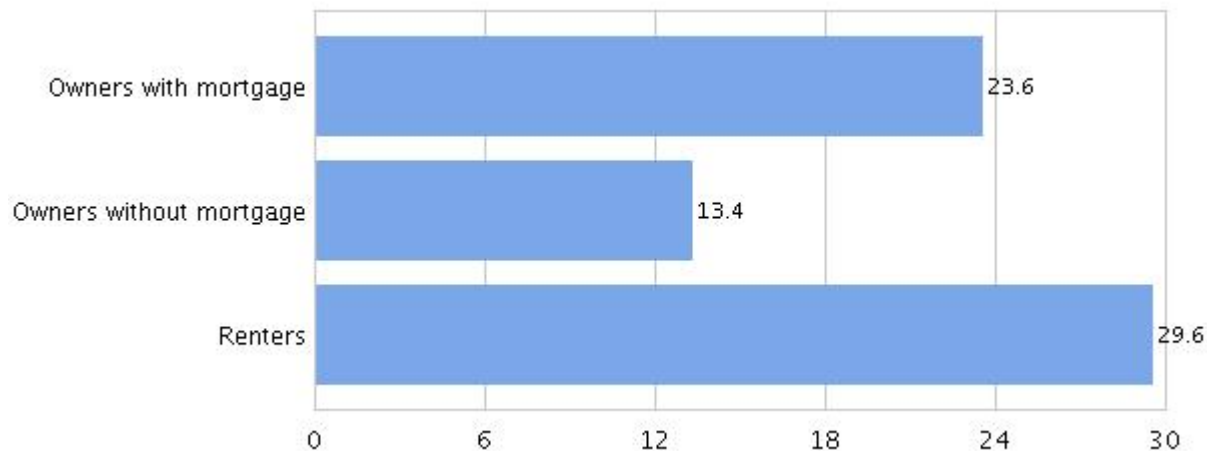

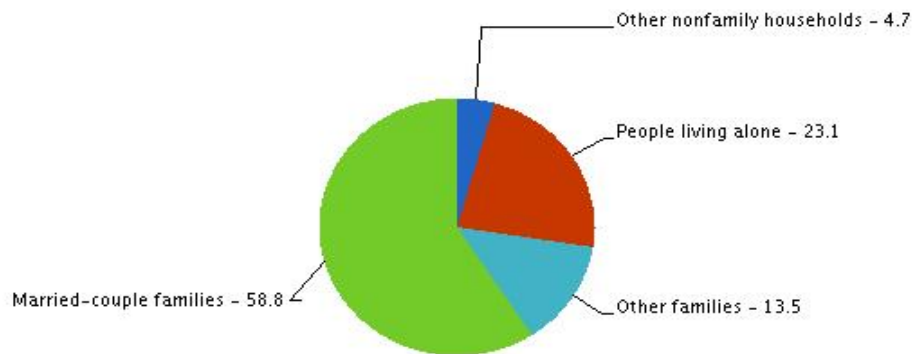

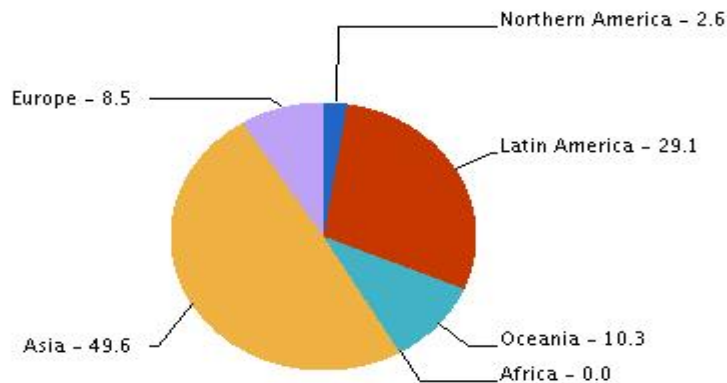

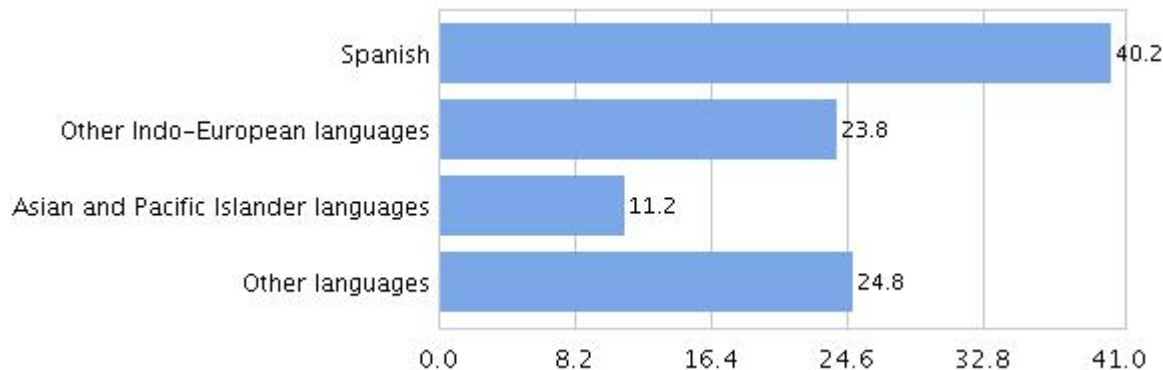
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

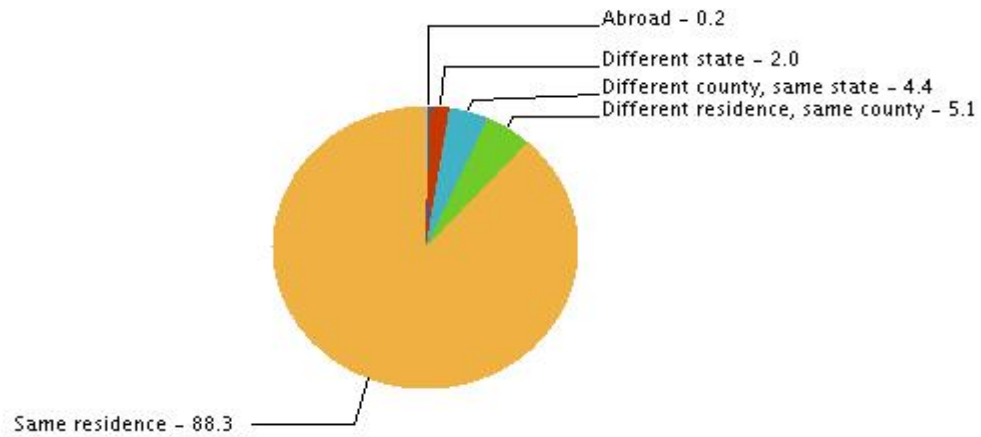
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

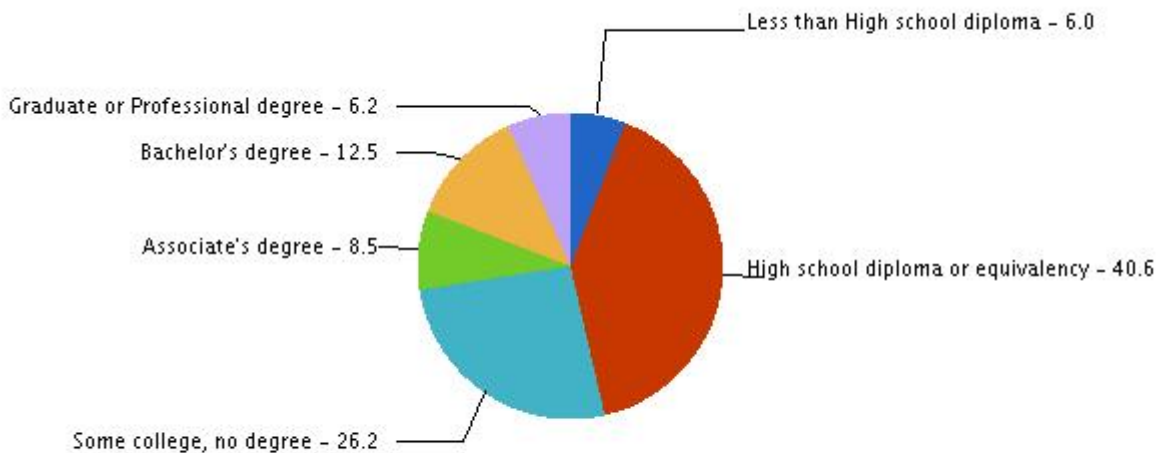

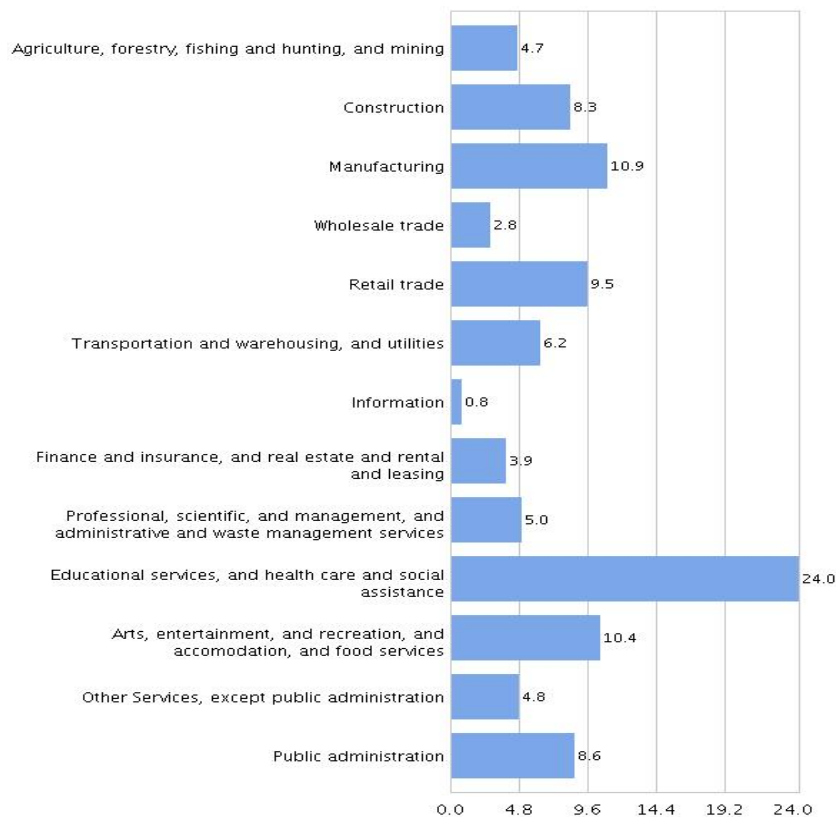

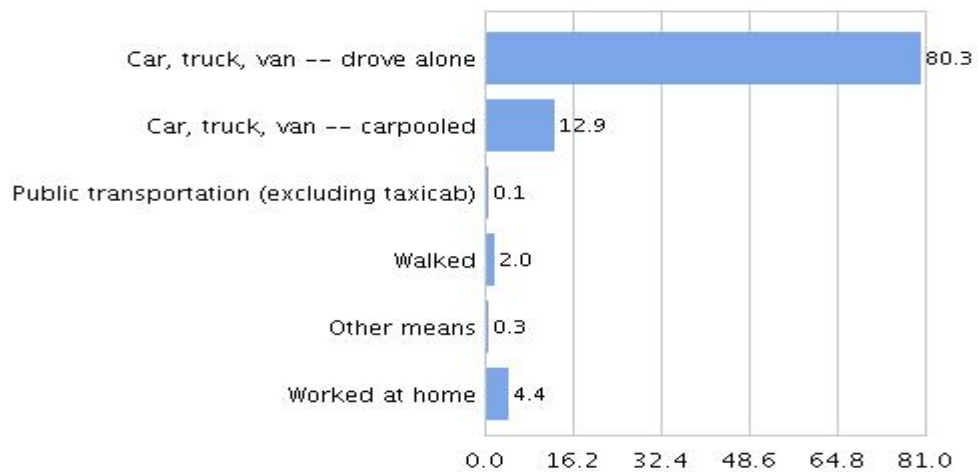

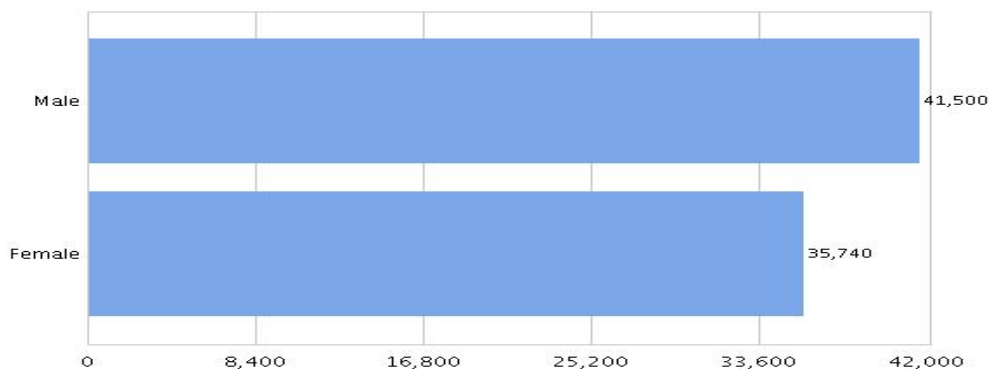
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

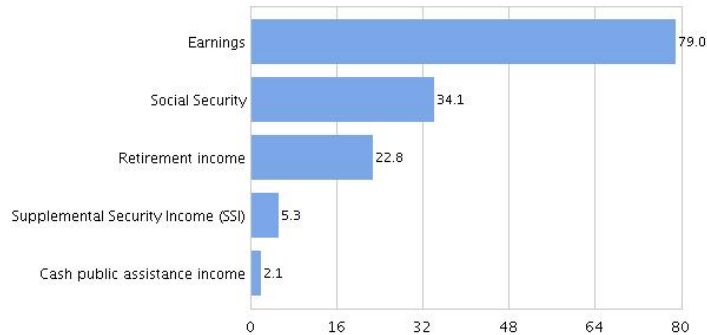

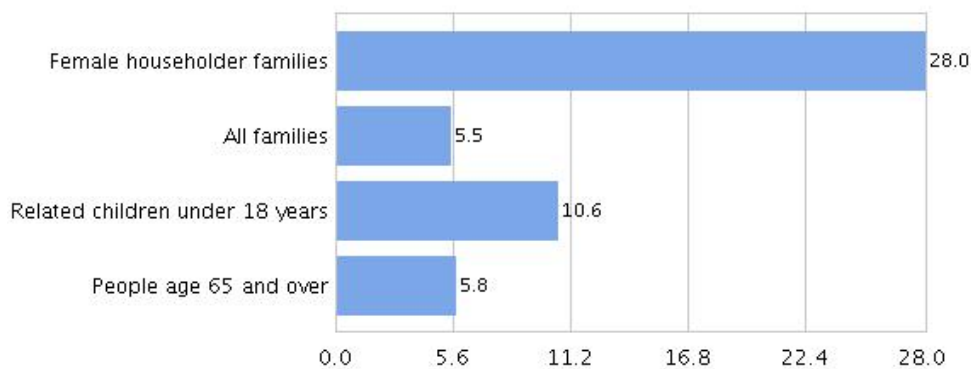
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015



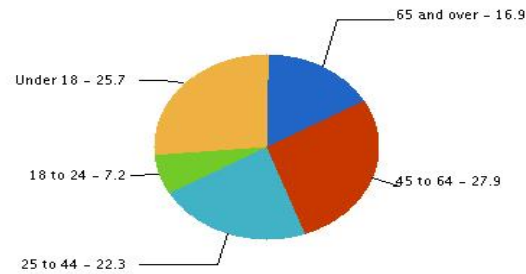

Age Distribution of People in Jackson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

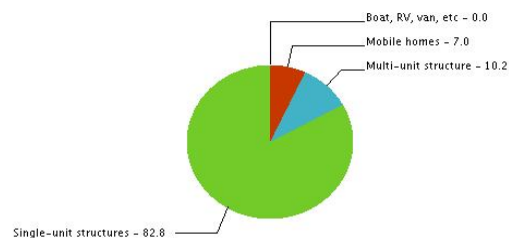

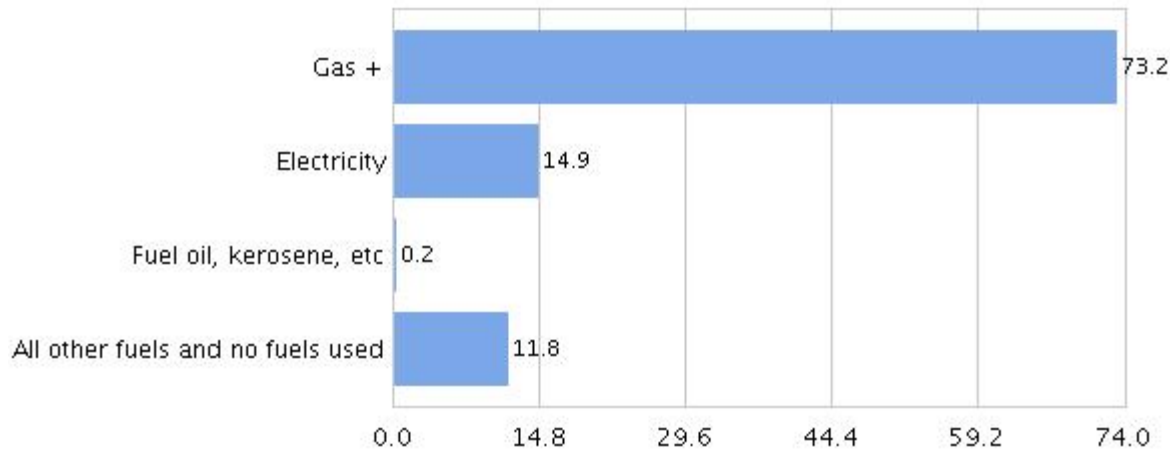

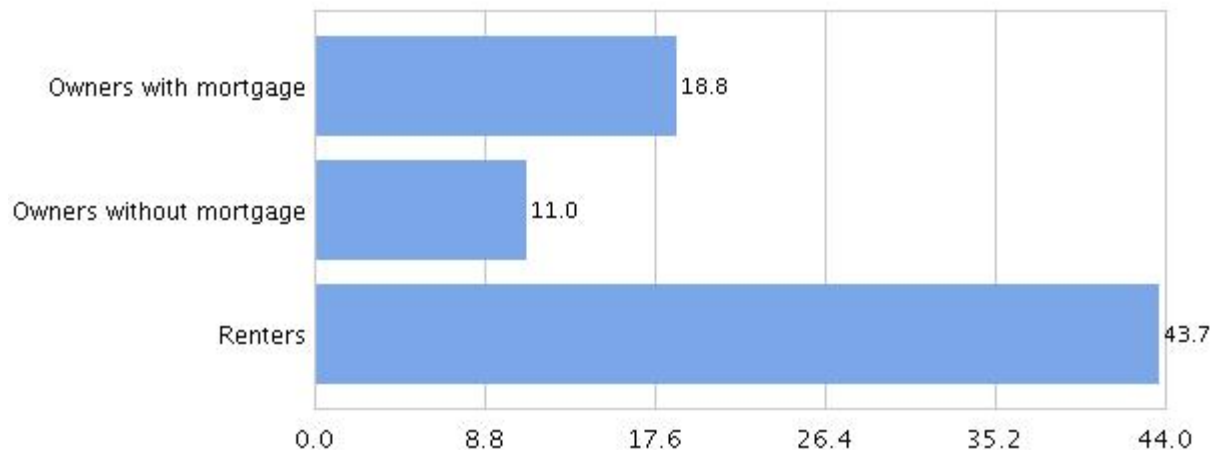

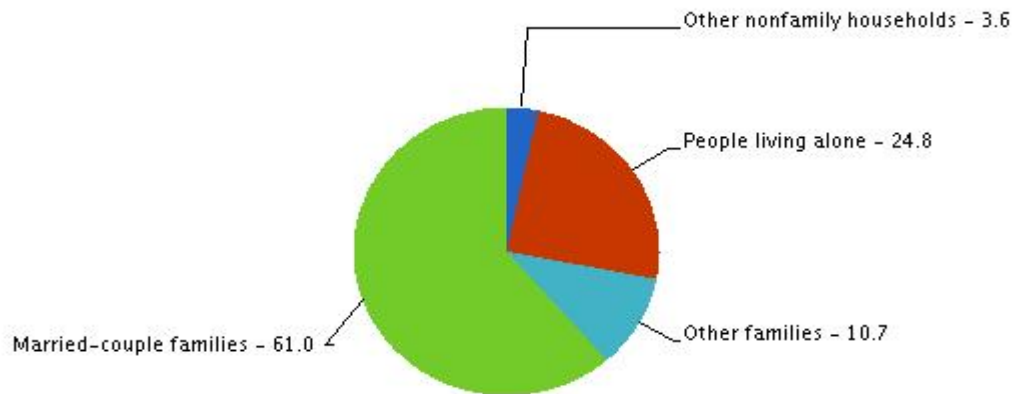

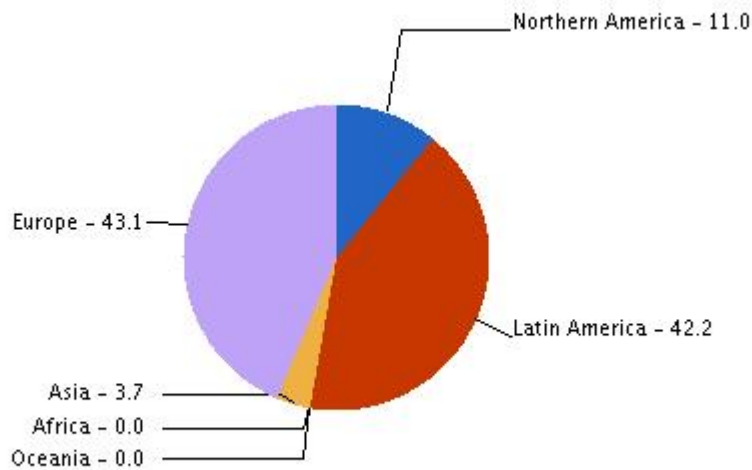

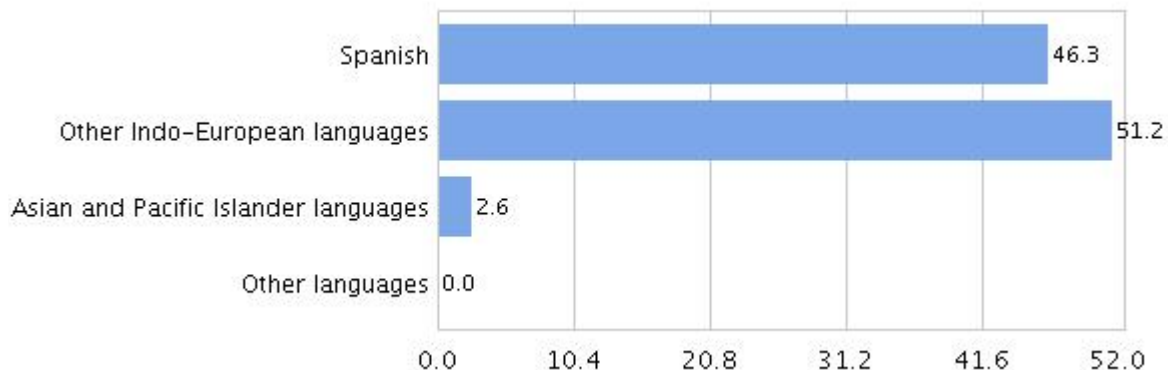
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

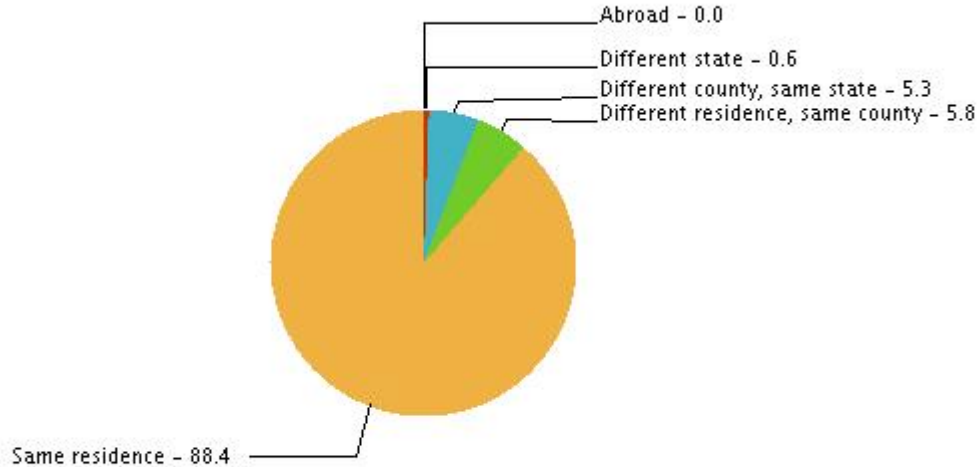
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

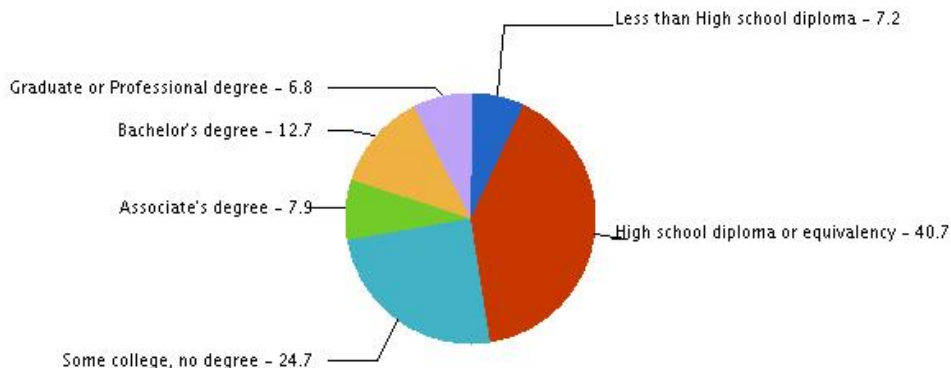

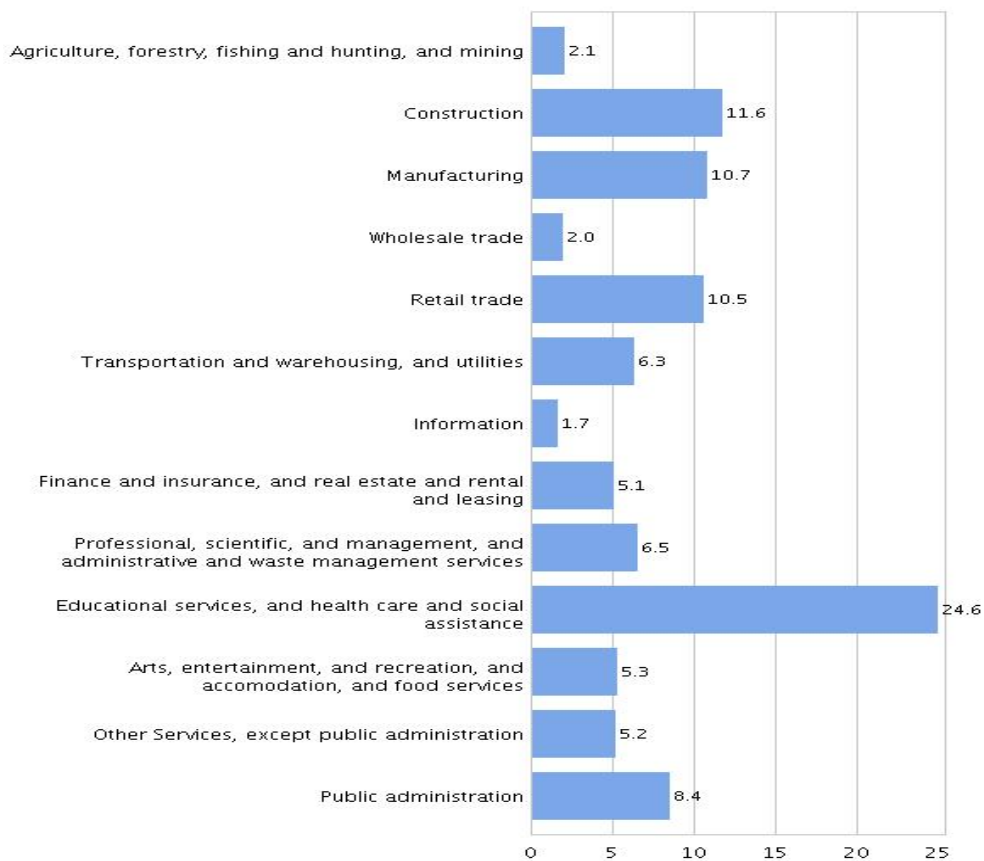

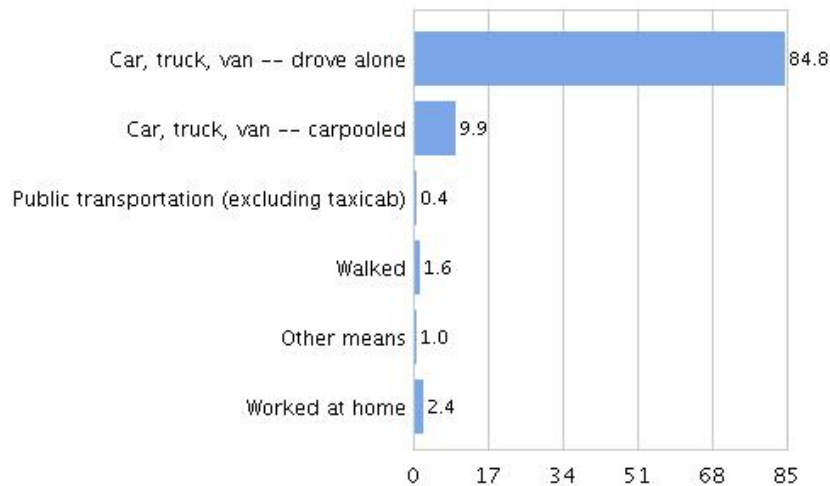

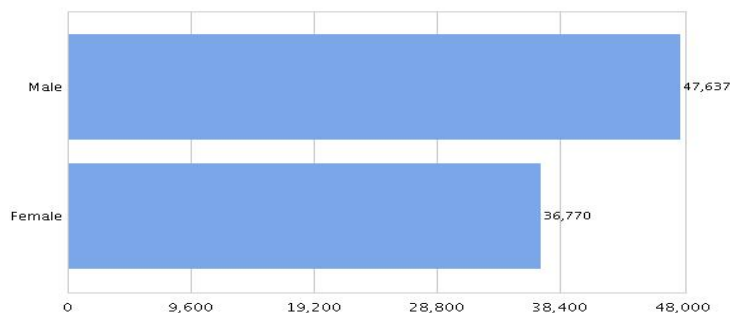
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

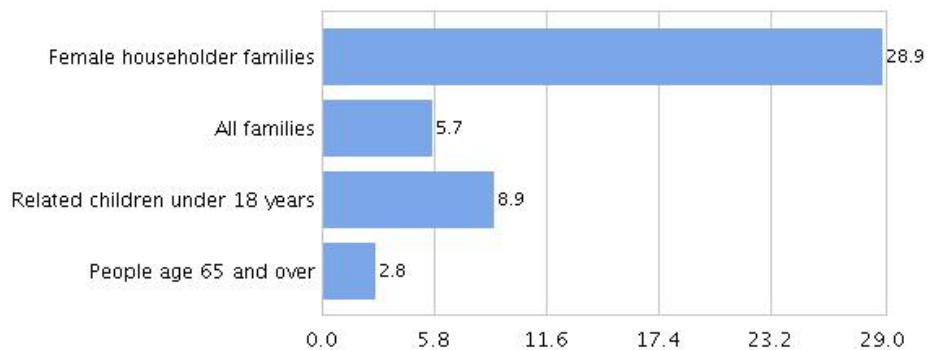
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015



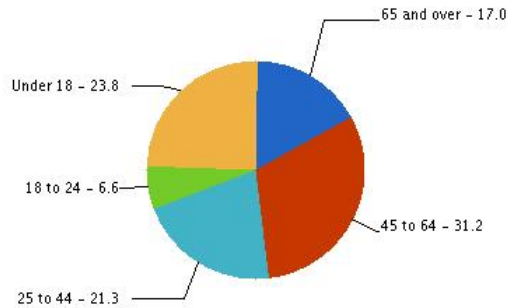

Age Distribution of People in Jefferson County, Kansas in 2011-2015

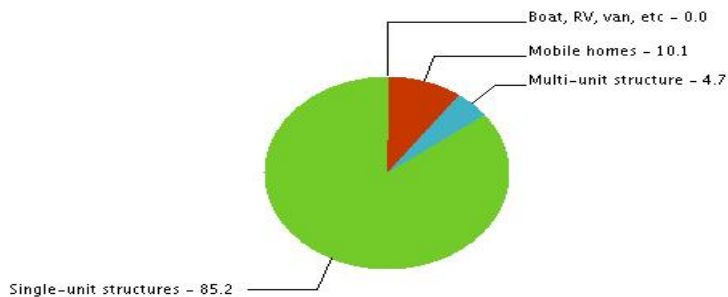

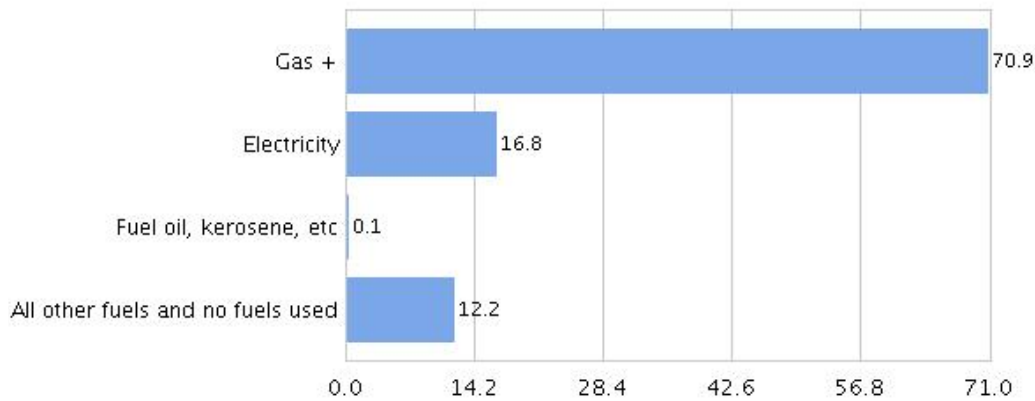

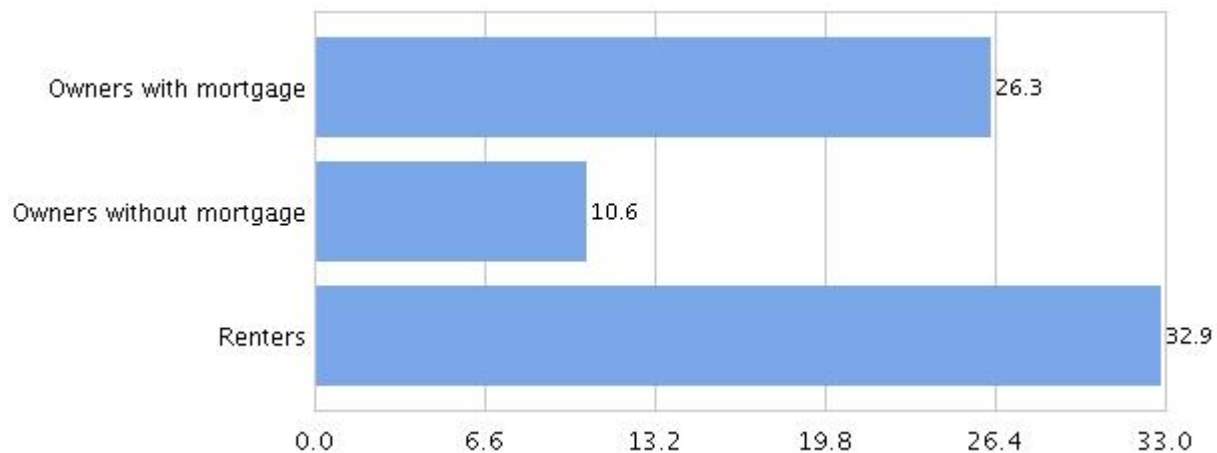

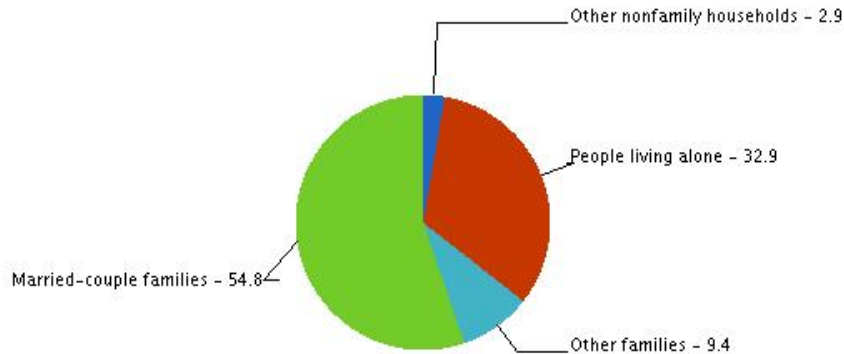

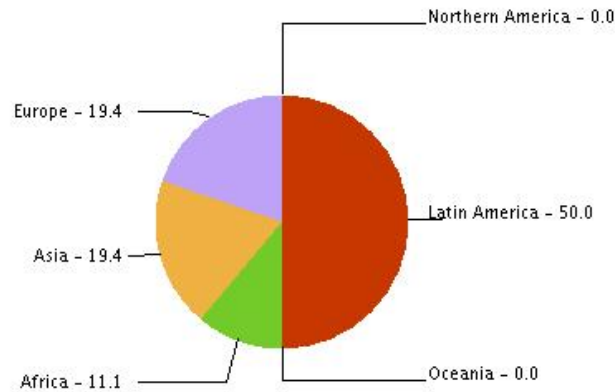

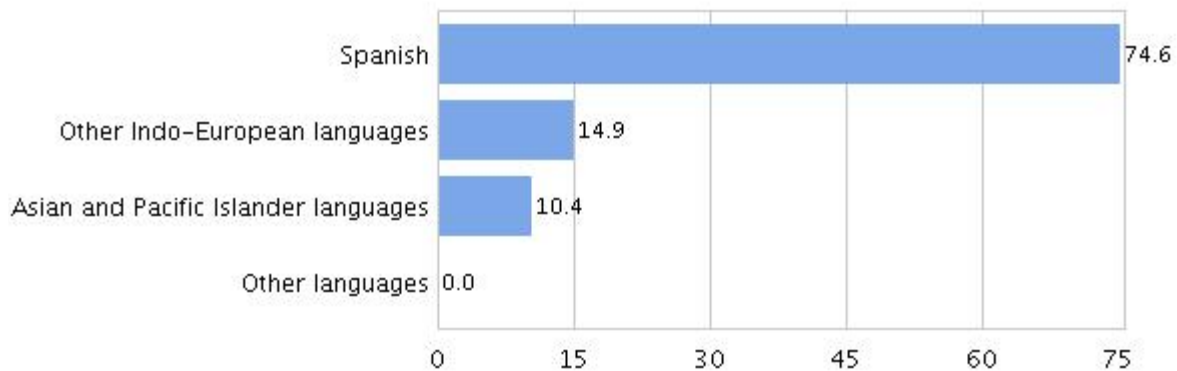
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

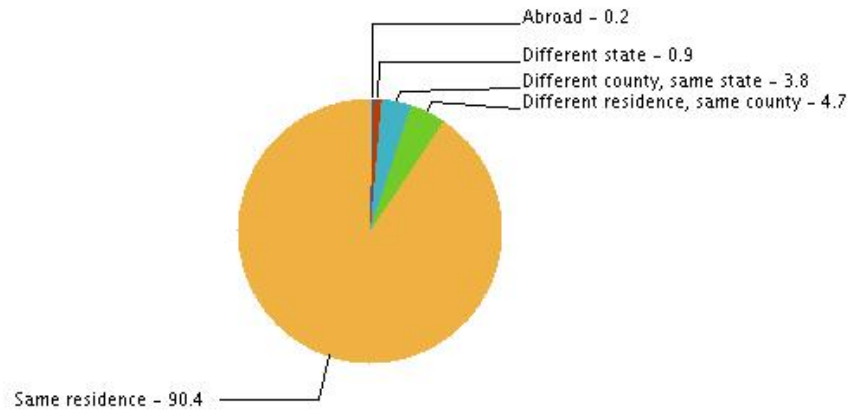
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

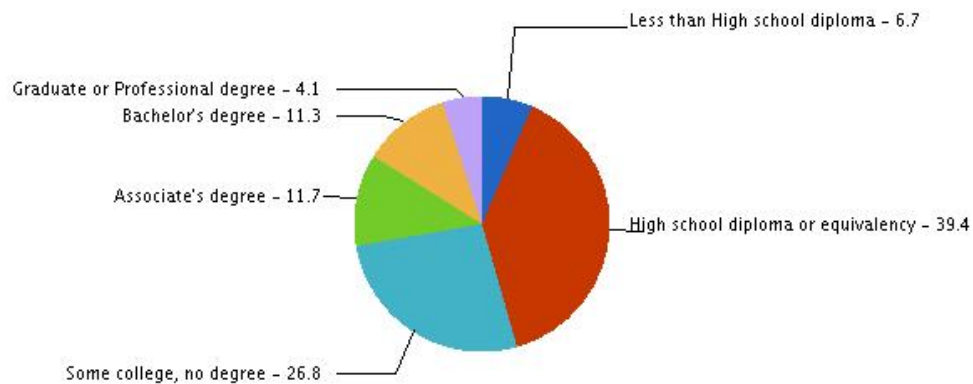

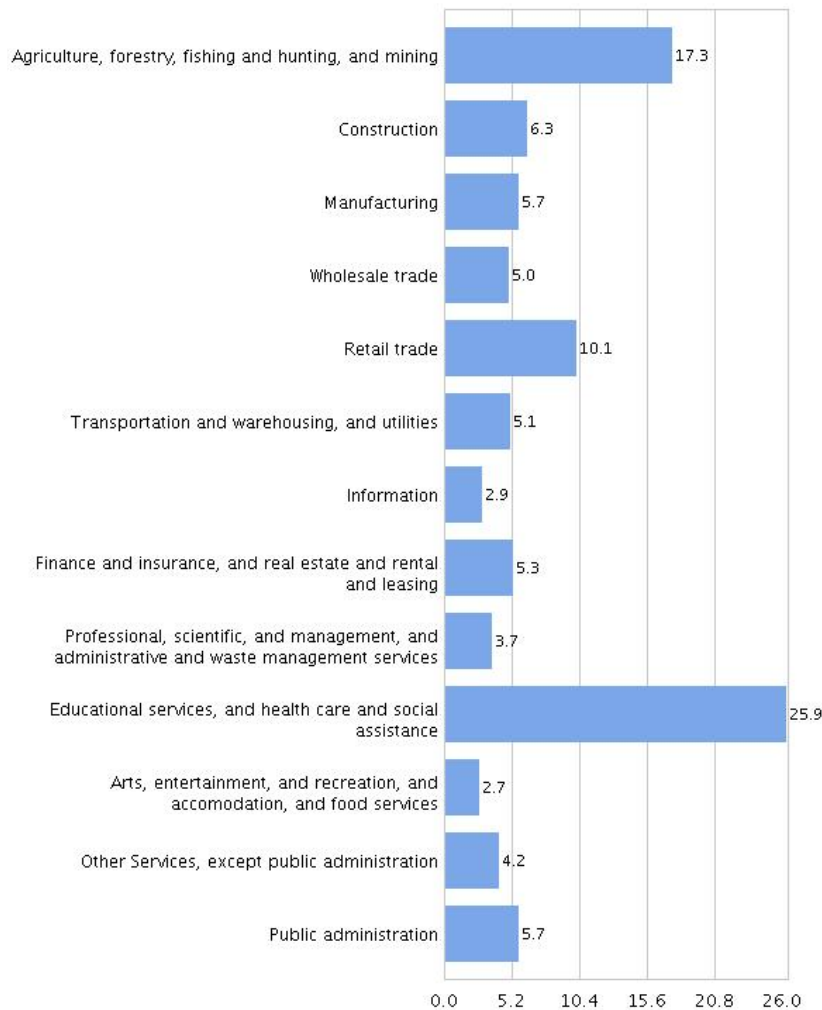

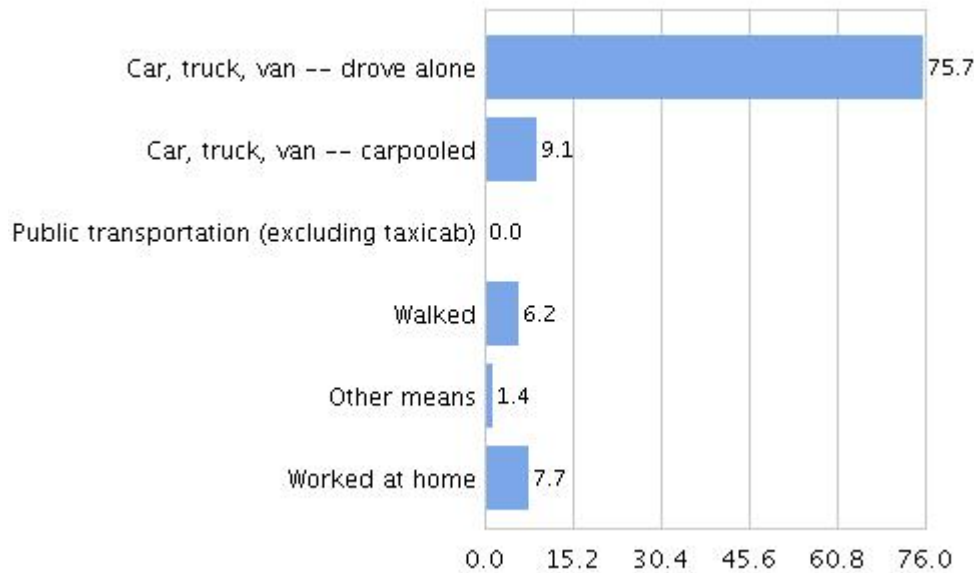

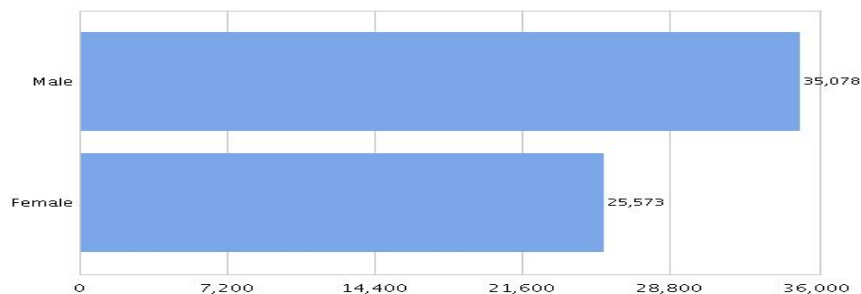
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

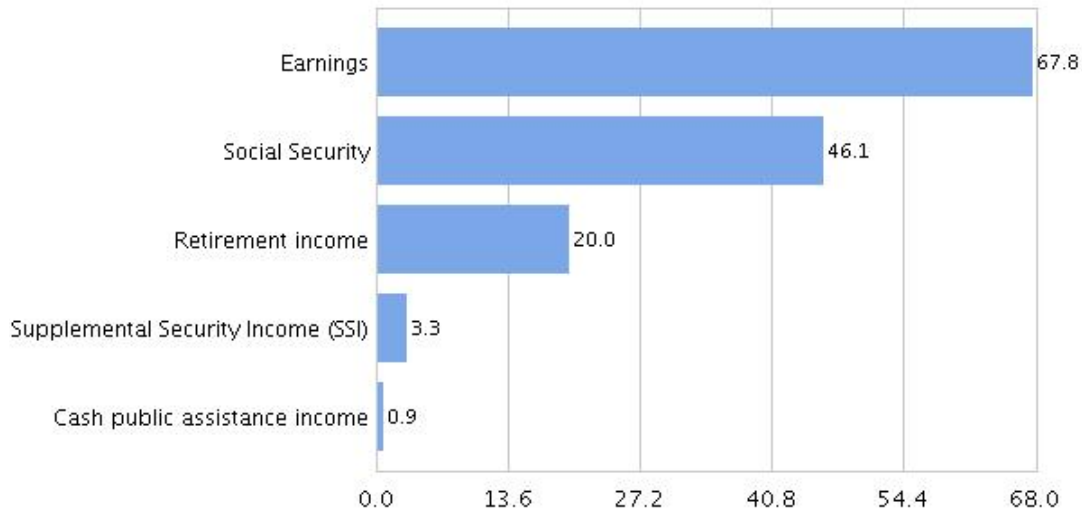

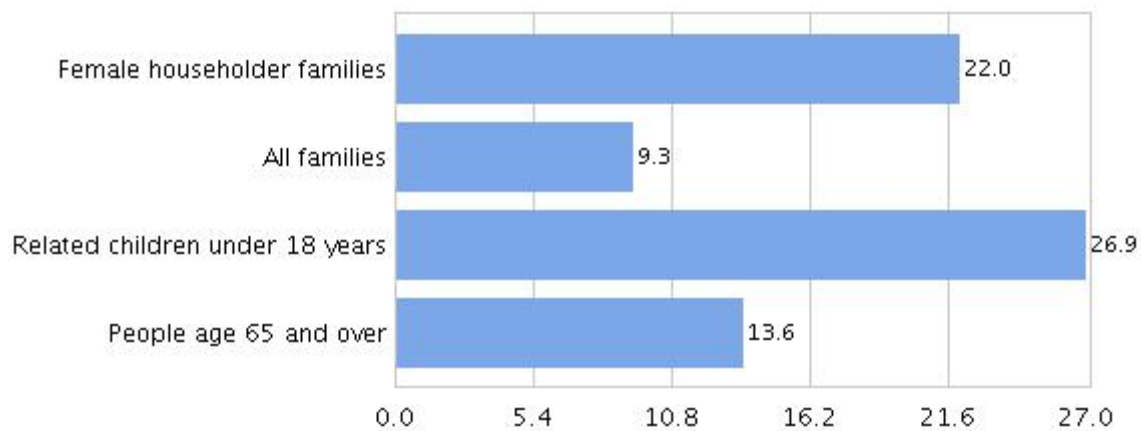
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015



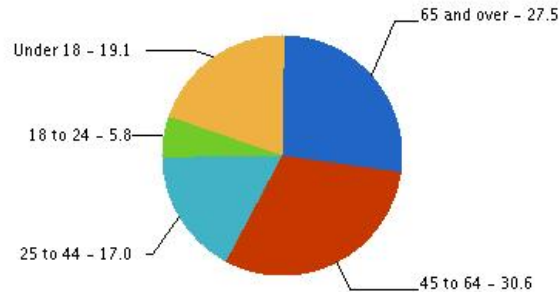

Age Distribution of People in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

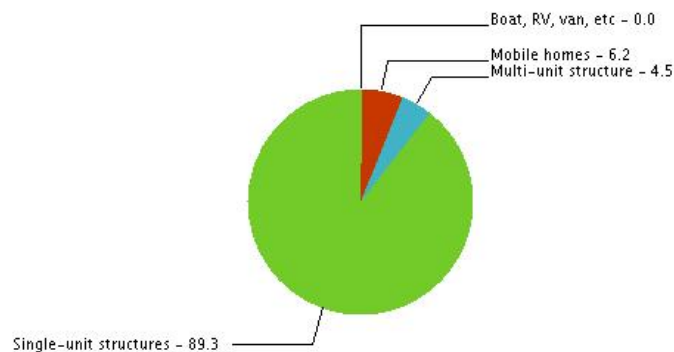

Types of Housing Units in Jewell County, Kansas in 2011-2015



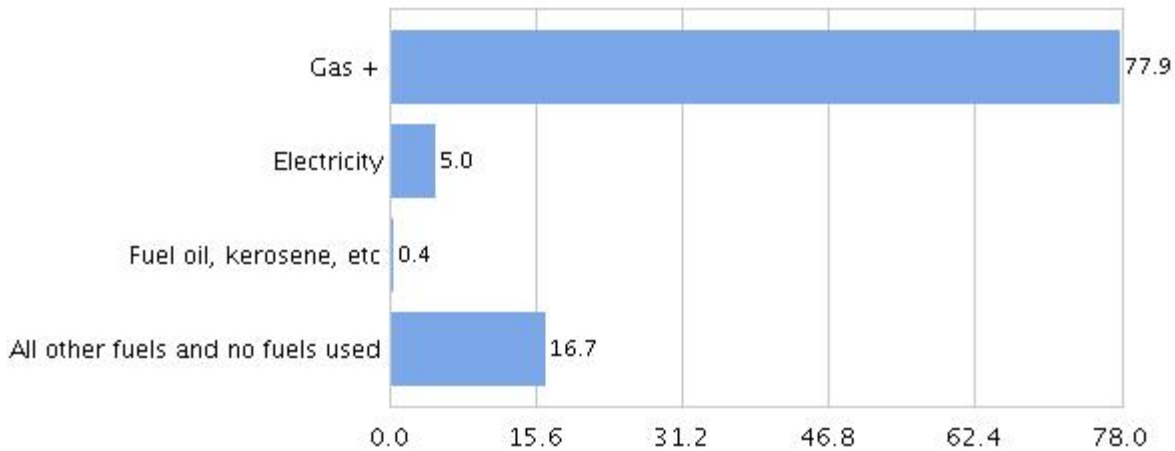

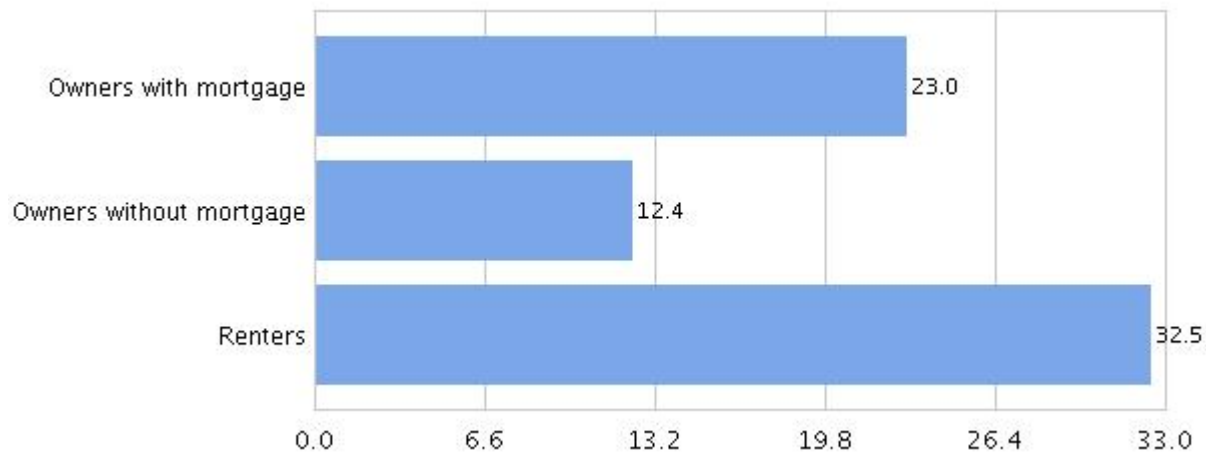

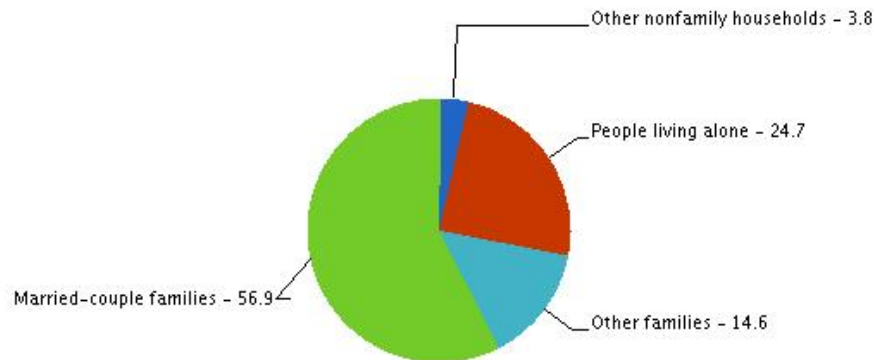

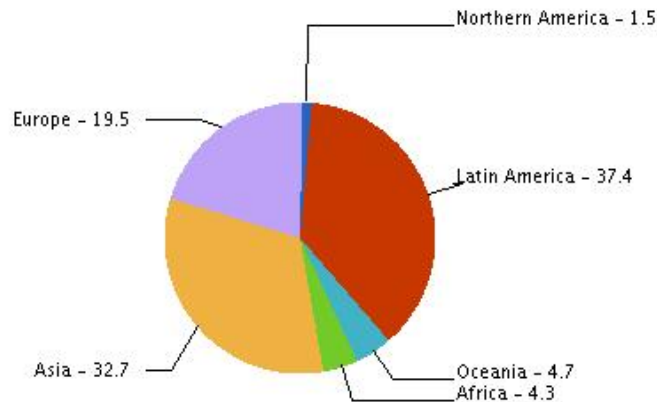

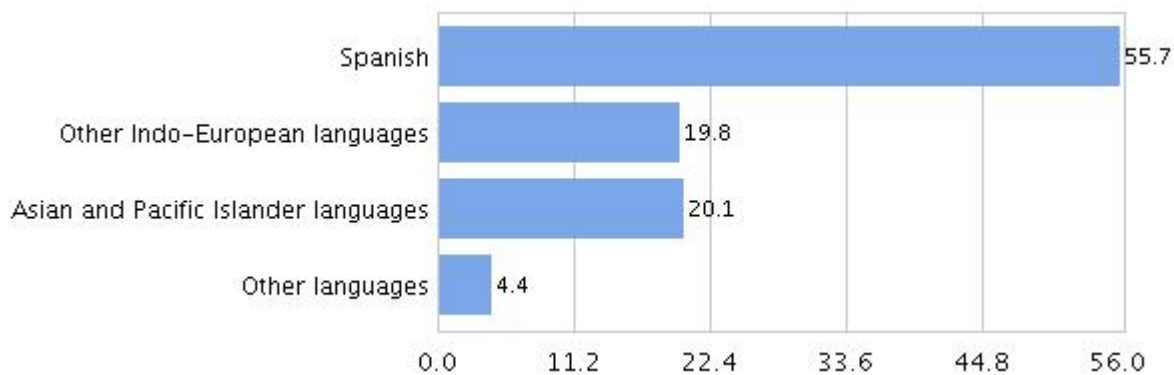
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

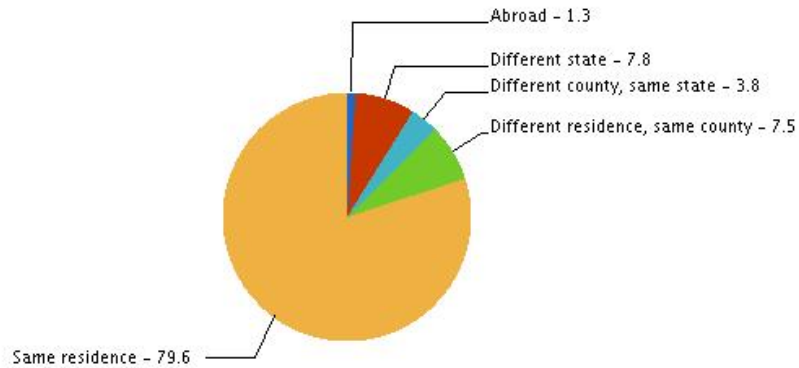
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

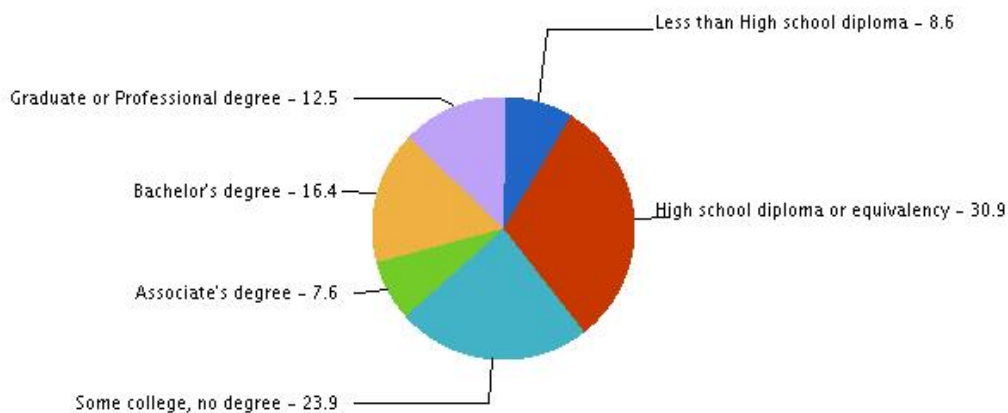

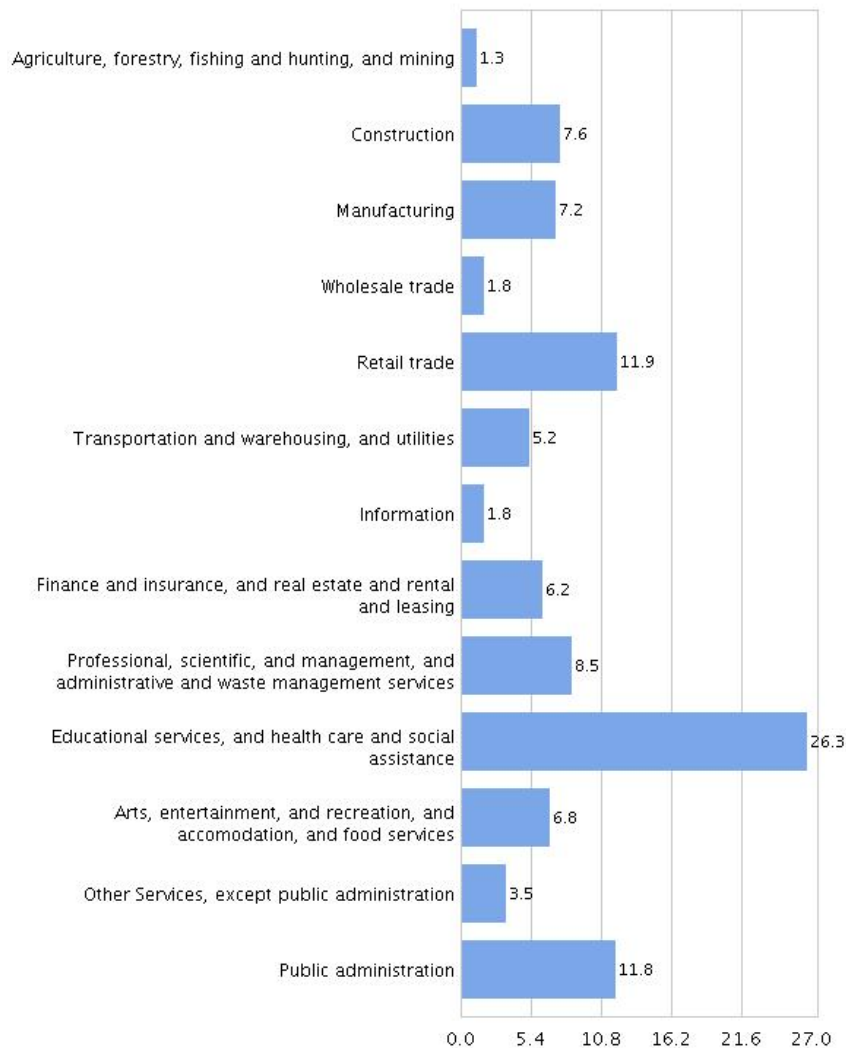

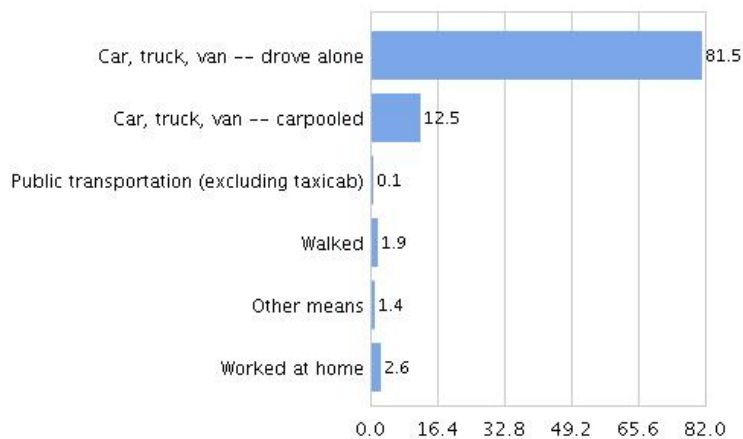

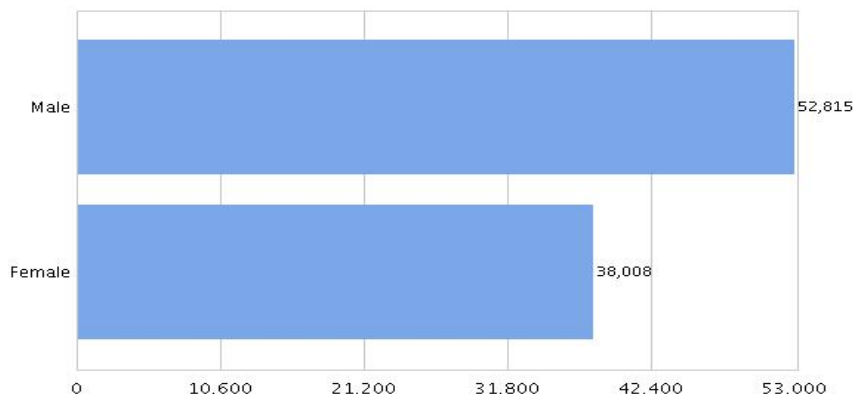
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

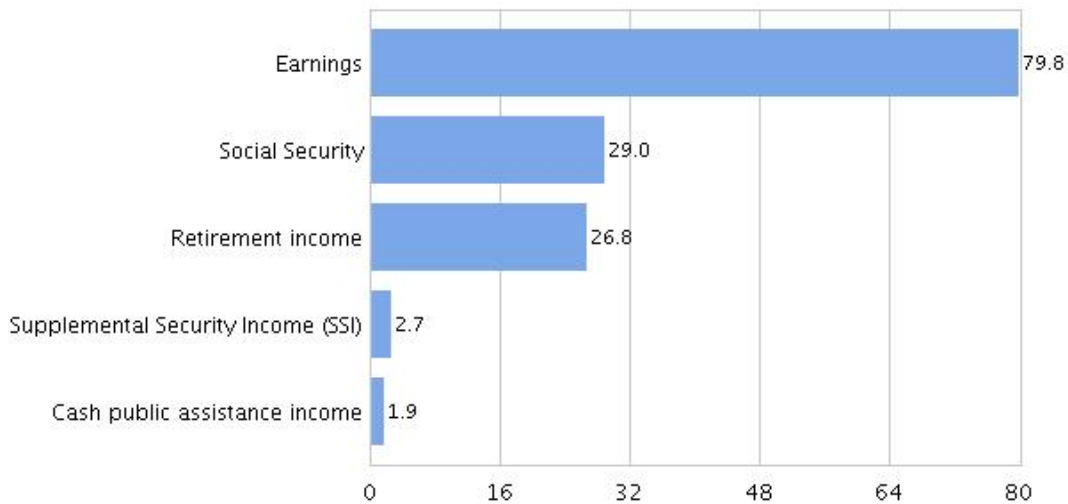

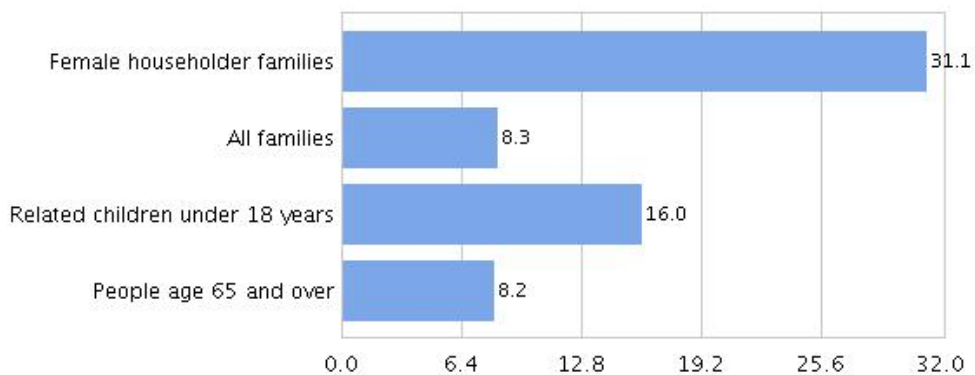
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015



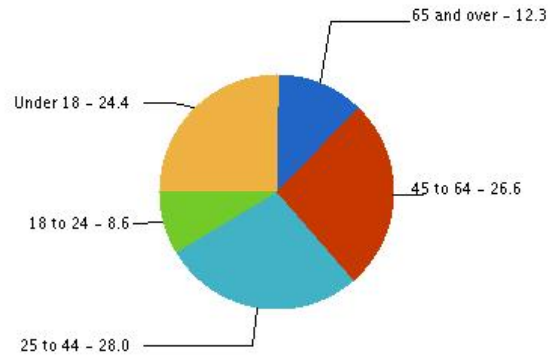

Age Distribution of People in Leavenworth County, Kansas in 2011-2015

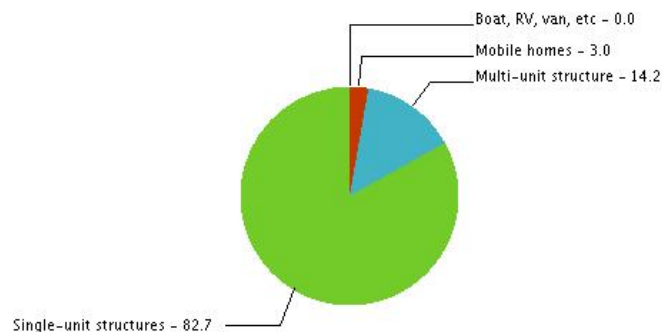

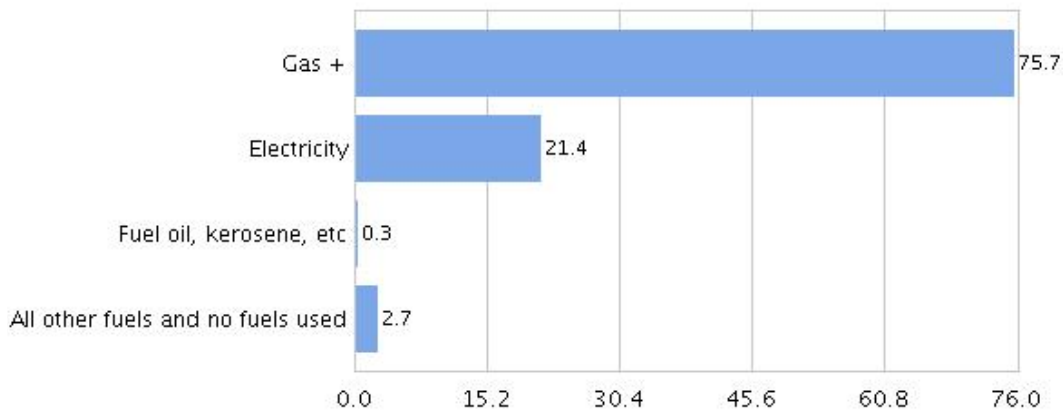

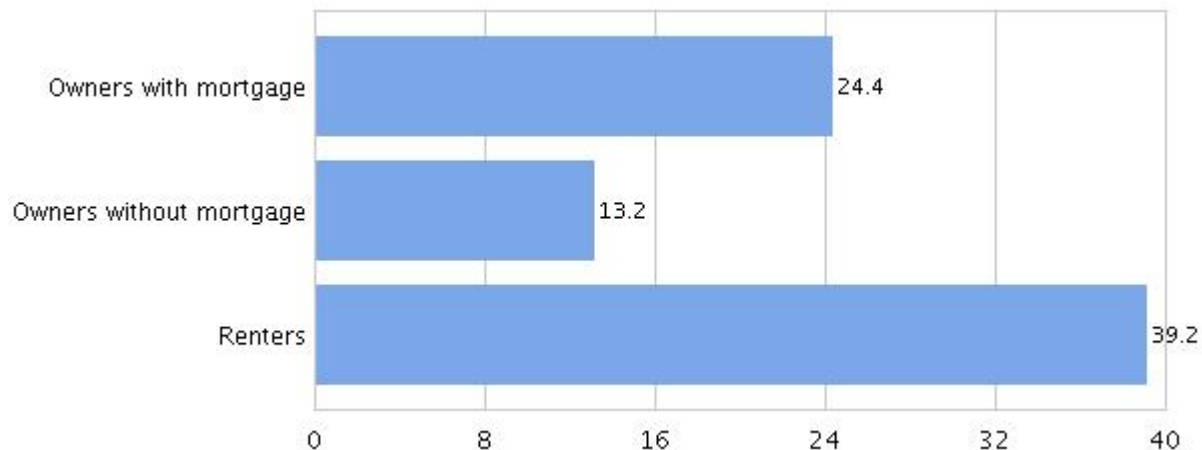

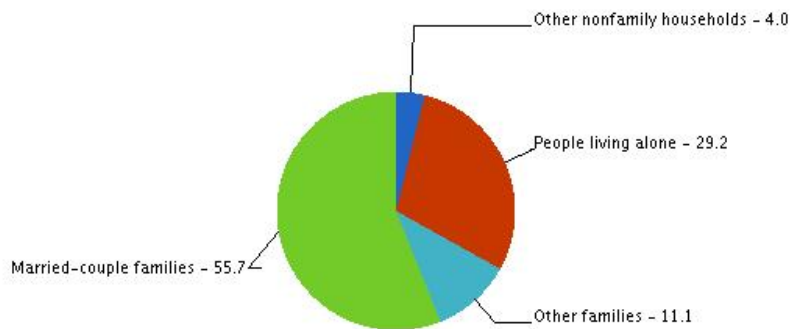

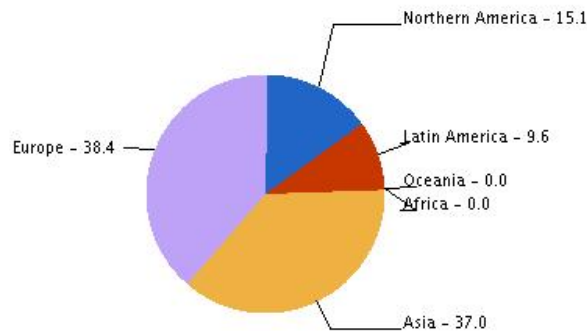

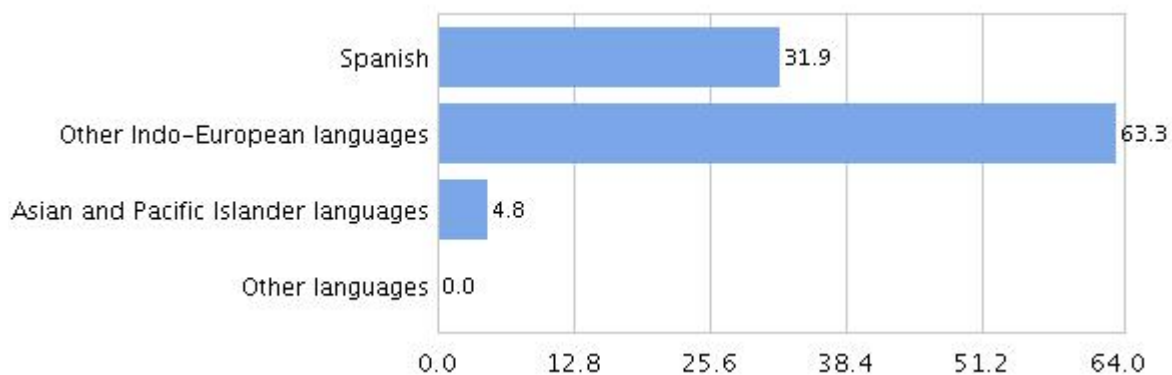
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

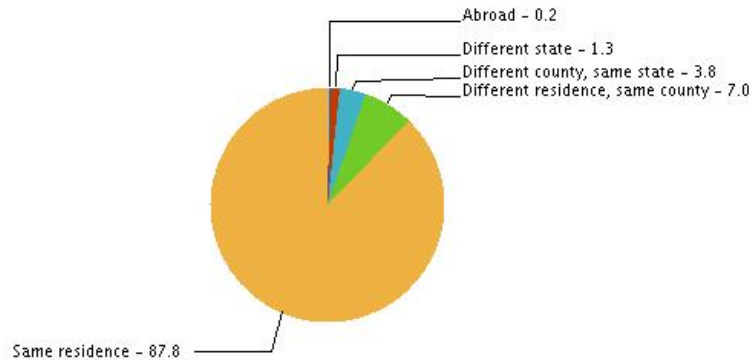
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

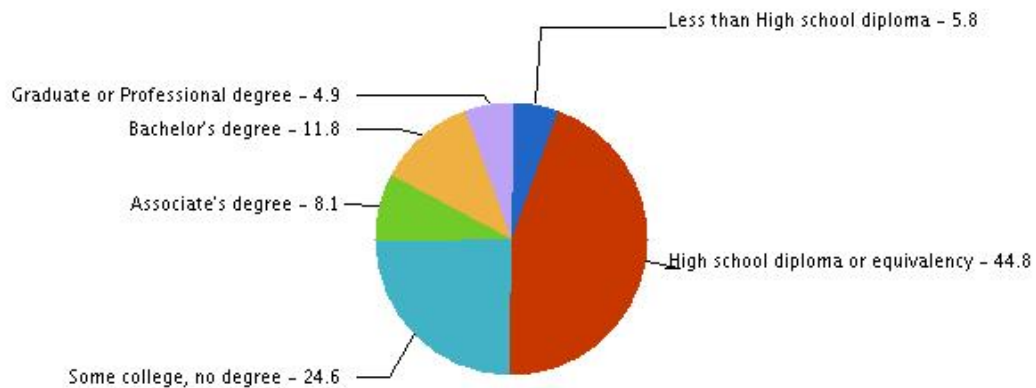

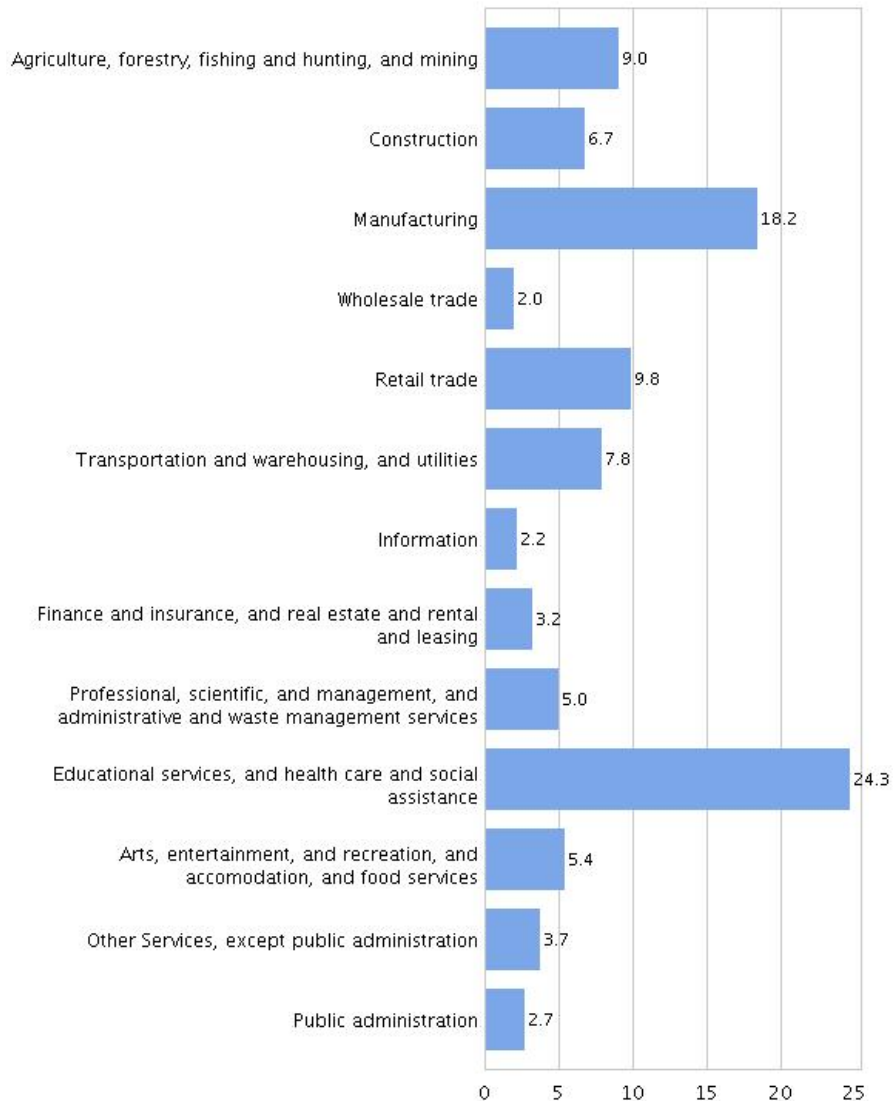

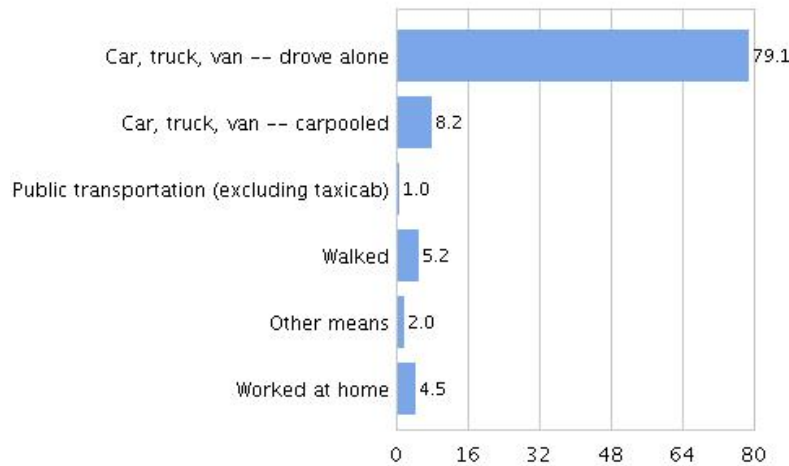

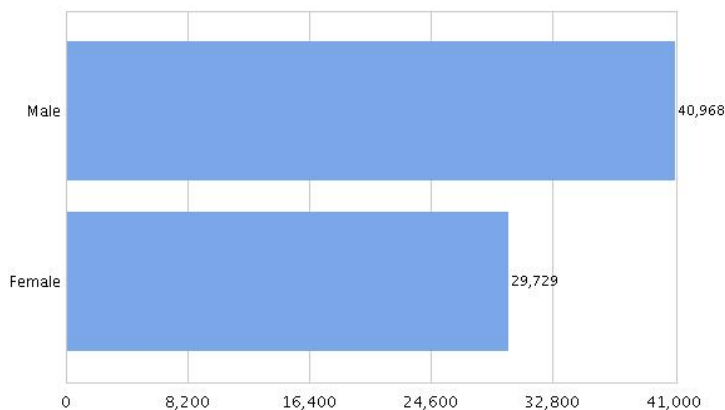
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

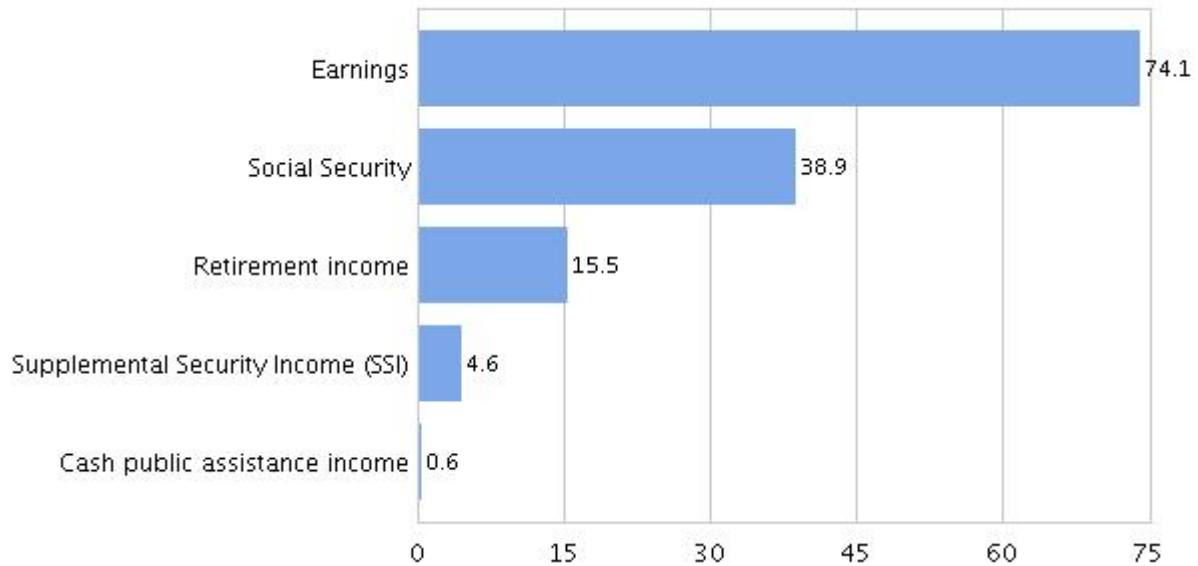

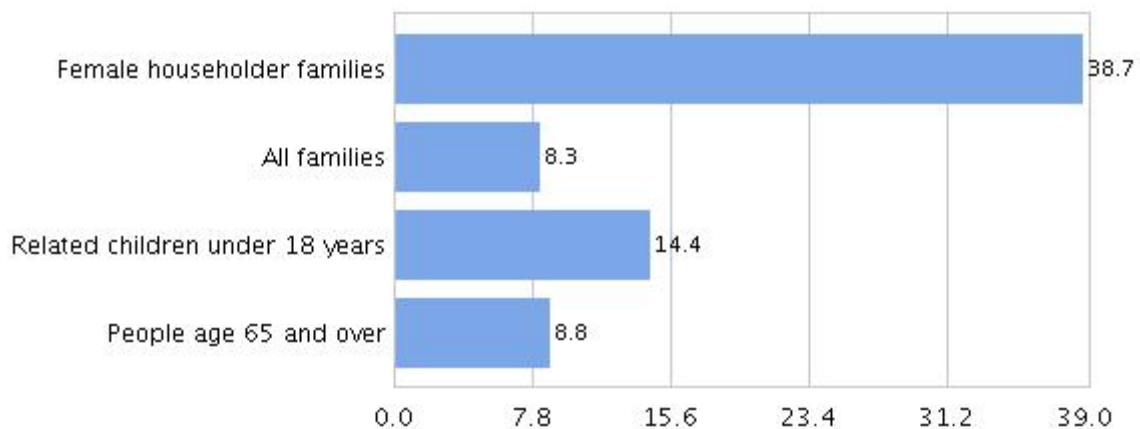
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015



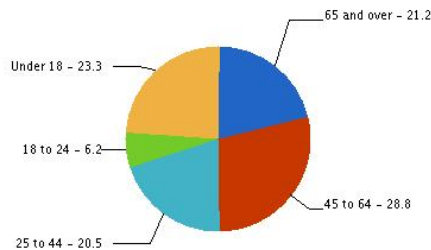

Age Distribution of People in Marshall County, Kansas in 2011-2015

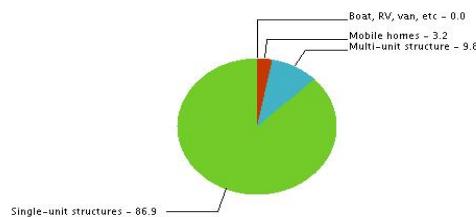

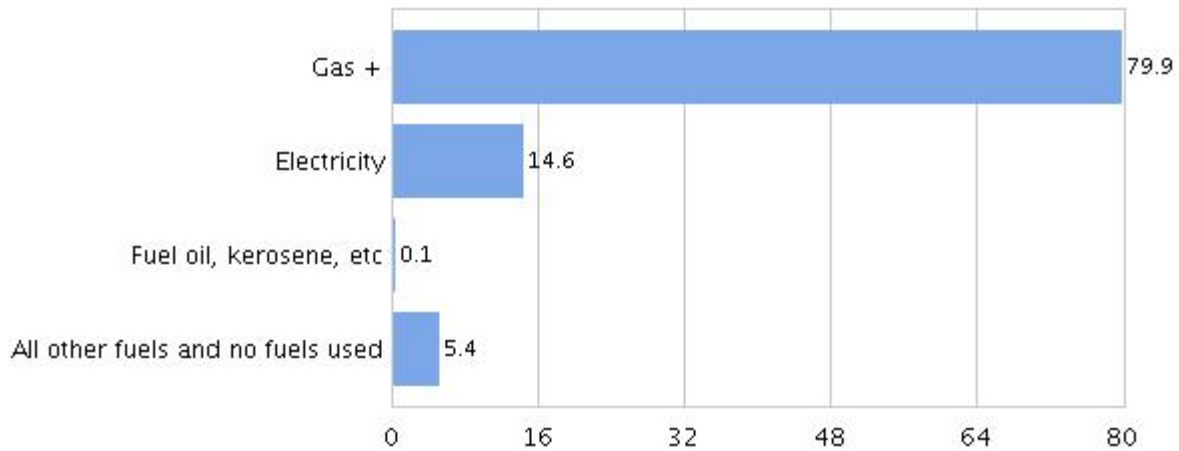

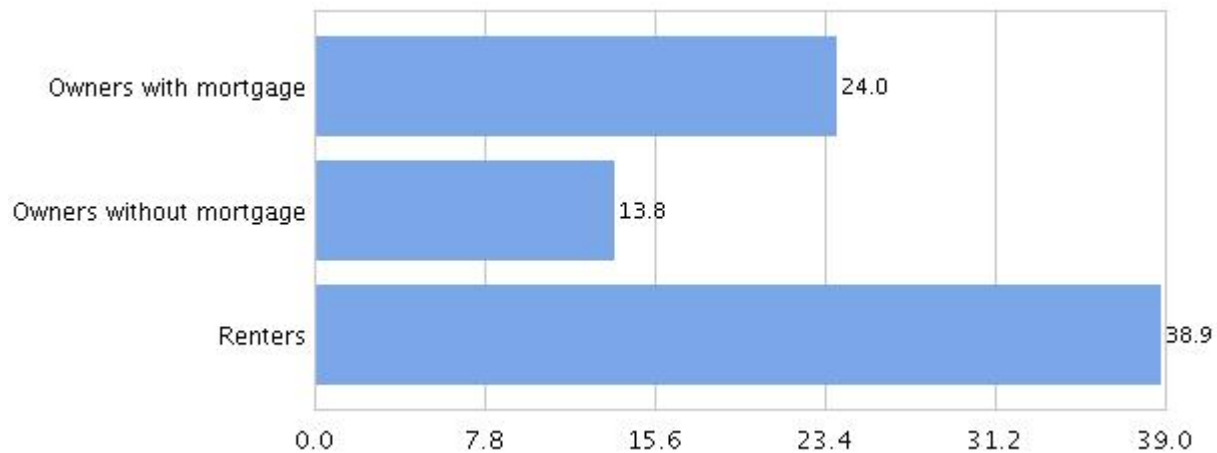

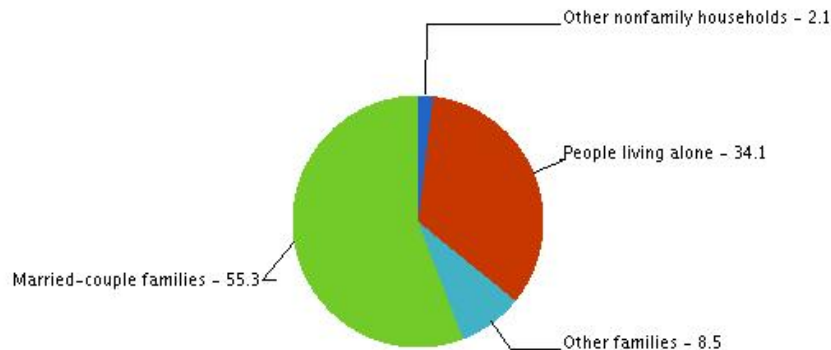

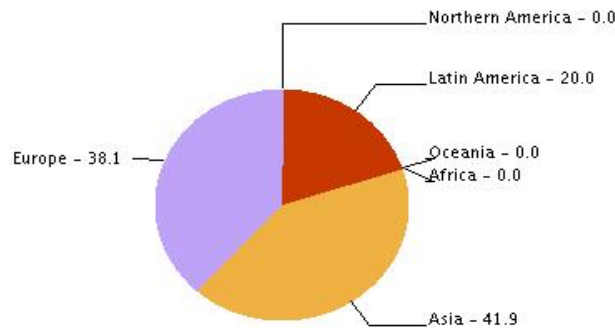

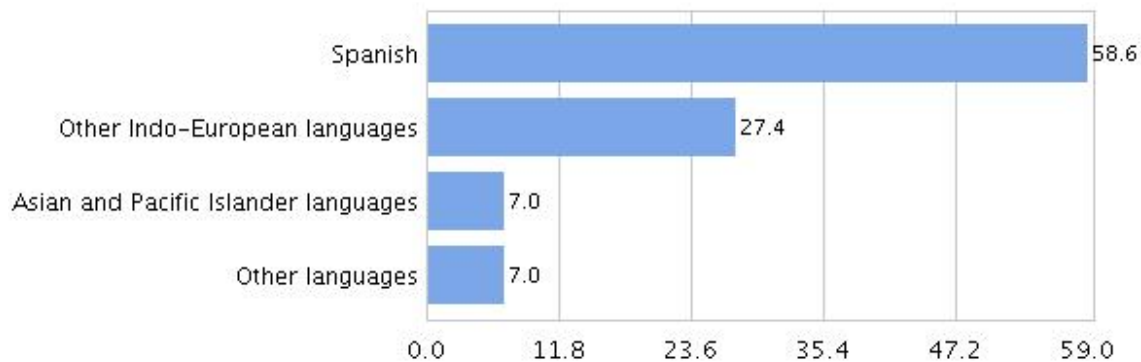
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

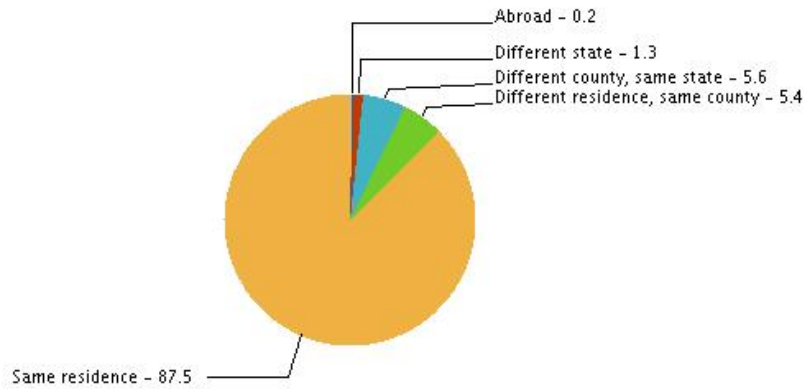
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

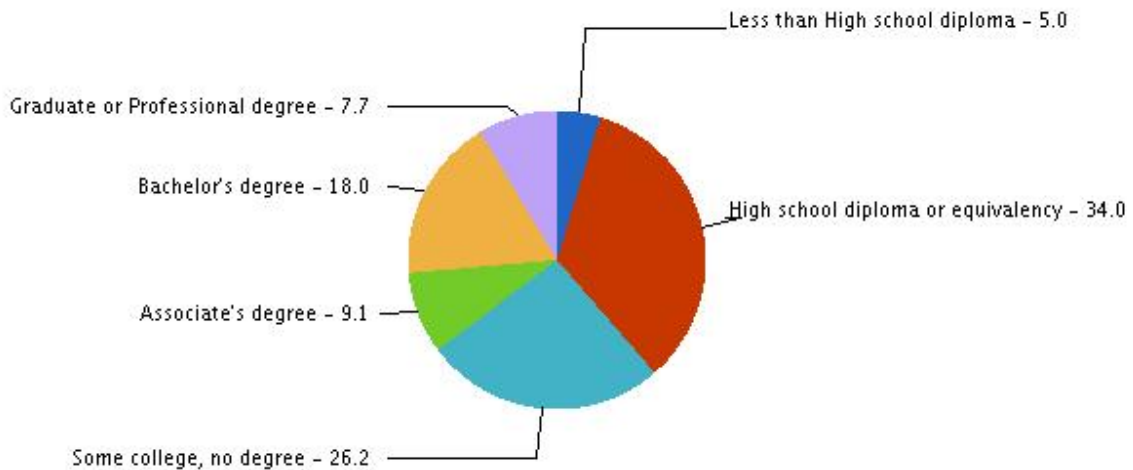

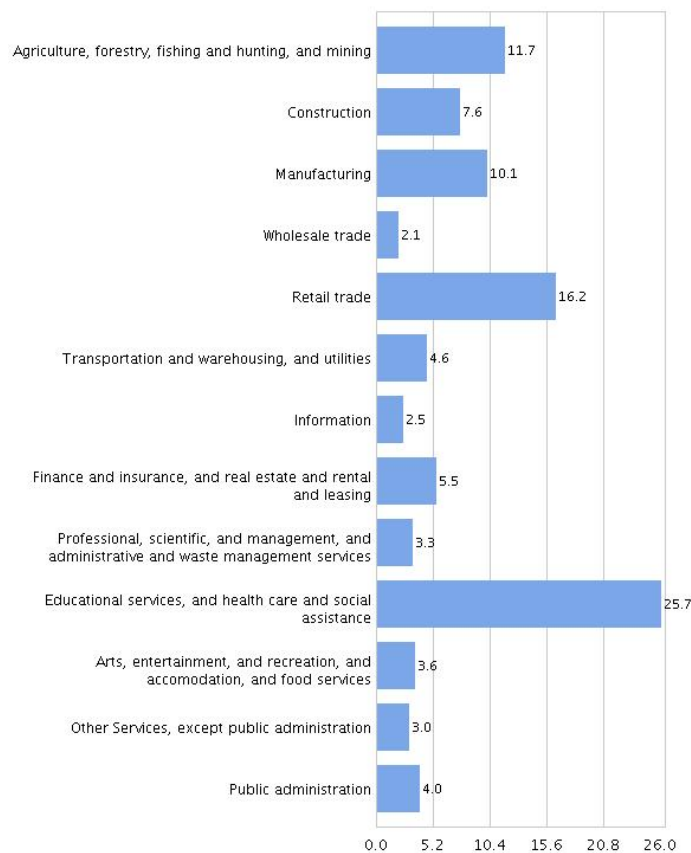

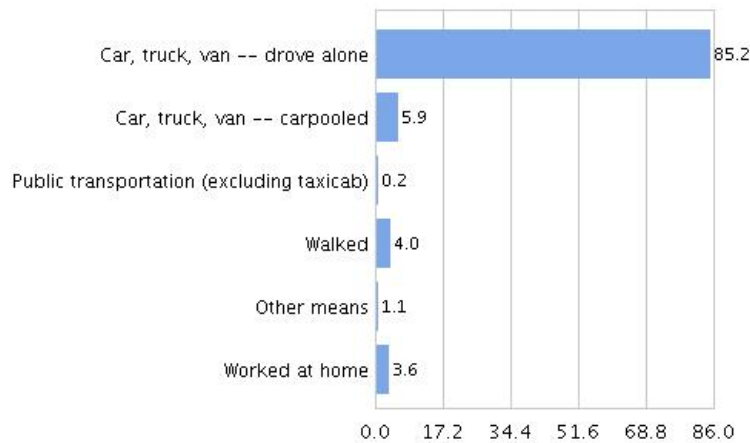

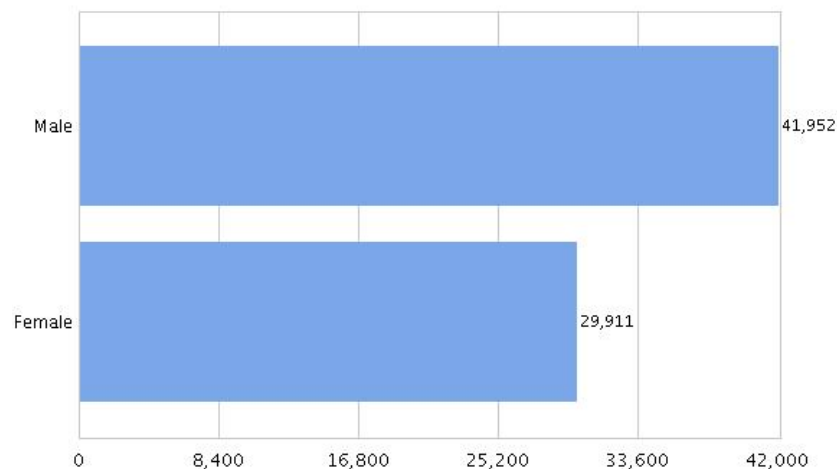
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

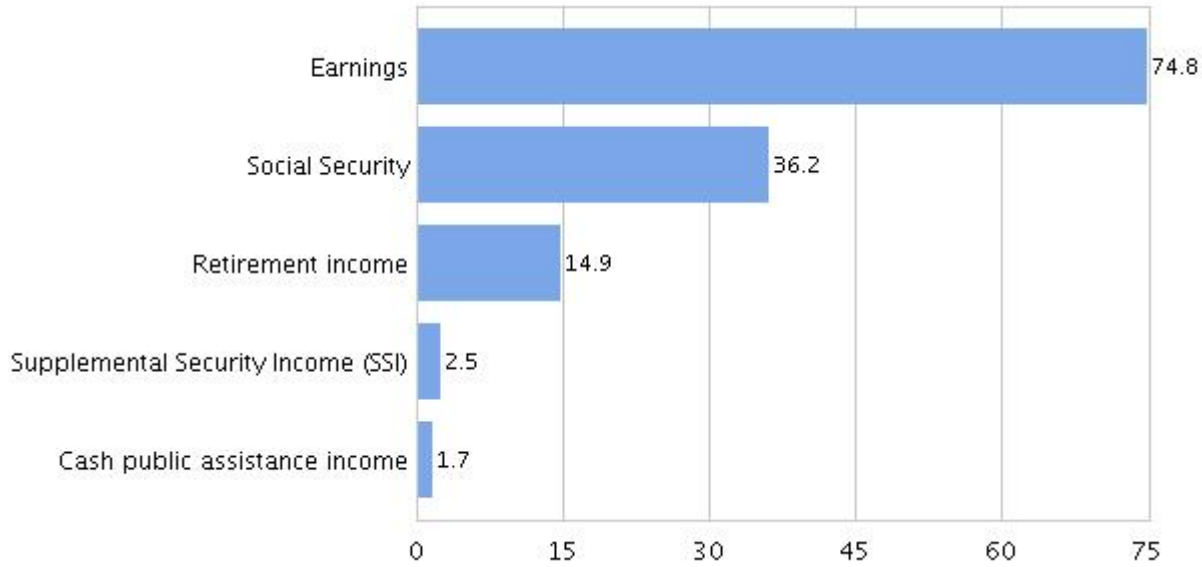

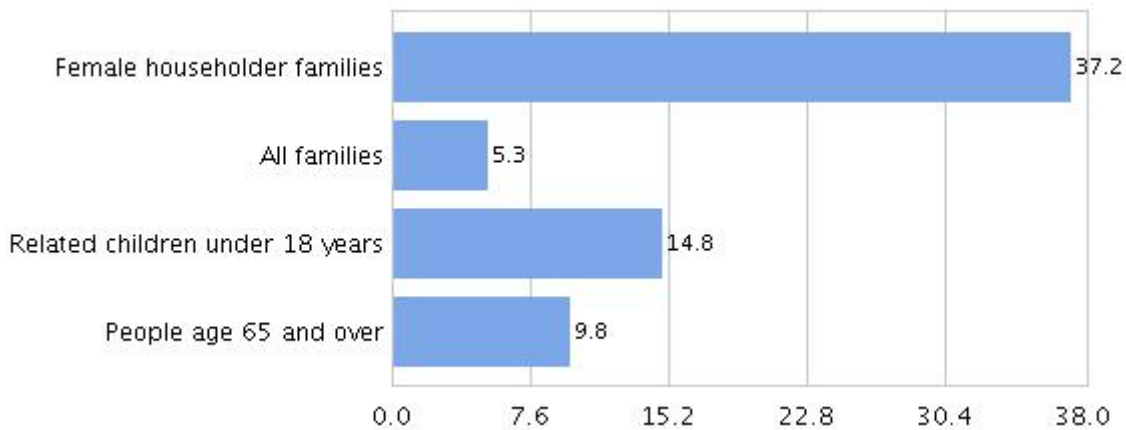
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015



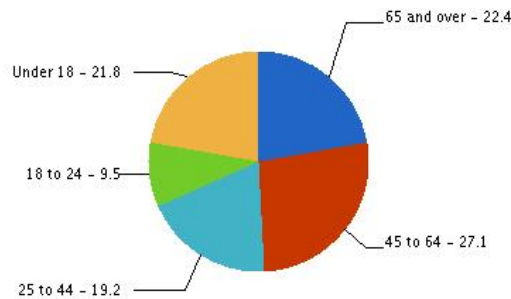

Age Distribution of People in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

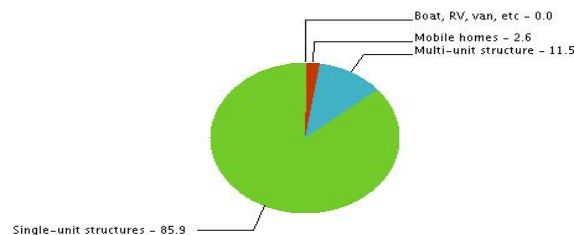

Types of Housing Units in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015



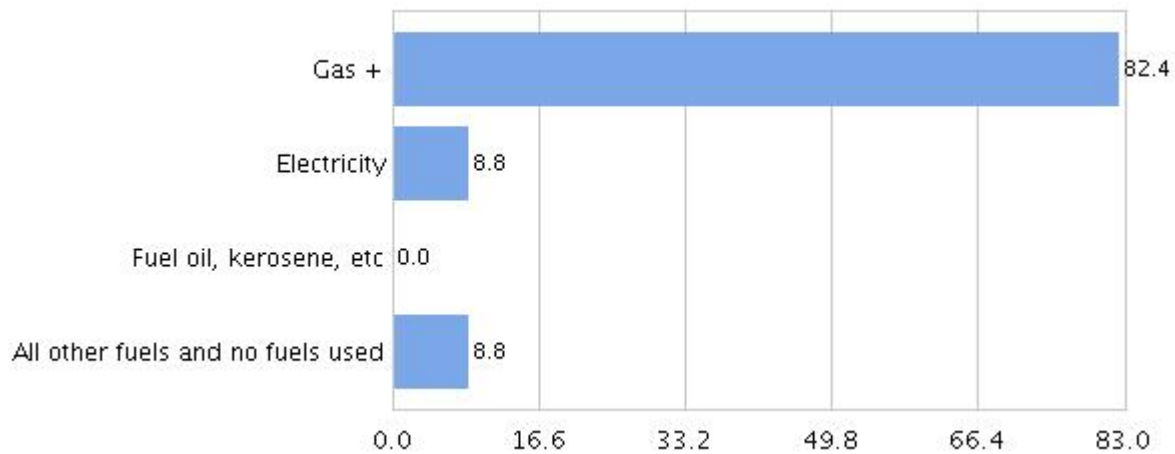

House heating fuel used in Mitchell County, Kansas in 2011-2015

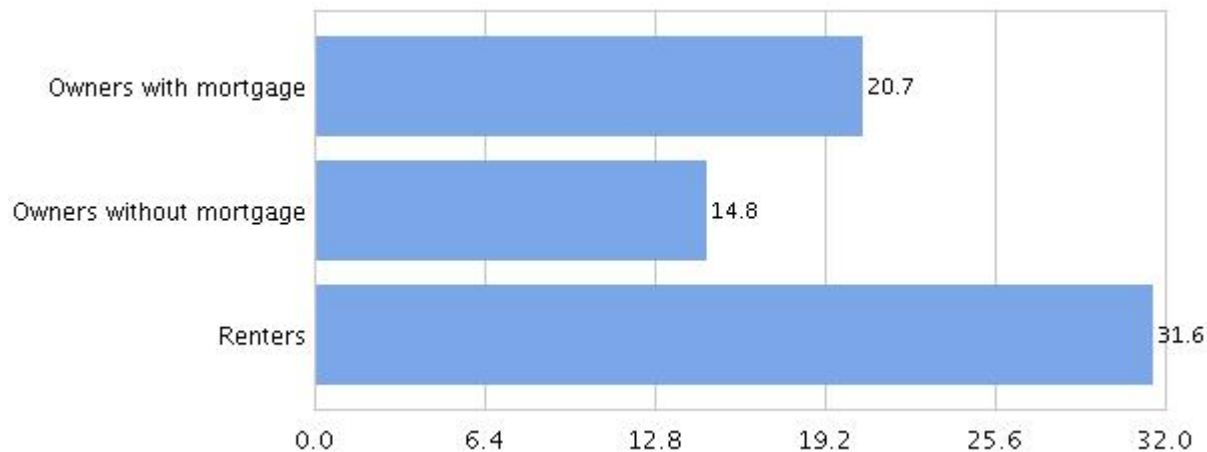

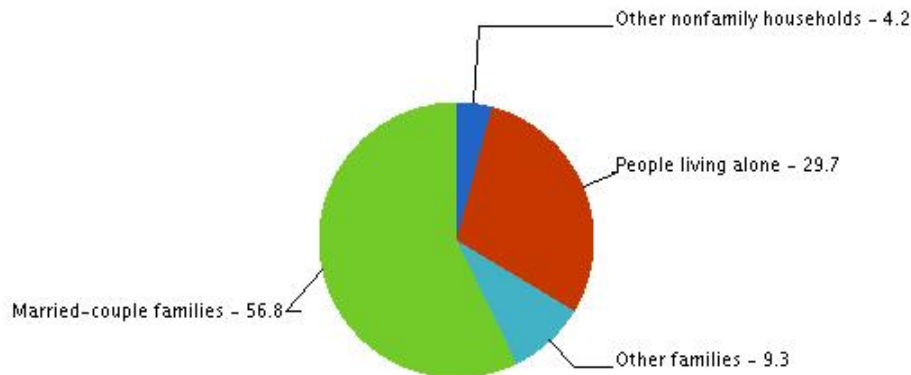

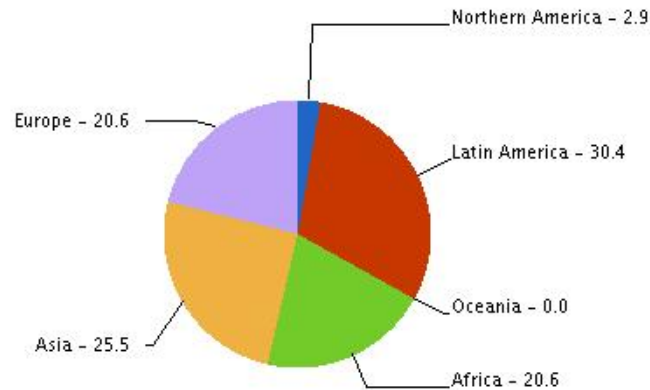

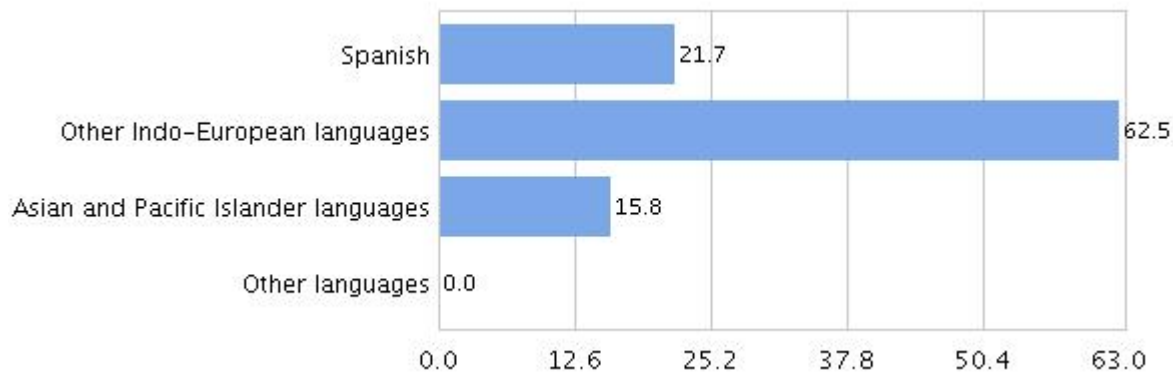
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

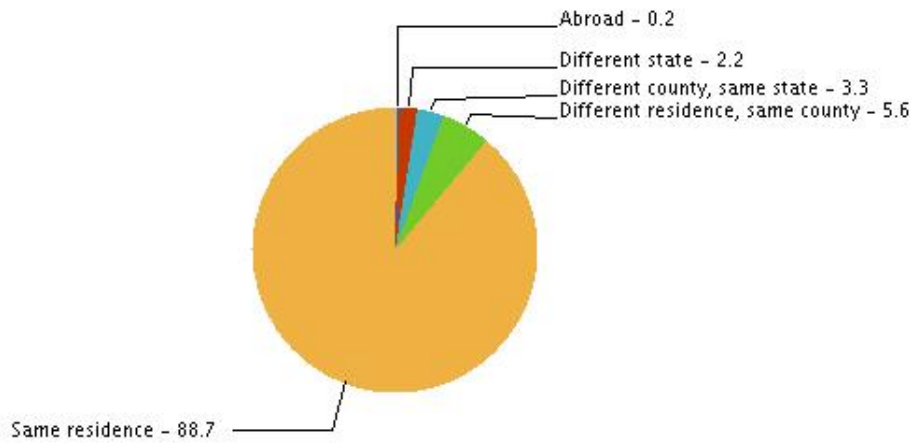
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

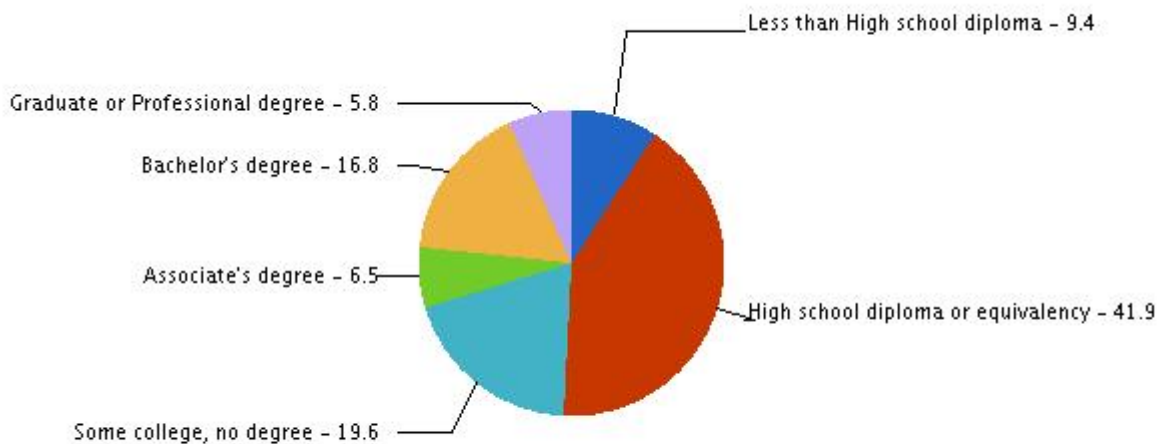

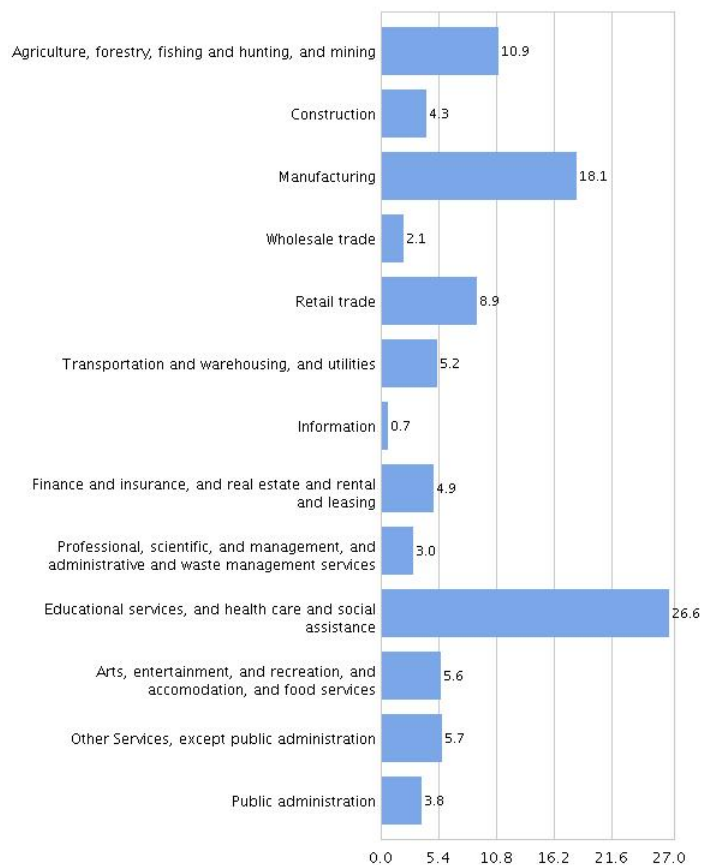

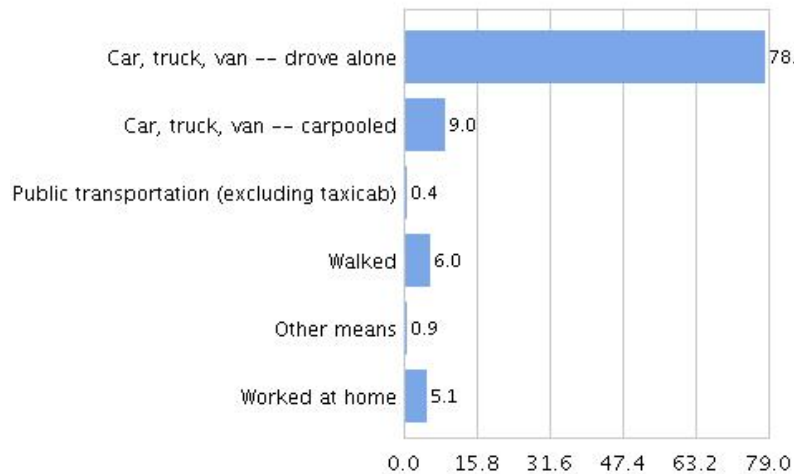

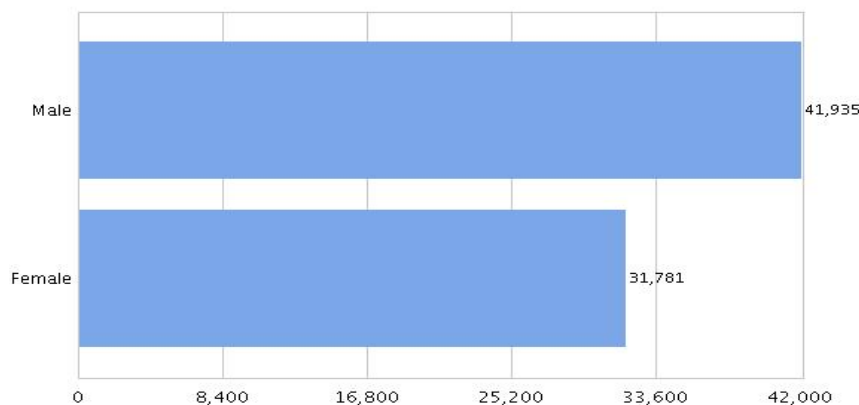
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

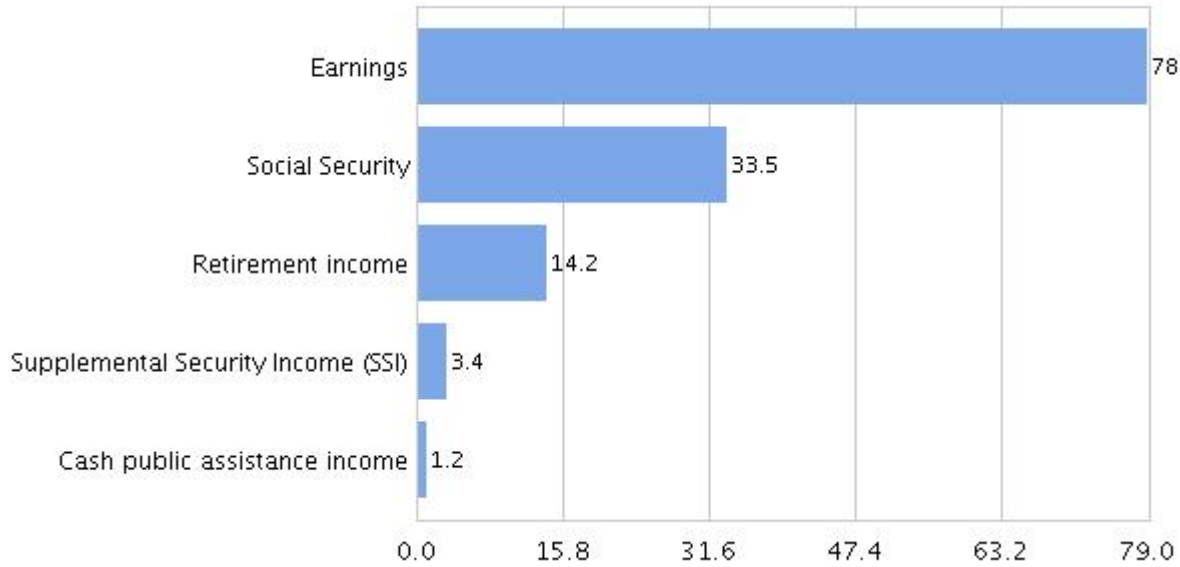

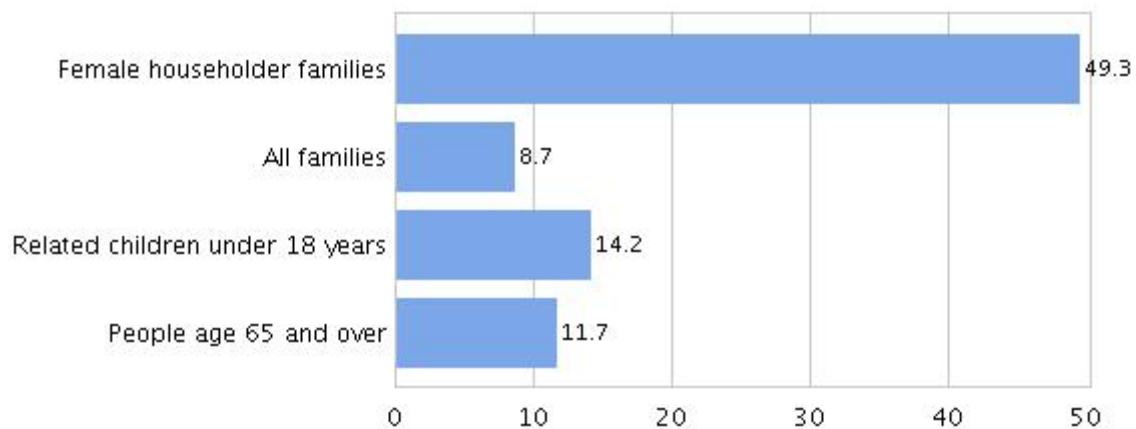
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015



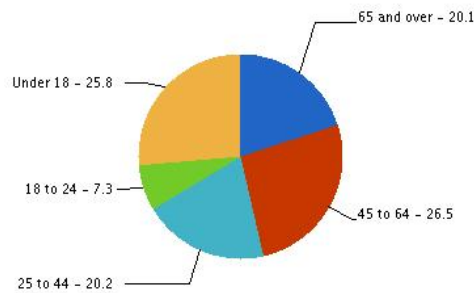

Age Distribution of People in Nemaha County, Kansas in 2011-2015

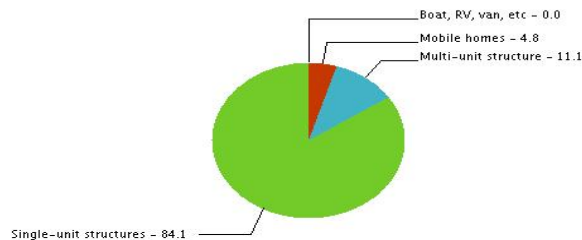

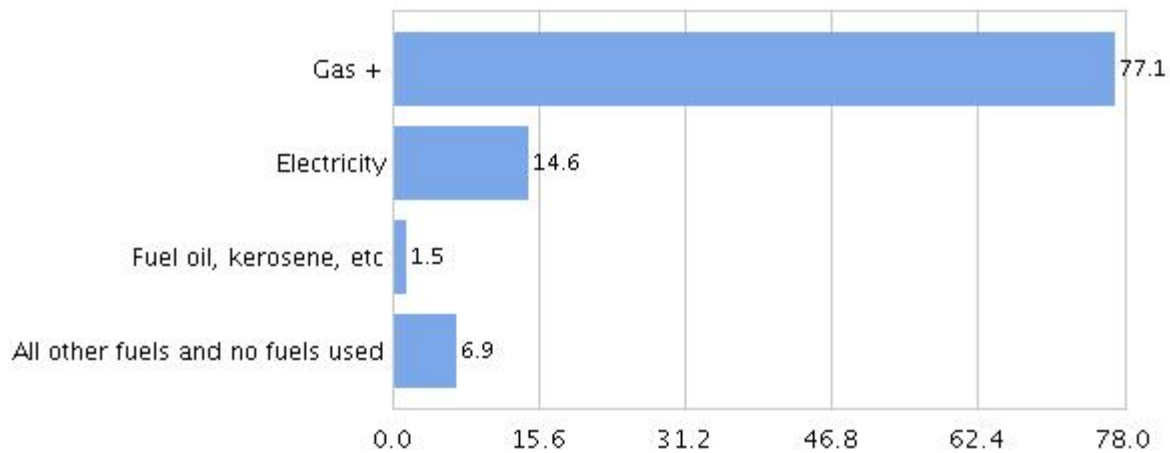

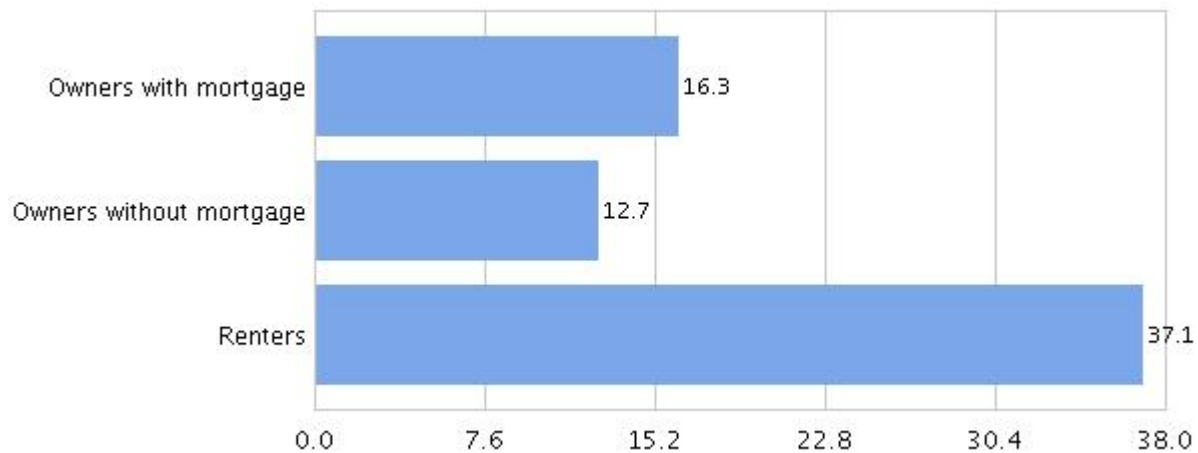

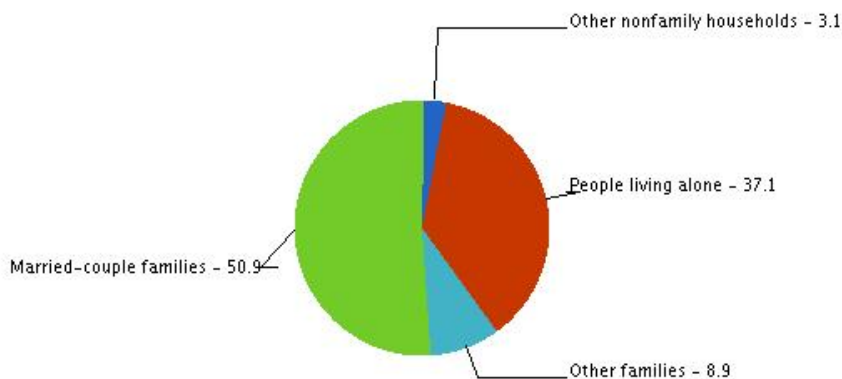

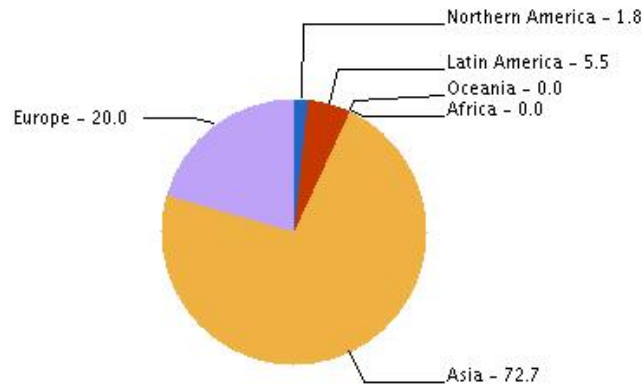

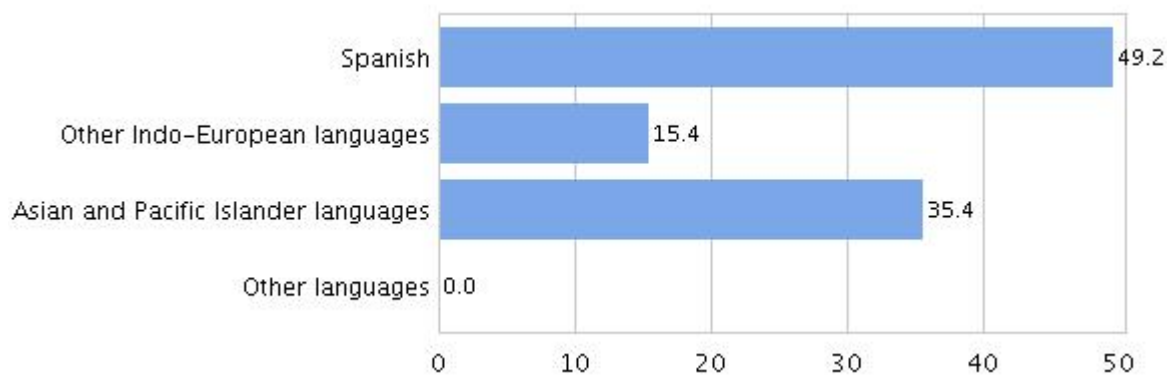
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

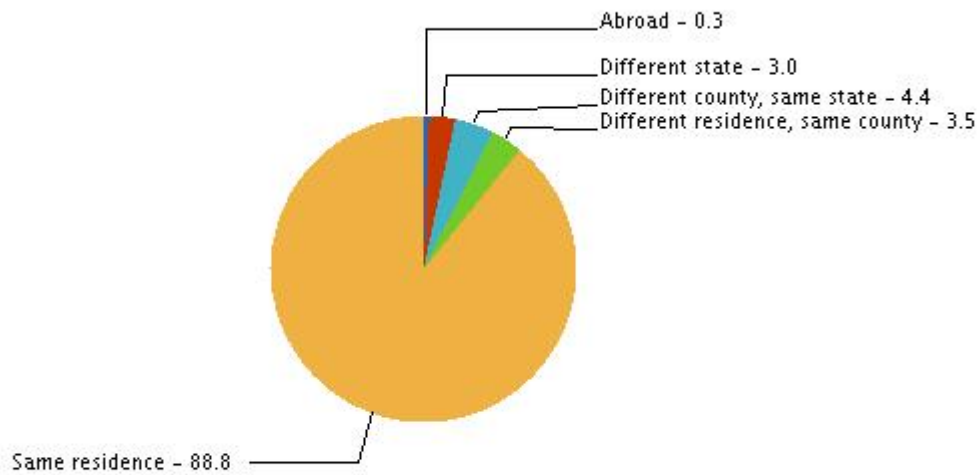
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

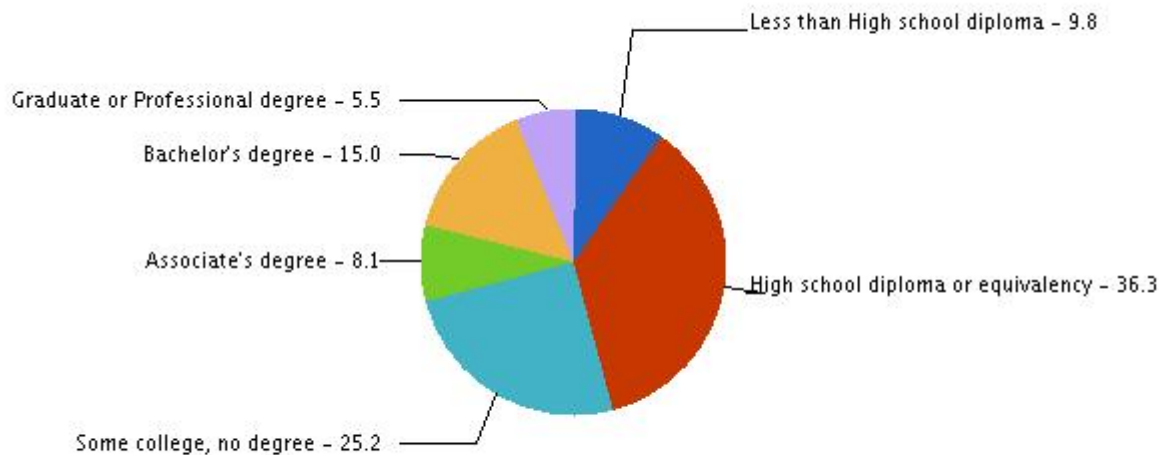

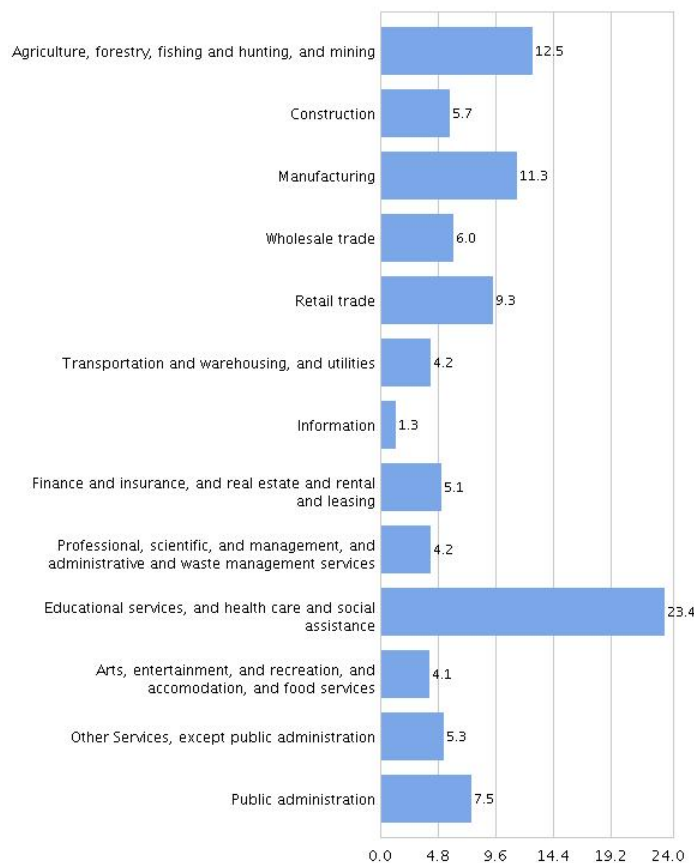

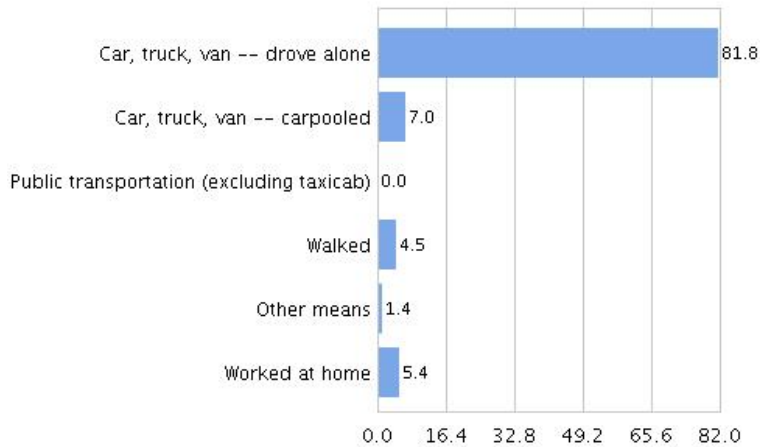

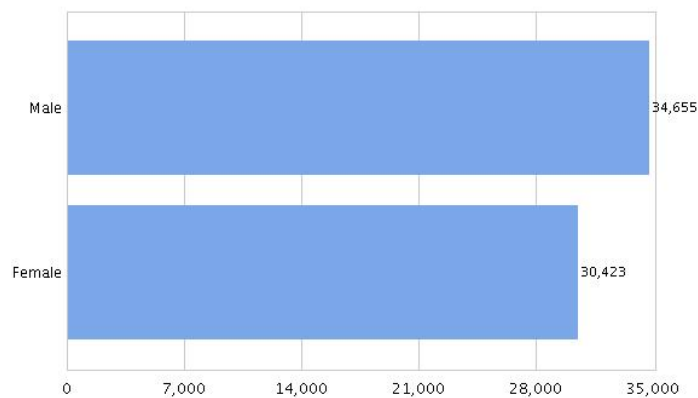
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

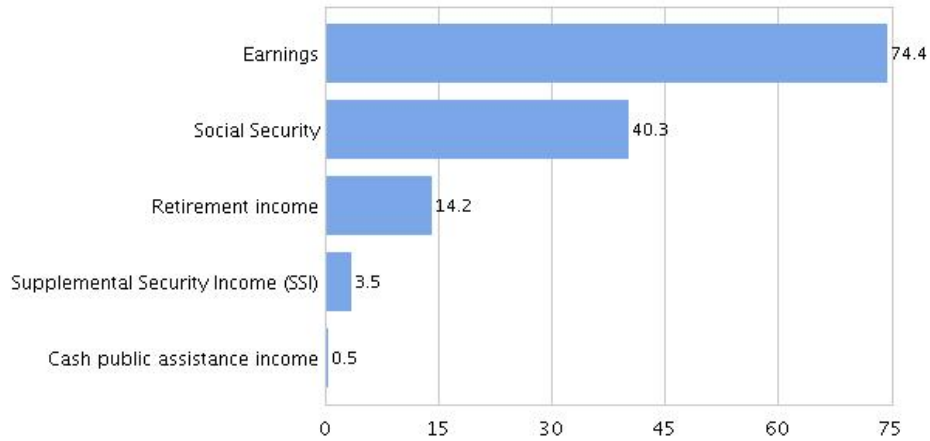

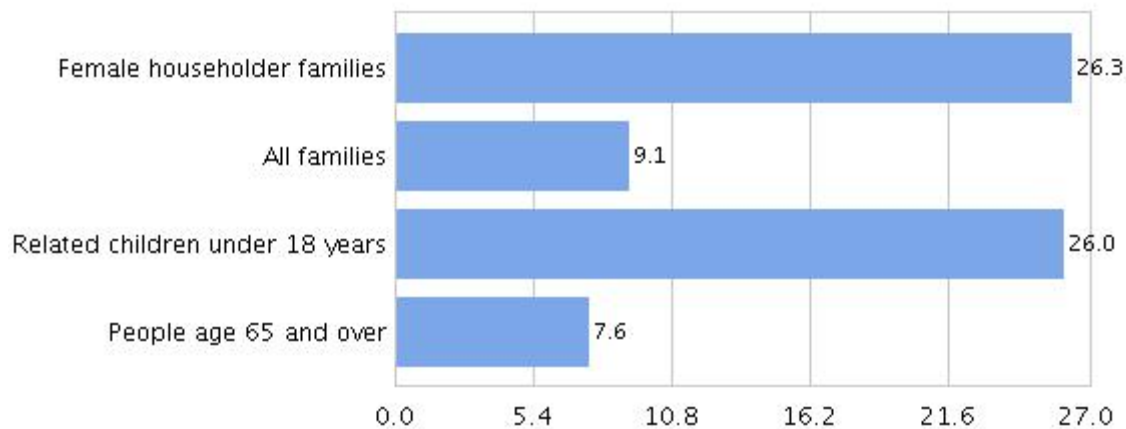
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015



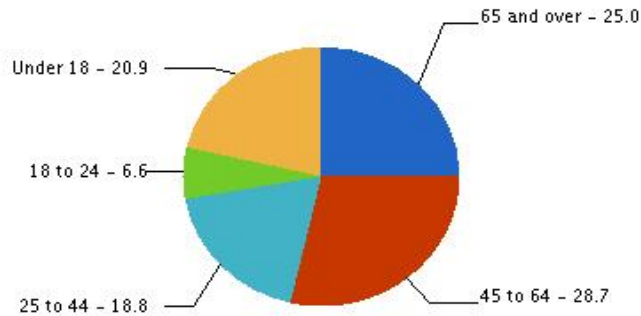

Age Distribution of People in Osborne County, Kansas in 2011-2015

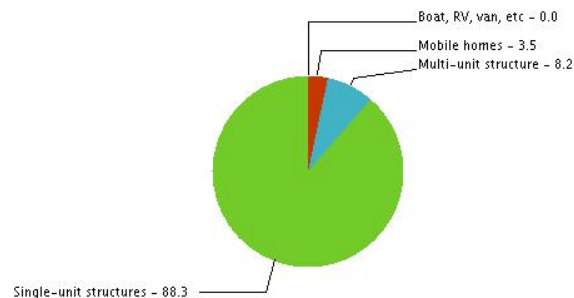

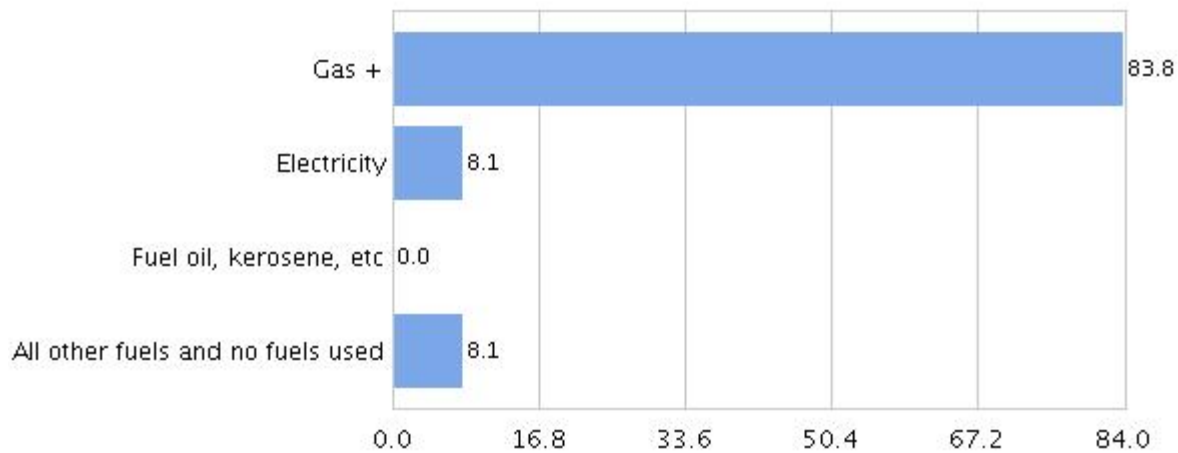

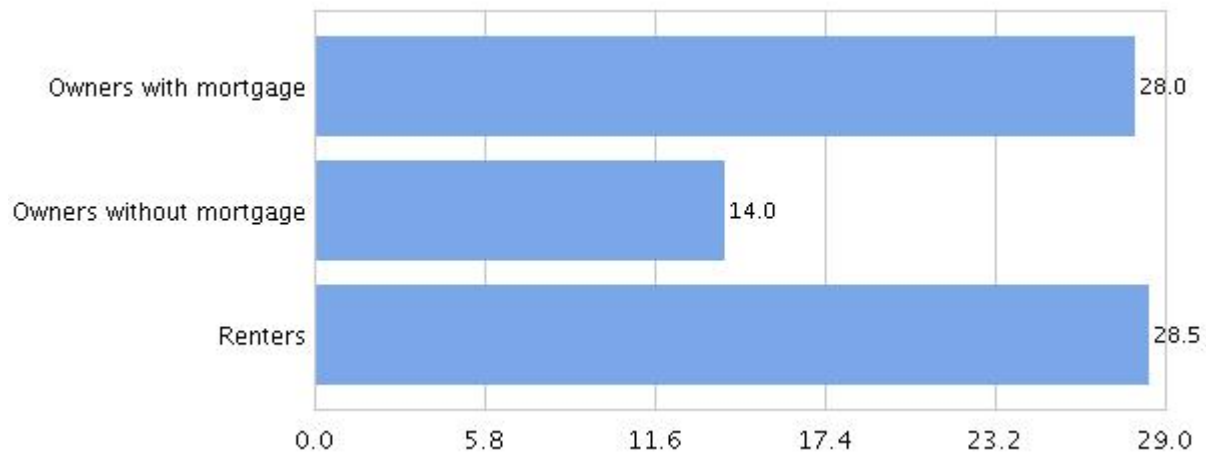

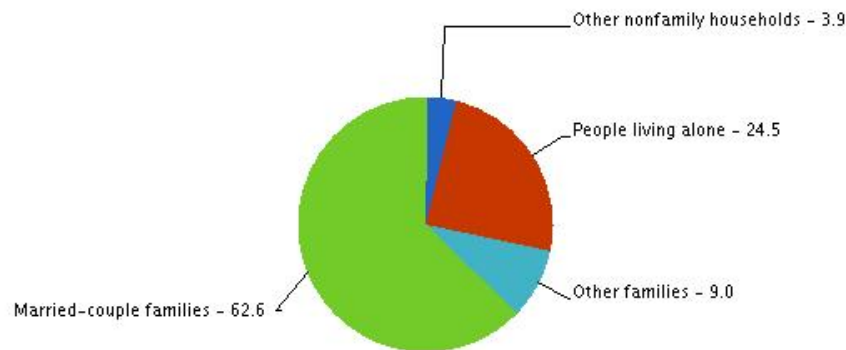

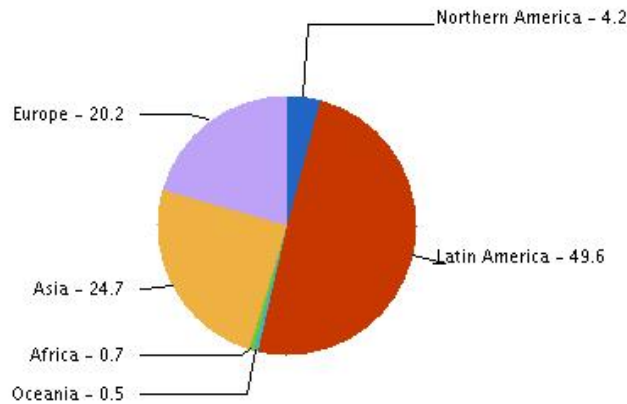

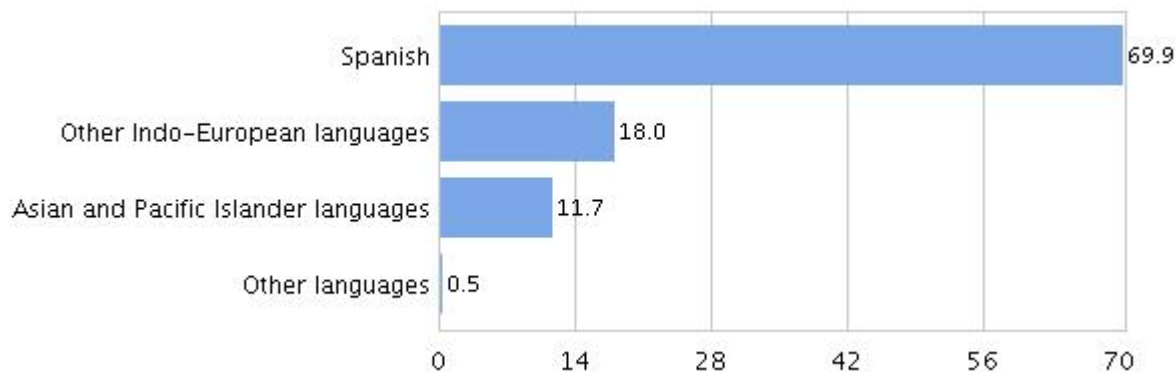
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

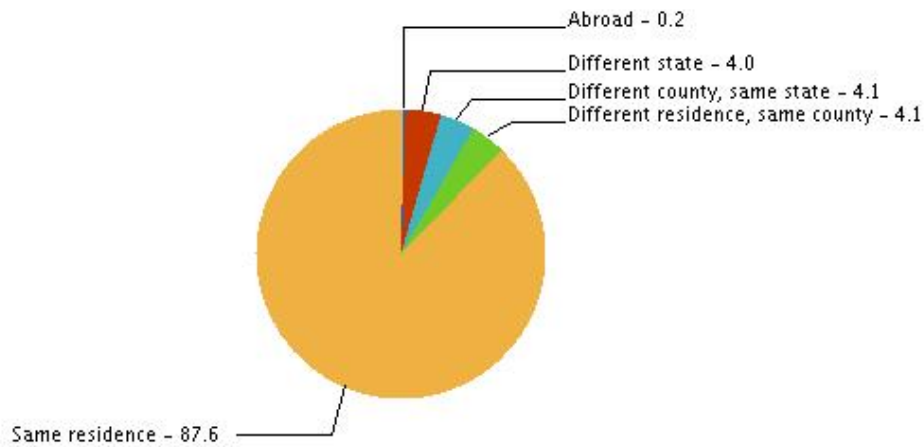
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

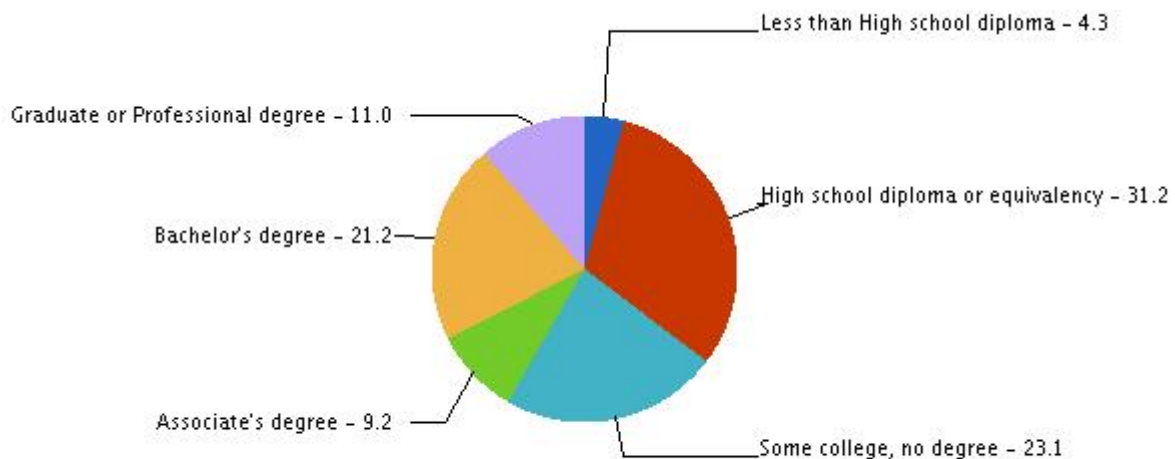

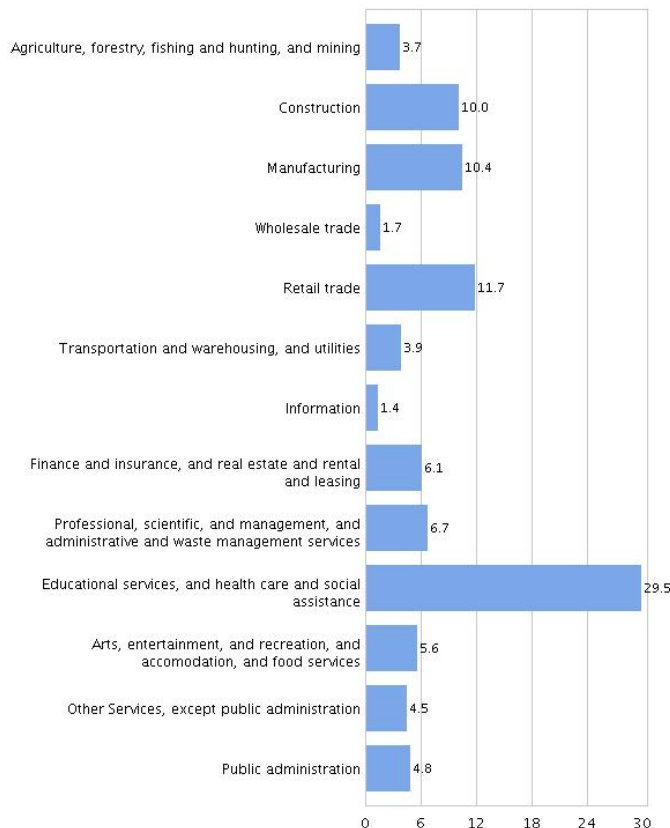

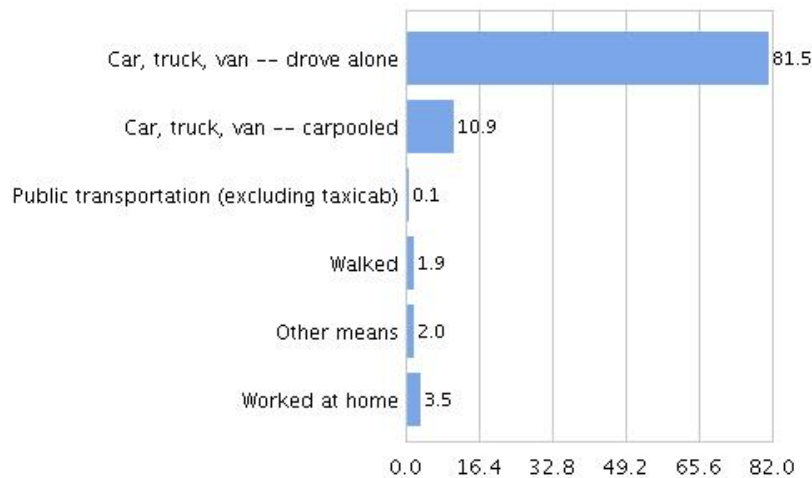

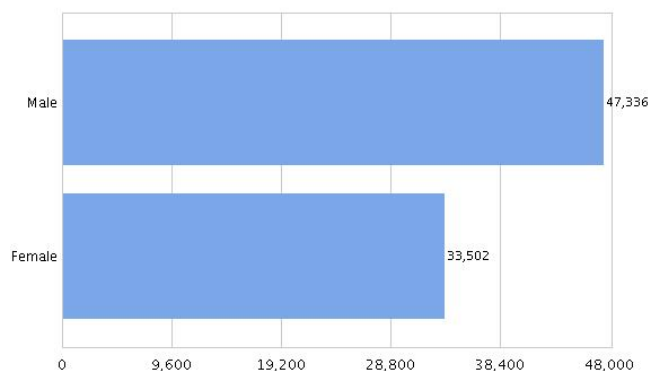
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

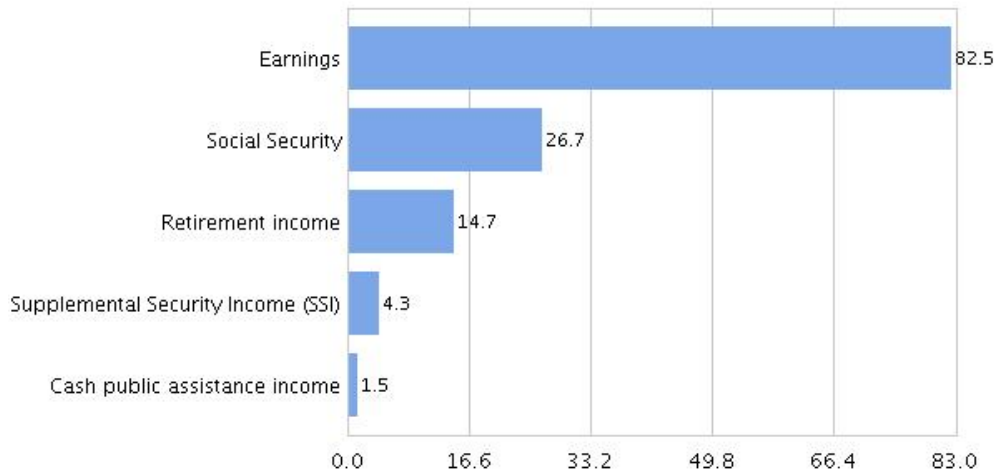

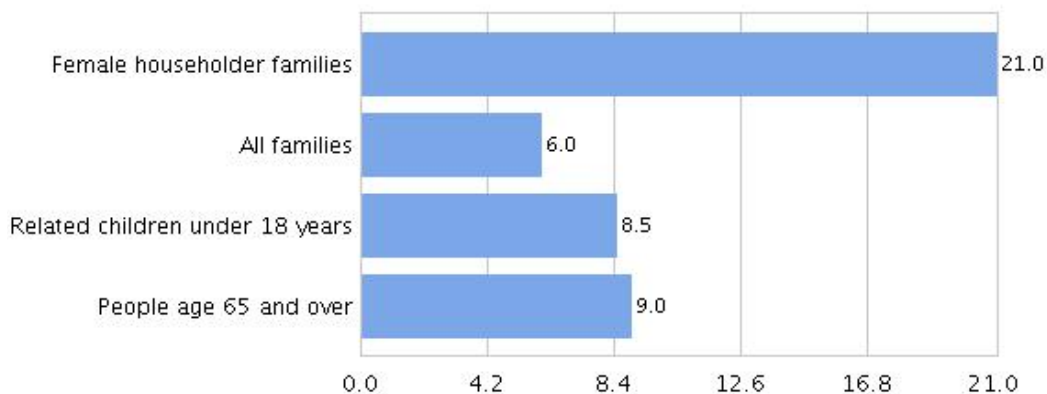
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015



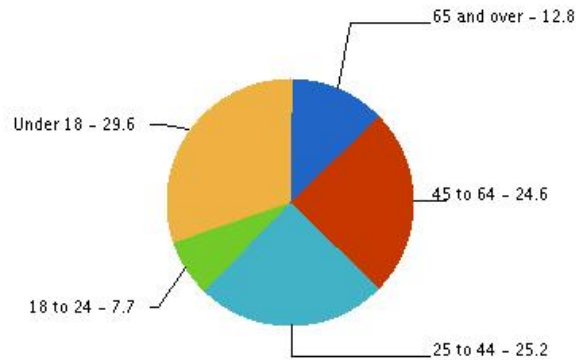

Age Distribution of People in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

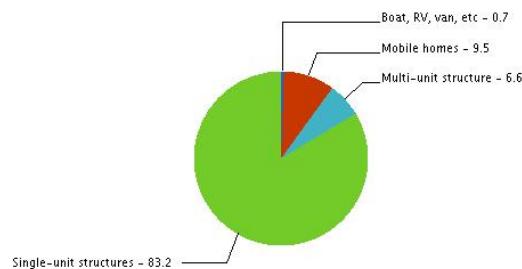

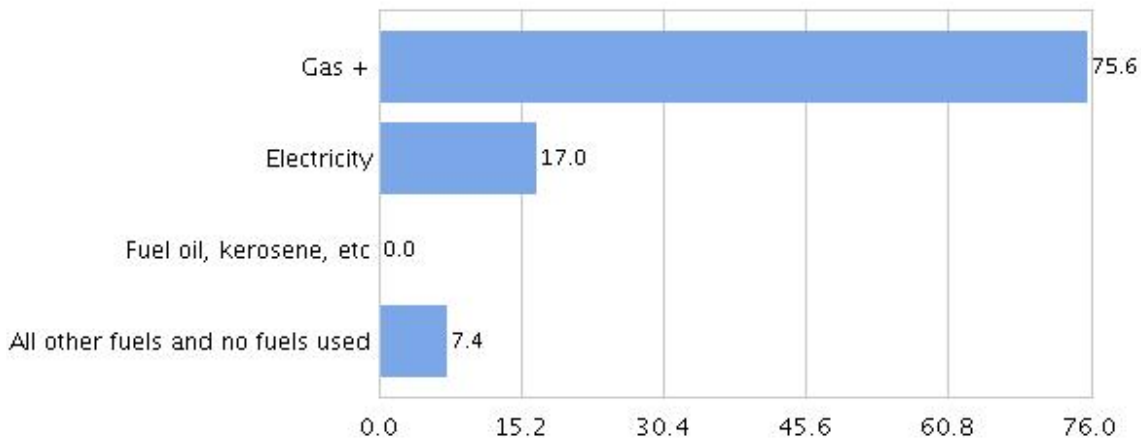

House heating fuel used in Pottawatomie County, Kansas in 2011-2015

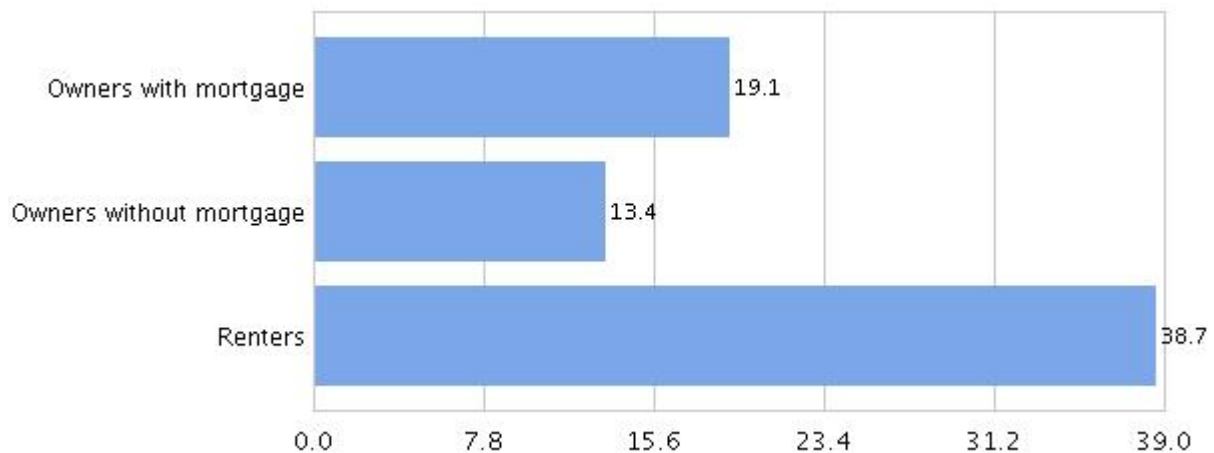

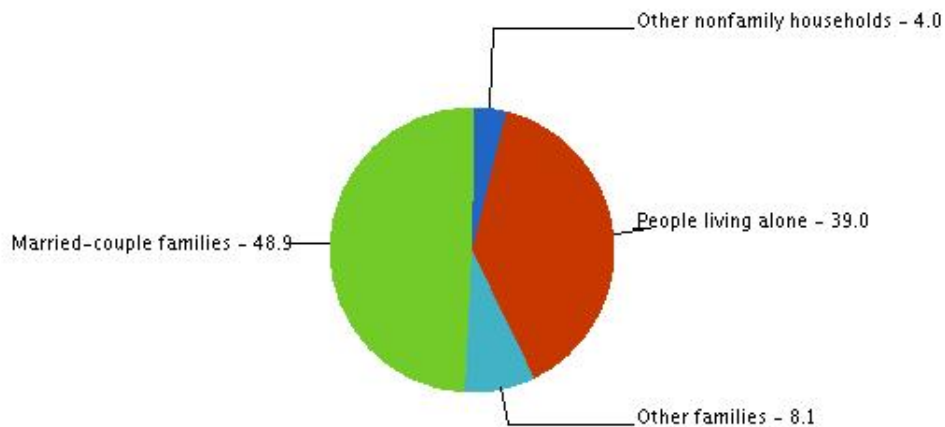

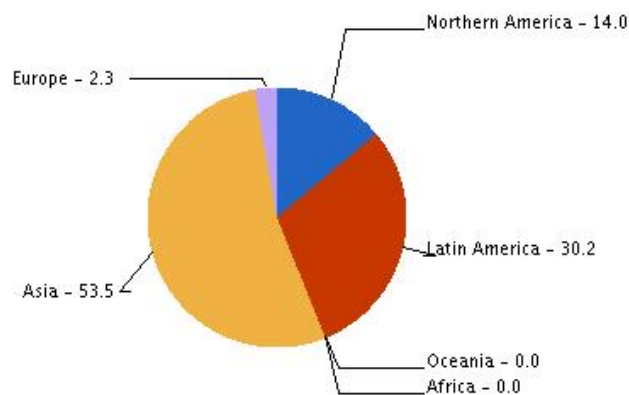

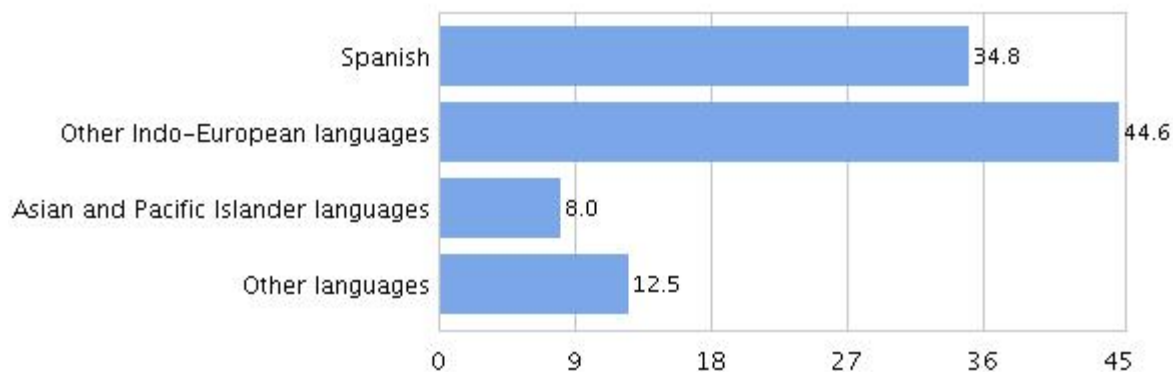
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

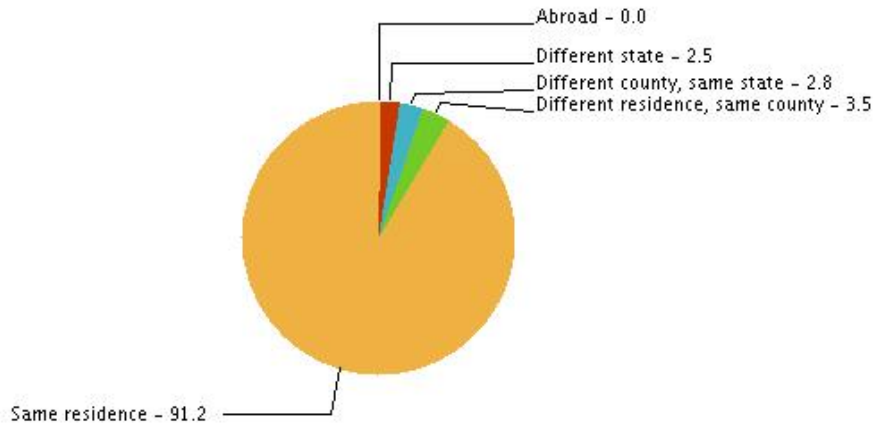
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

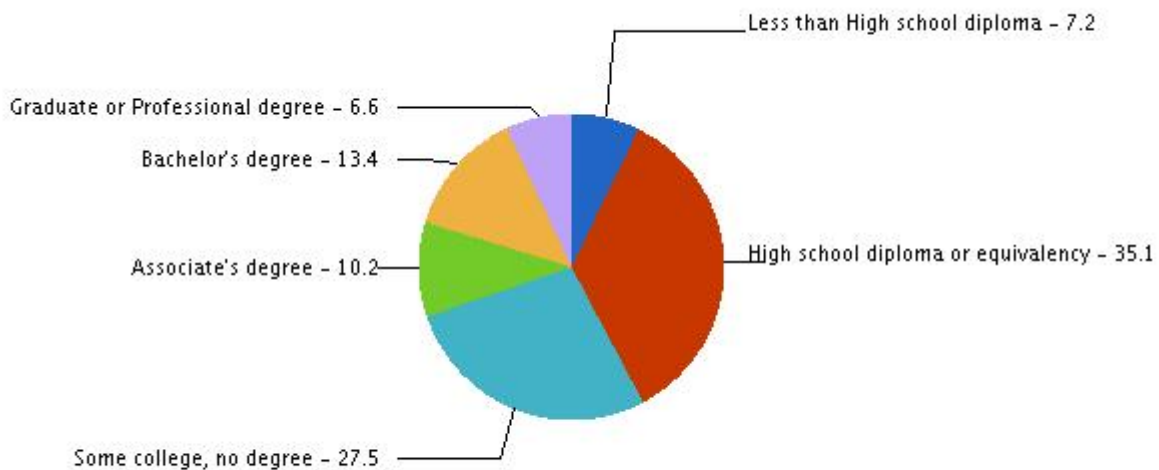

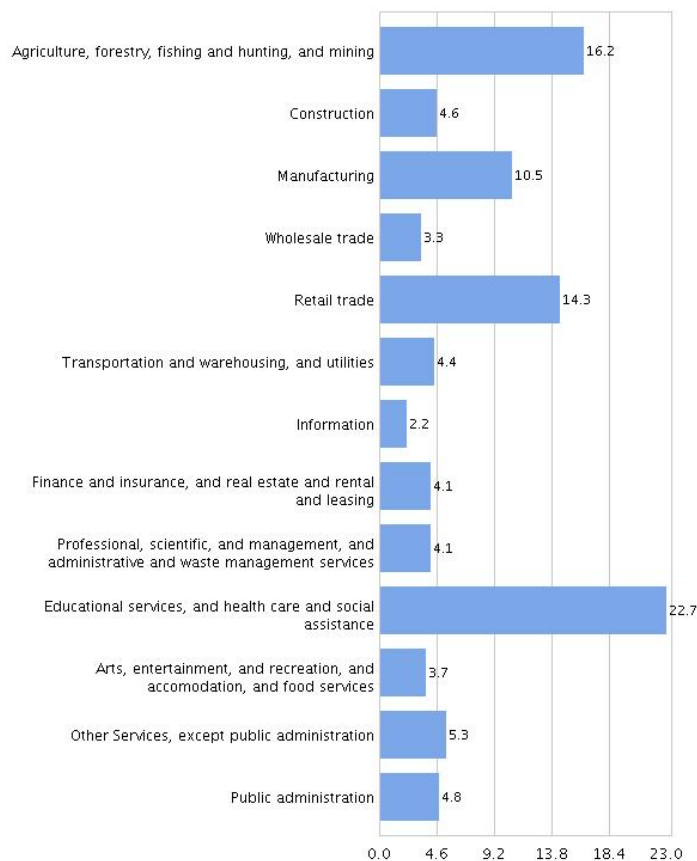

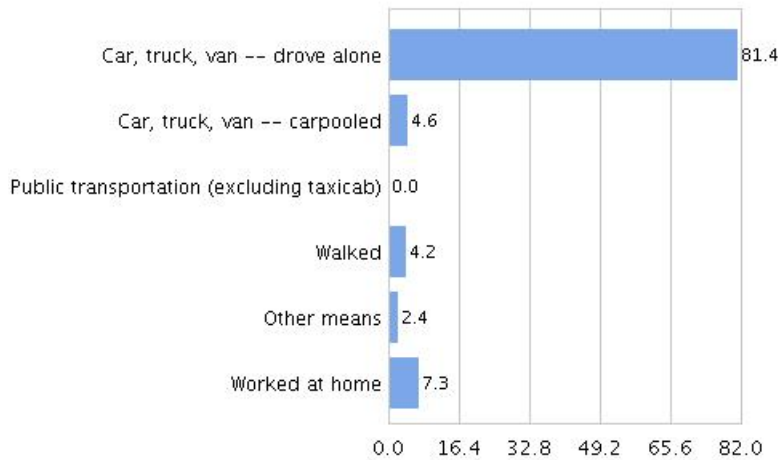

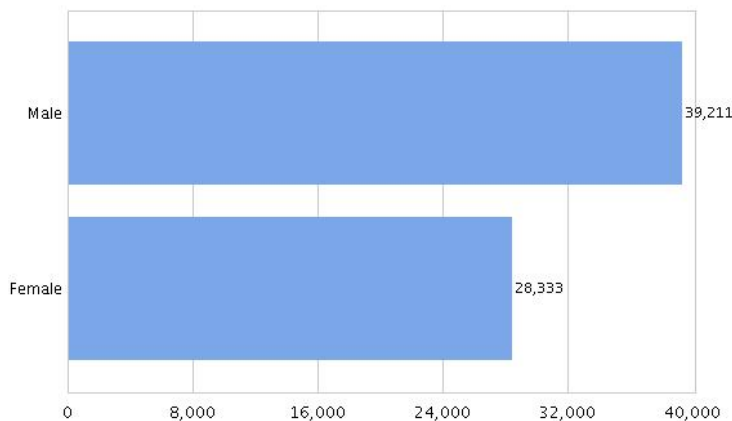
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

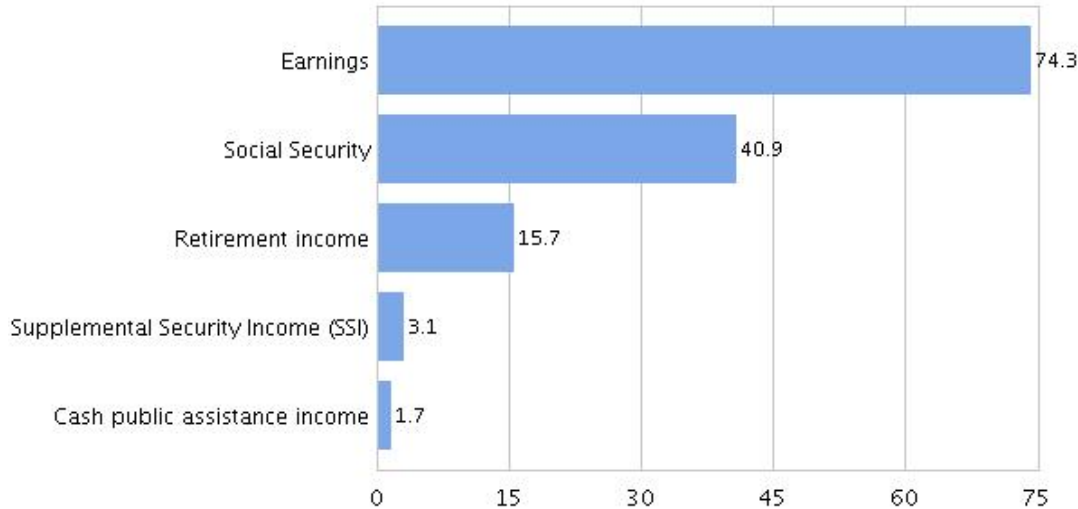

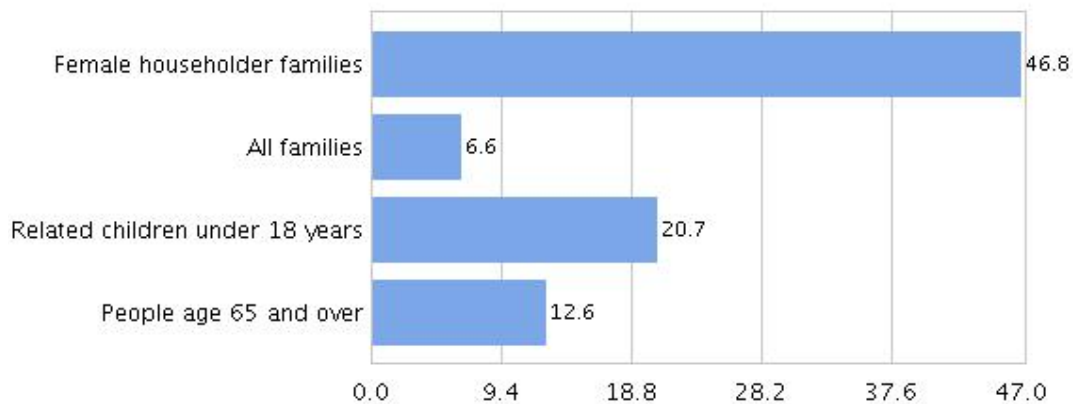
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015



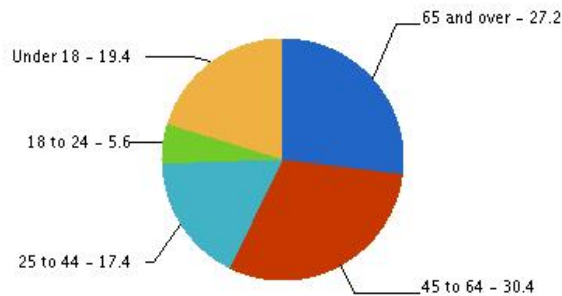

Age Distribution of People in Republic County, Kansas in 2011-2015

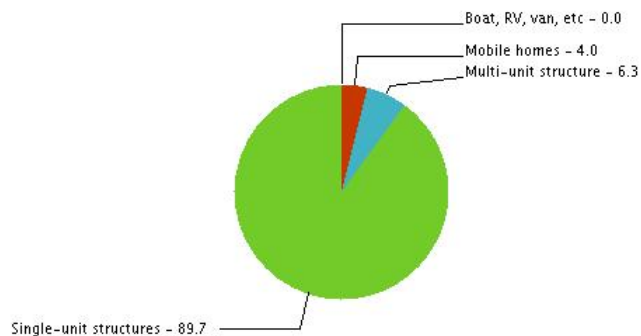

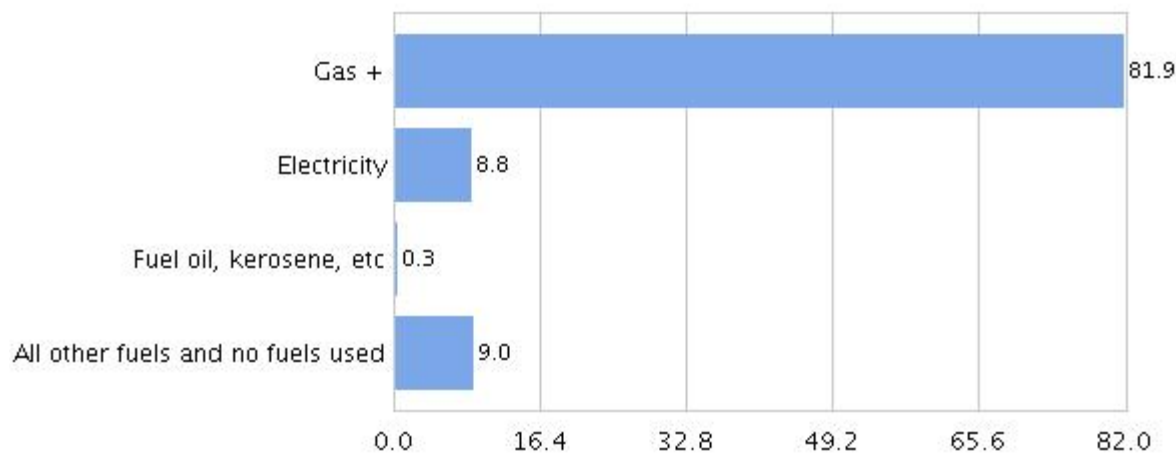

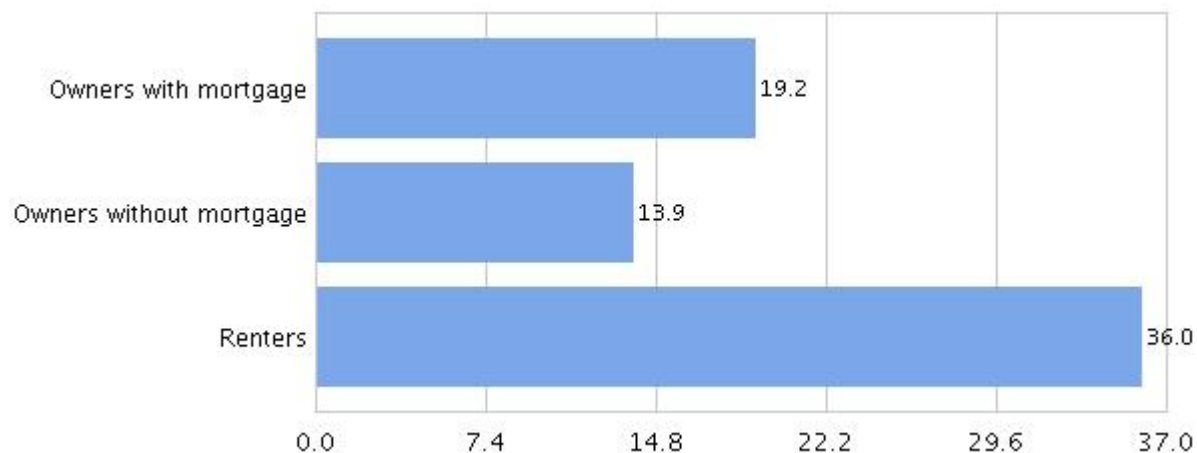

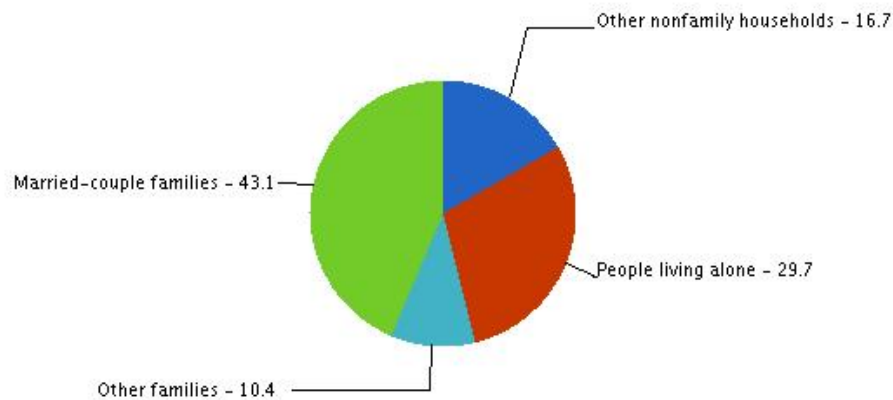

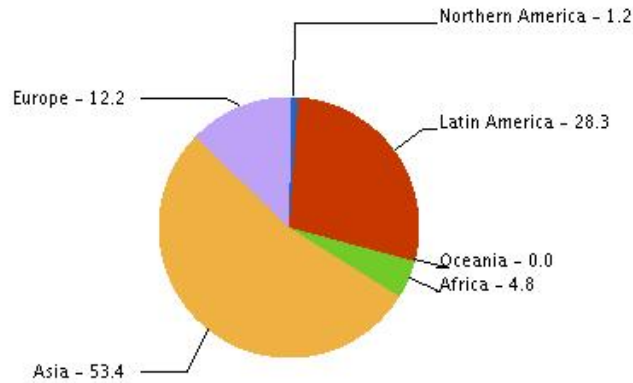

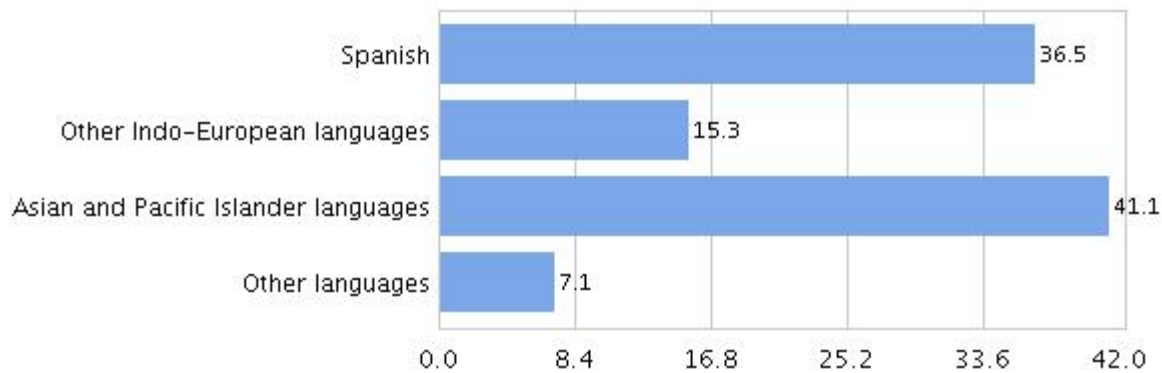
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015

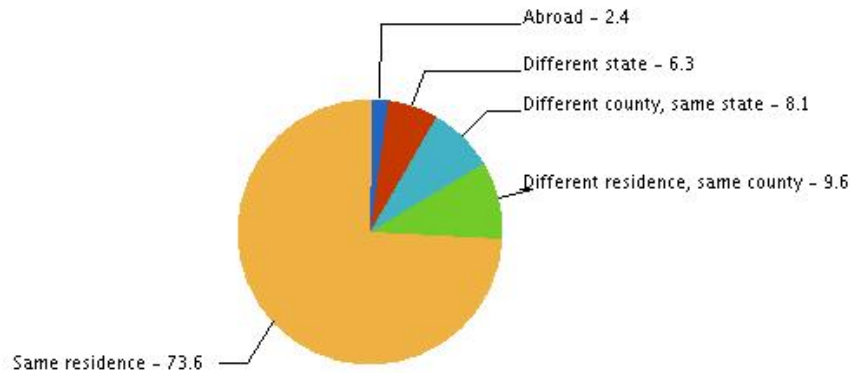
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-20

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015

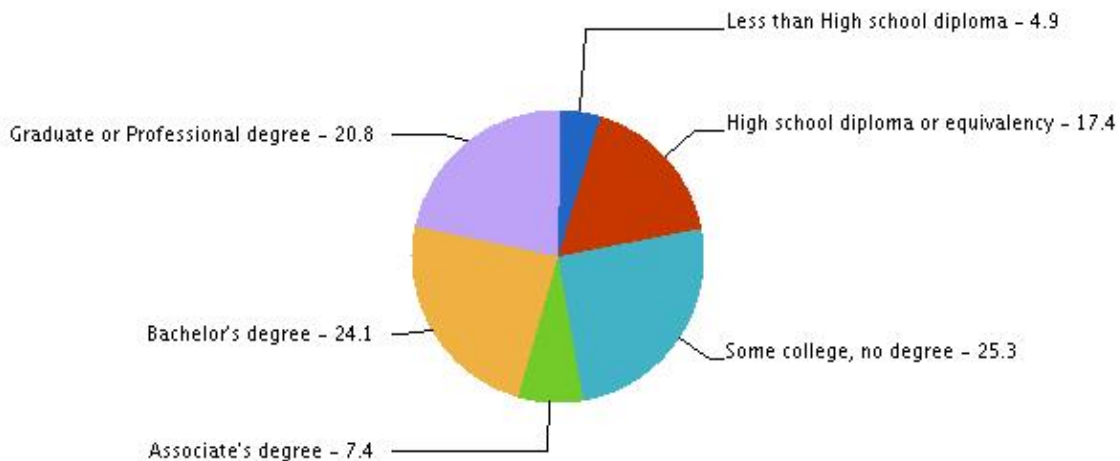

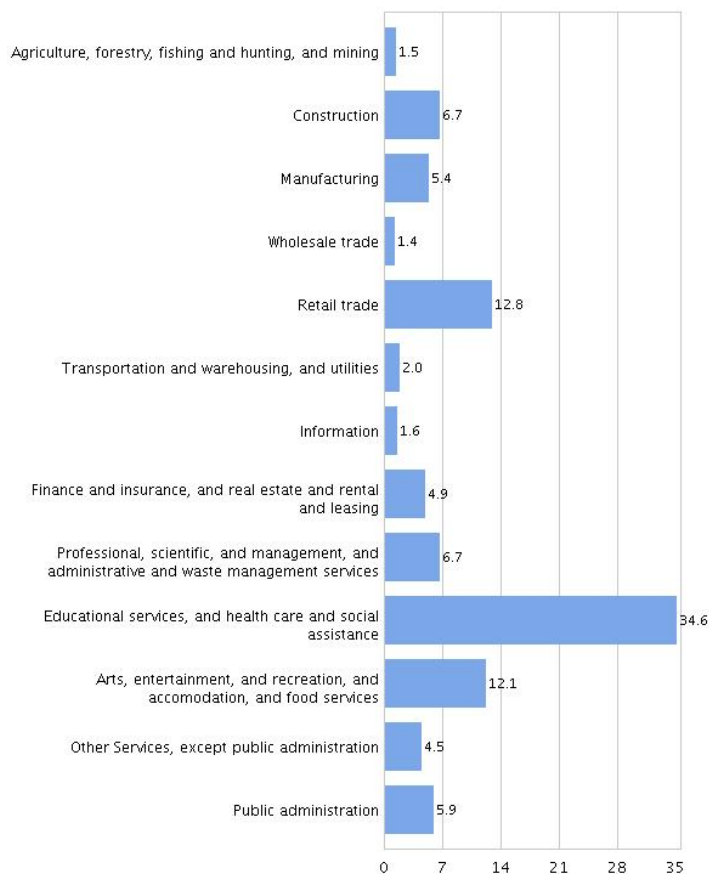

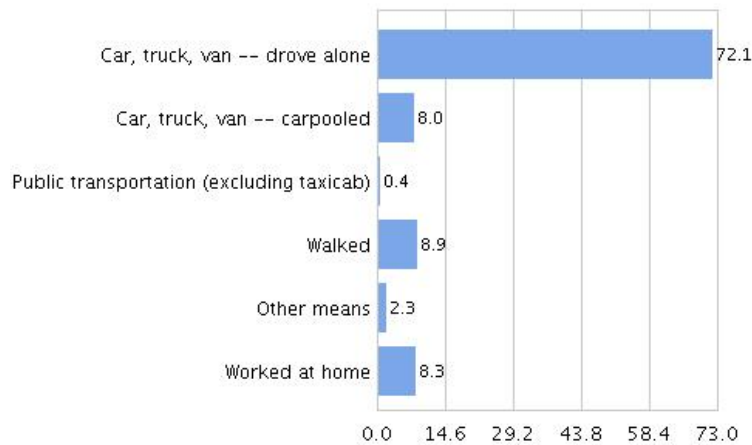

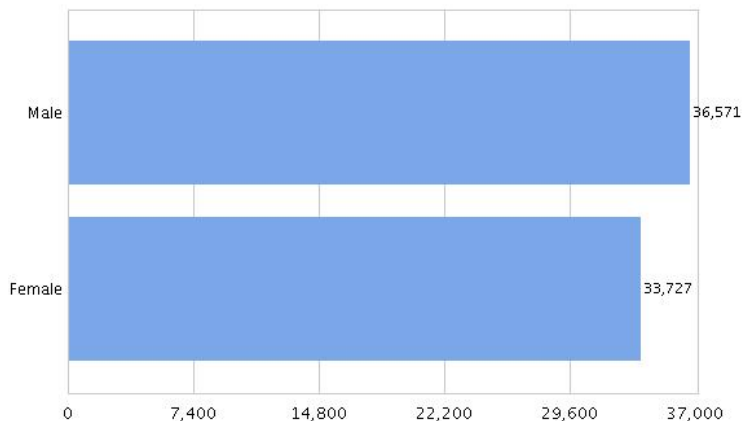
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015

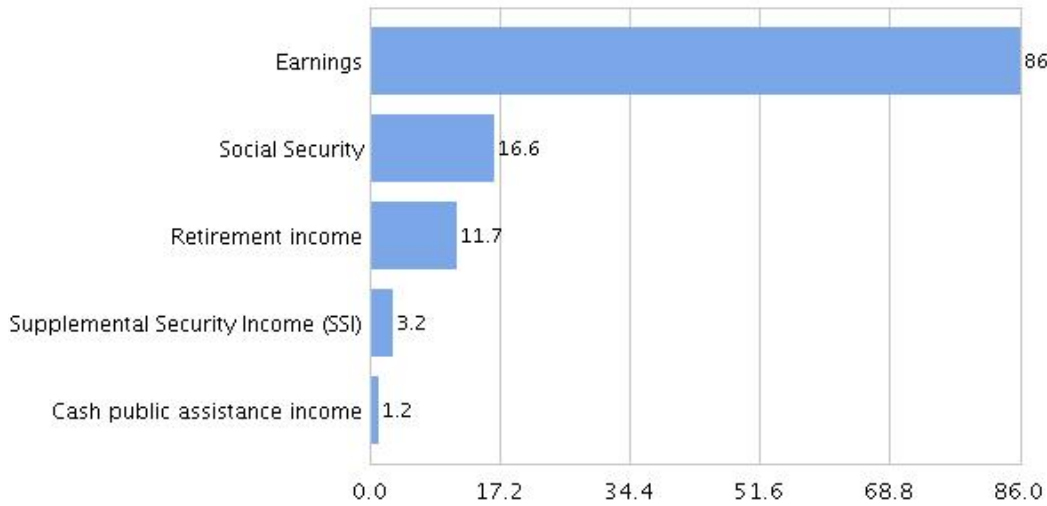

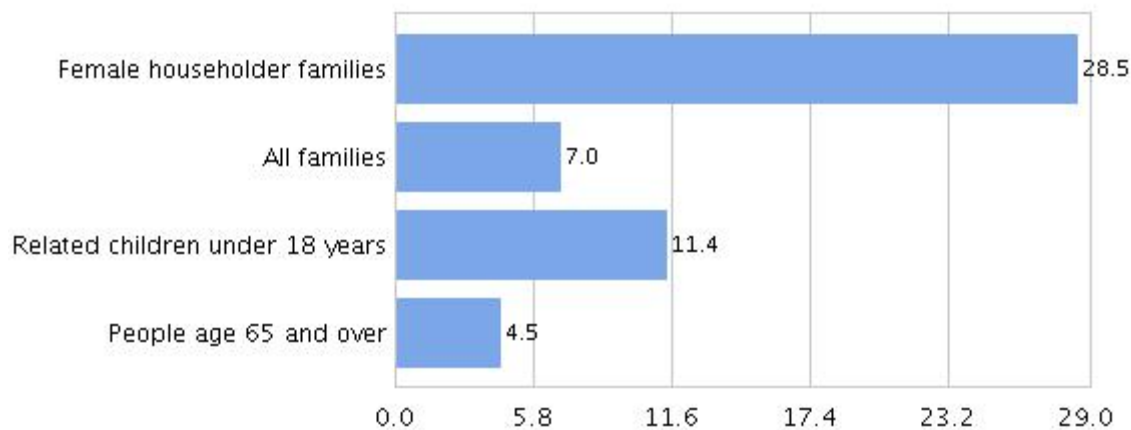
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015



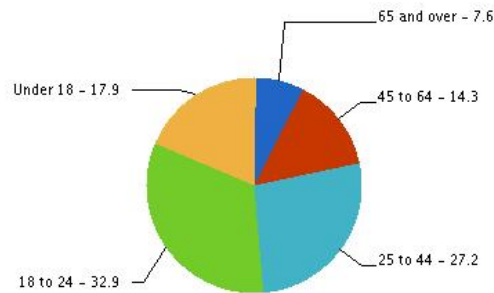

Age Distribution of People in Riley County, Kansas in 2011-2015

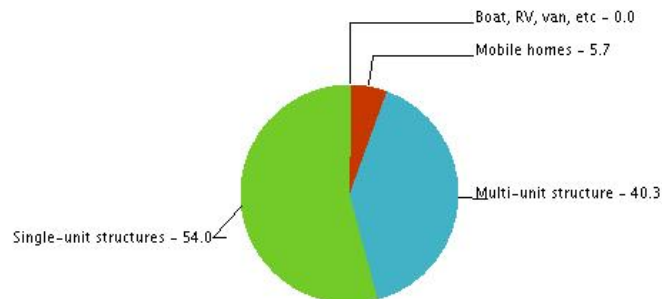

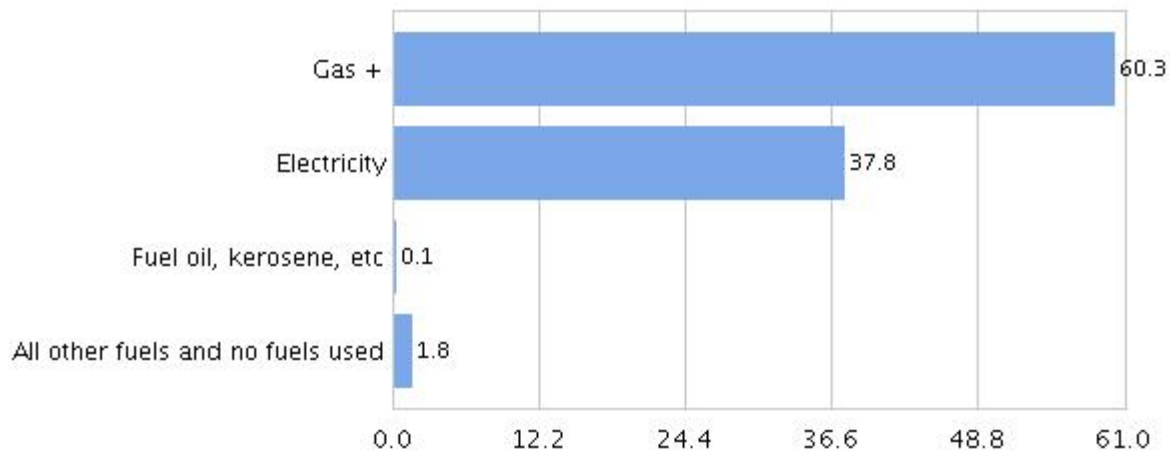

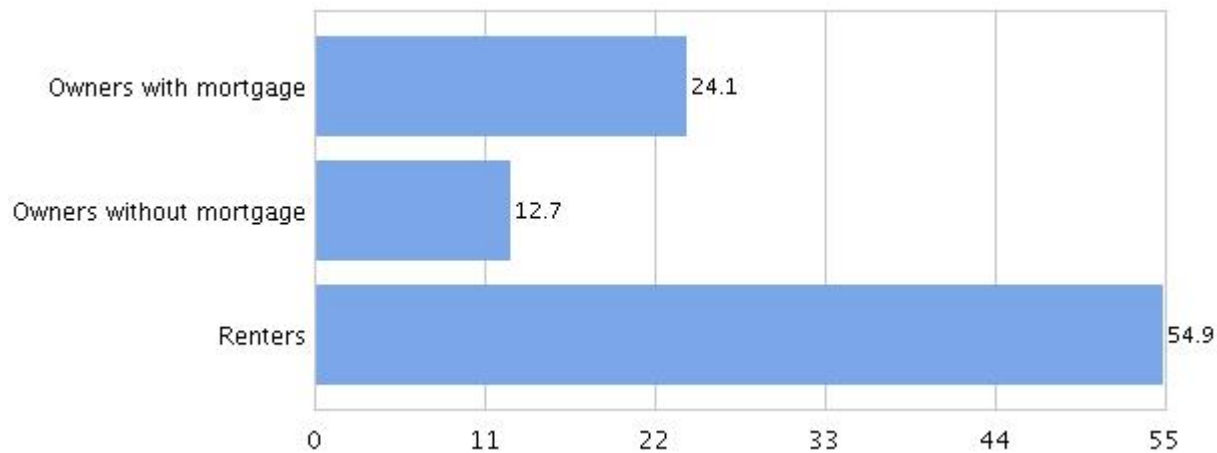

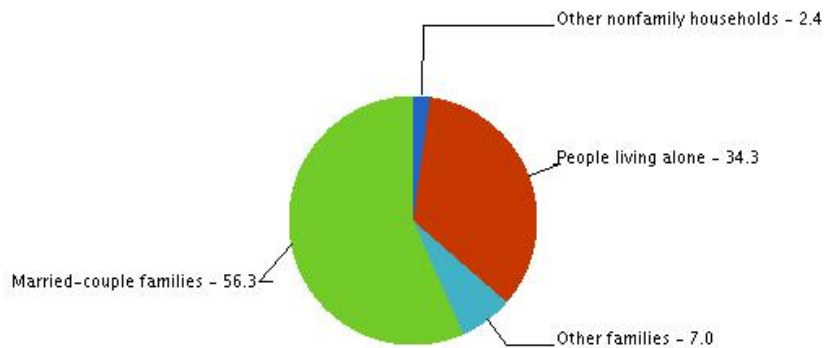

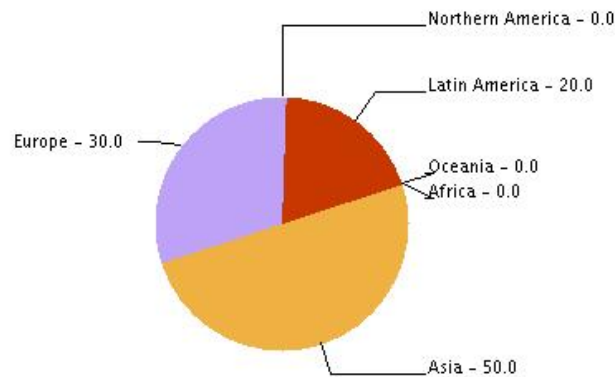

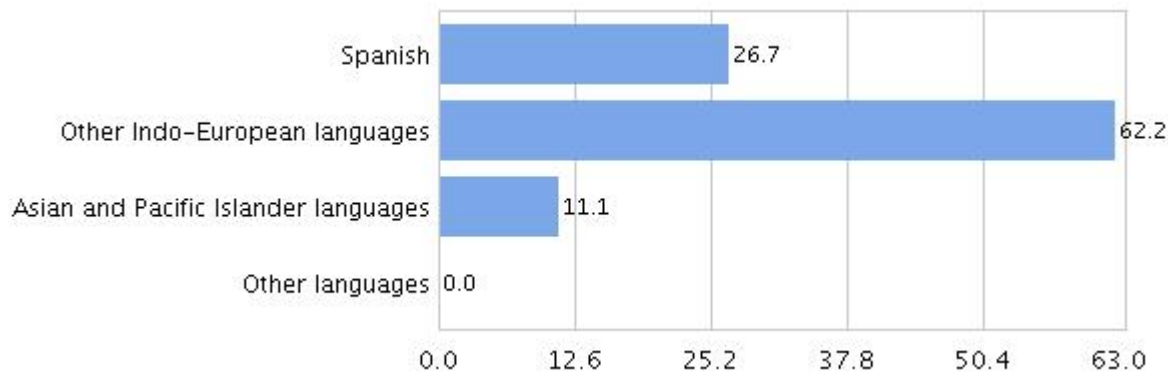
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

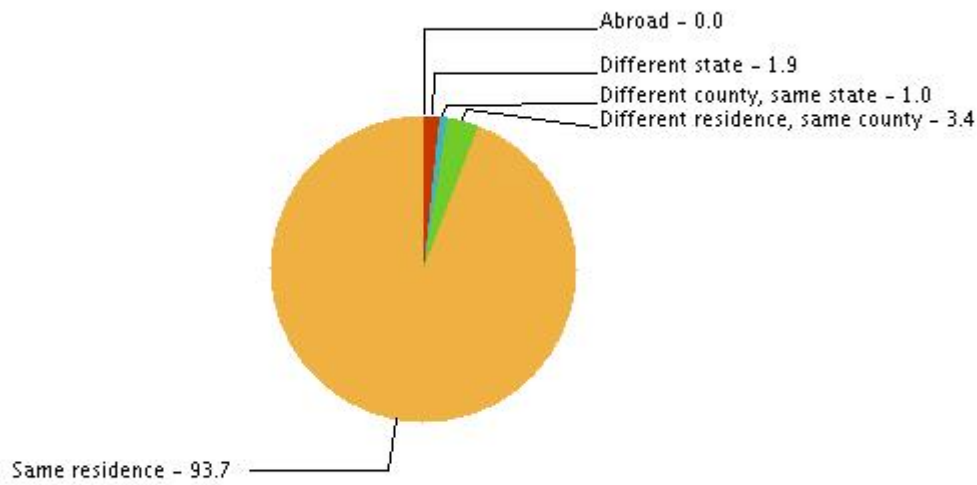
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

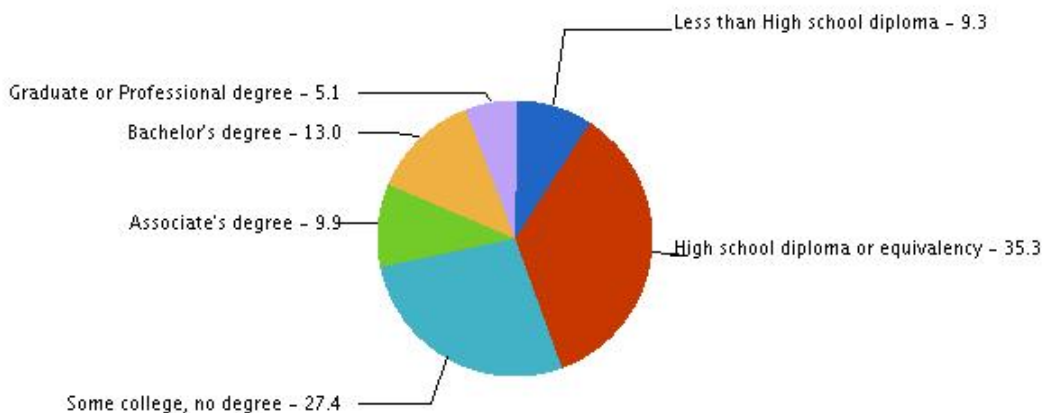

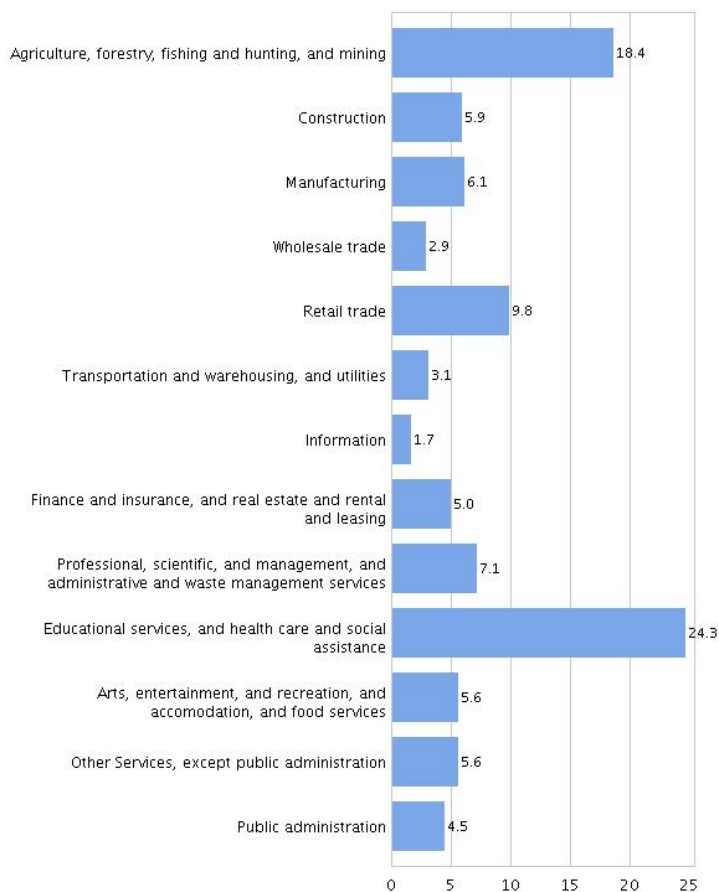

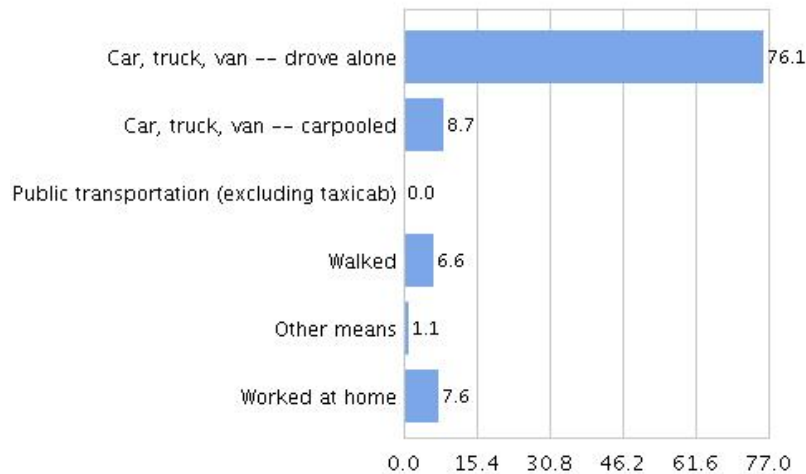

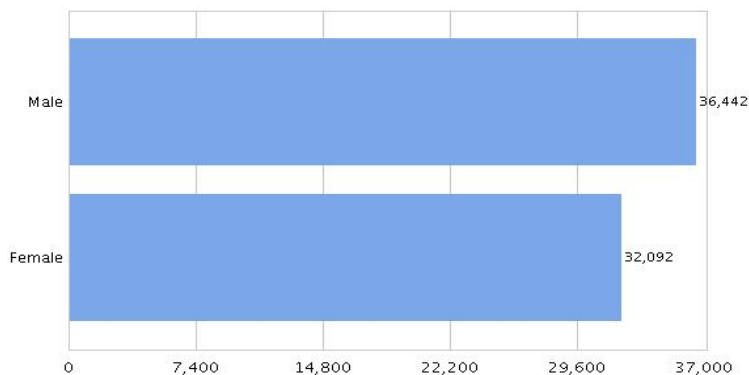
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

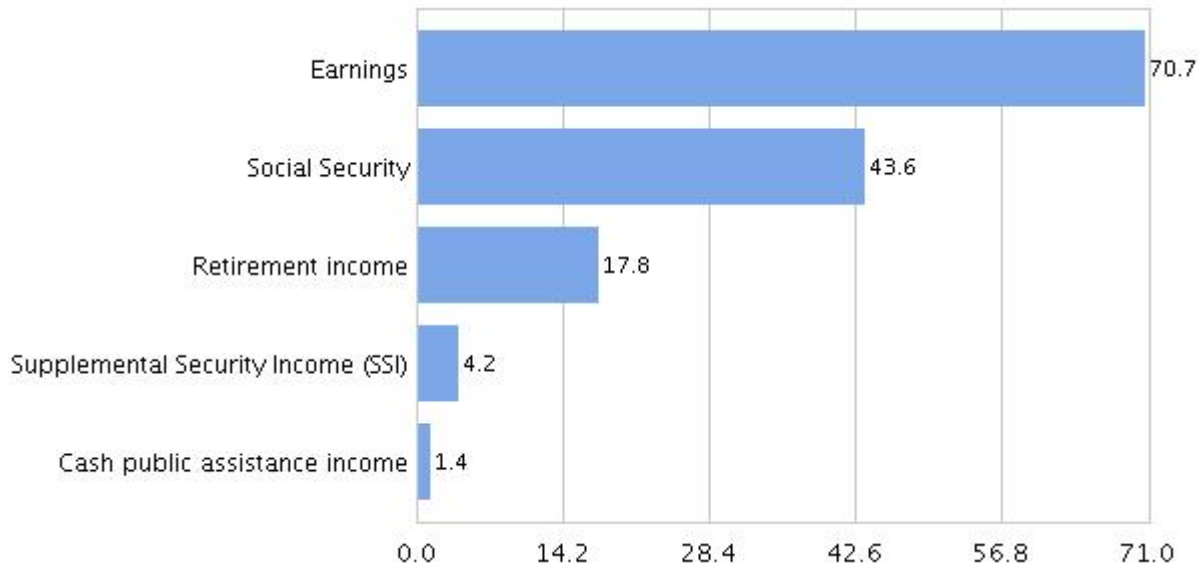

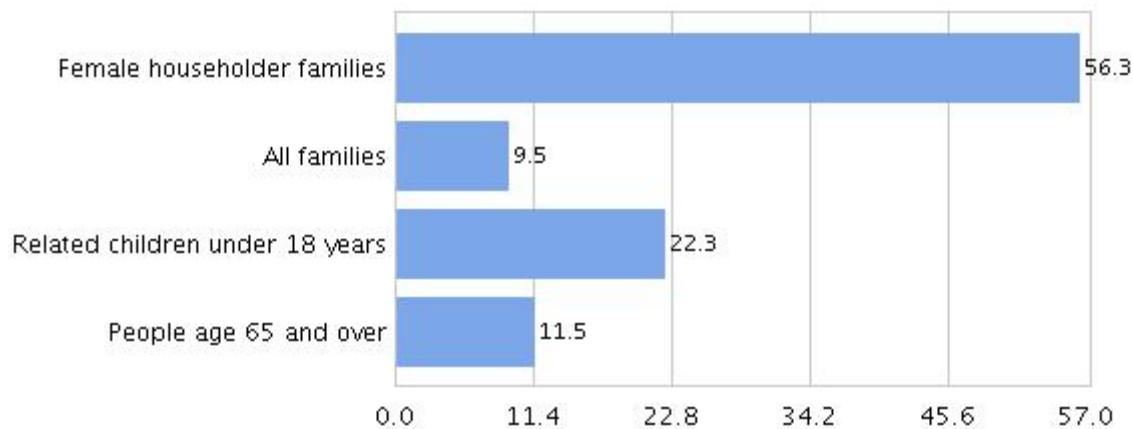
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015



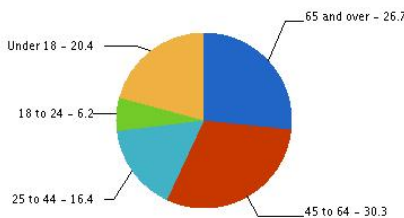

Age Distribution of People in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

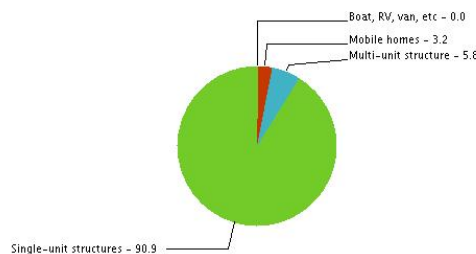

Types of Housing Units in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015



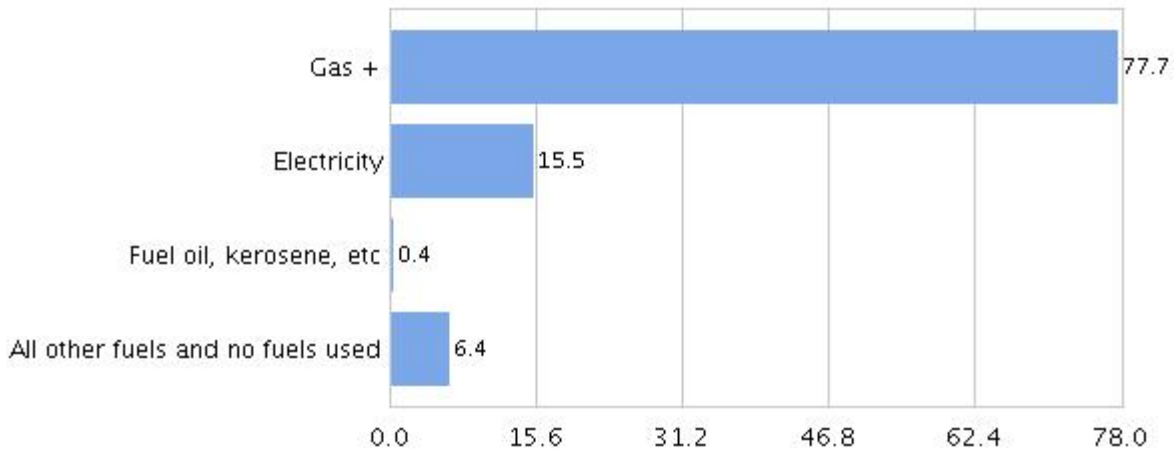

House heating fuel used in Smith County, Kansas in 2011-2015

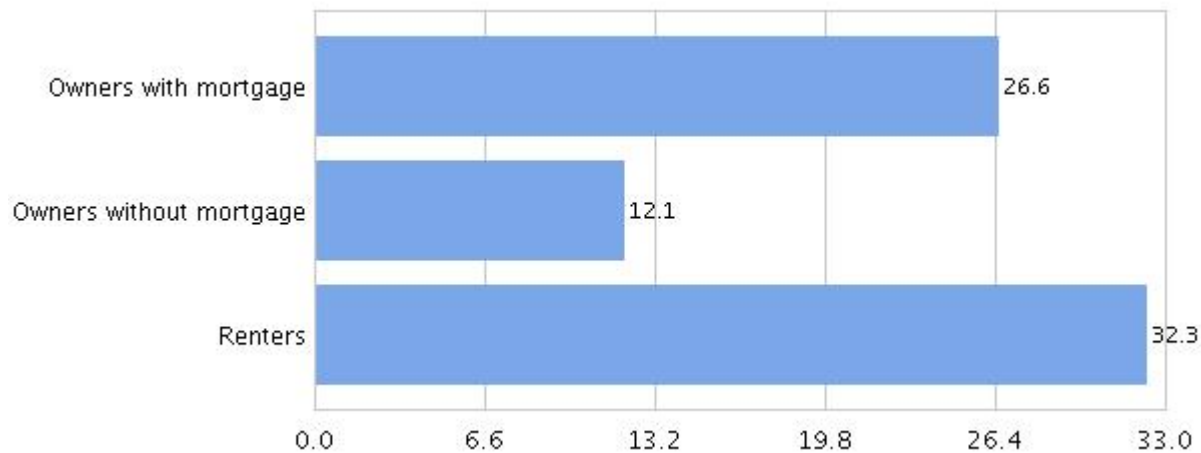

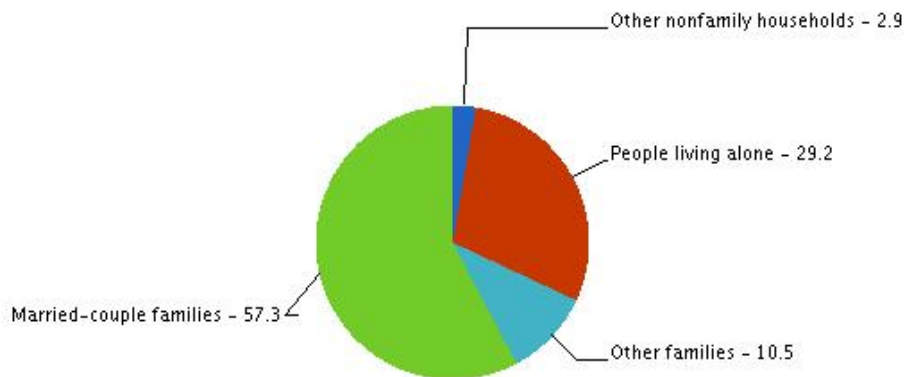

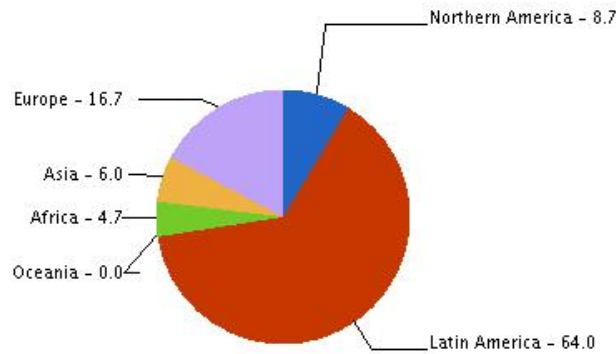

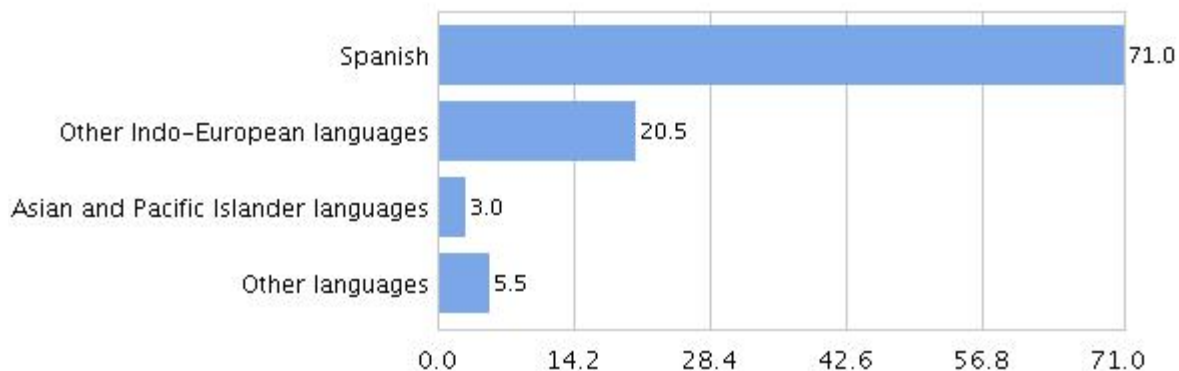
Region of Birth for the Foreign Born Population in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

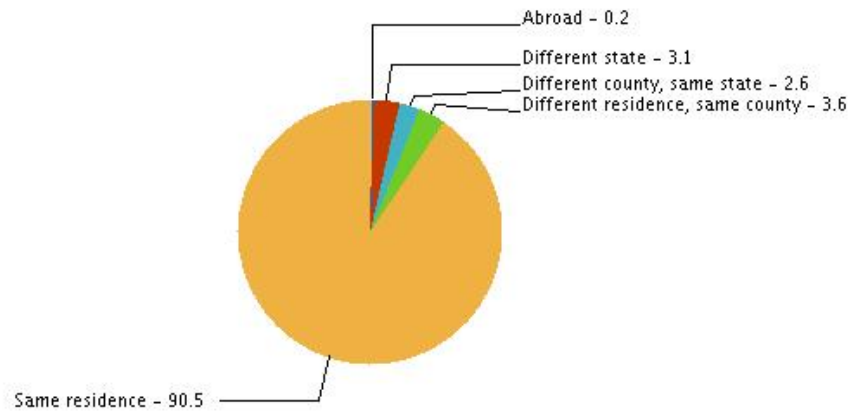
Percent of the Population 5 years and over who Speak a Language other than English in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

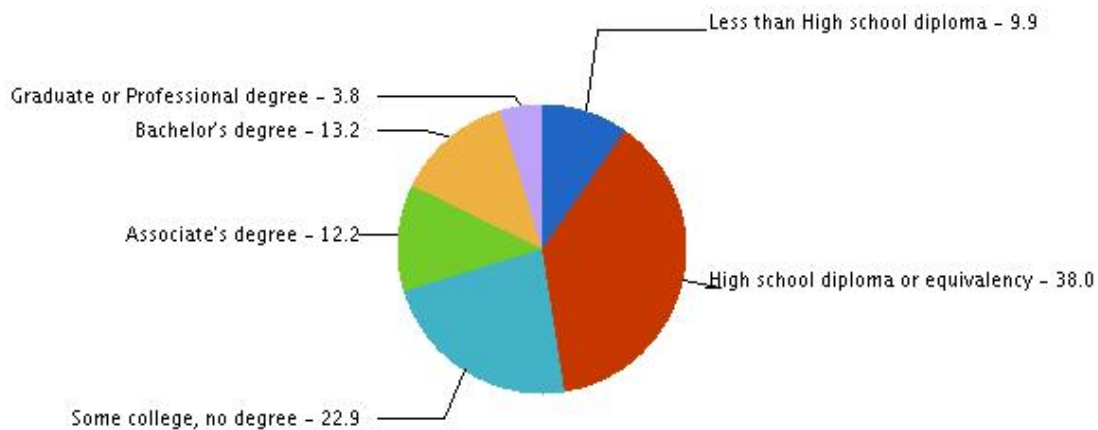

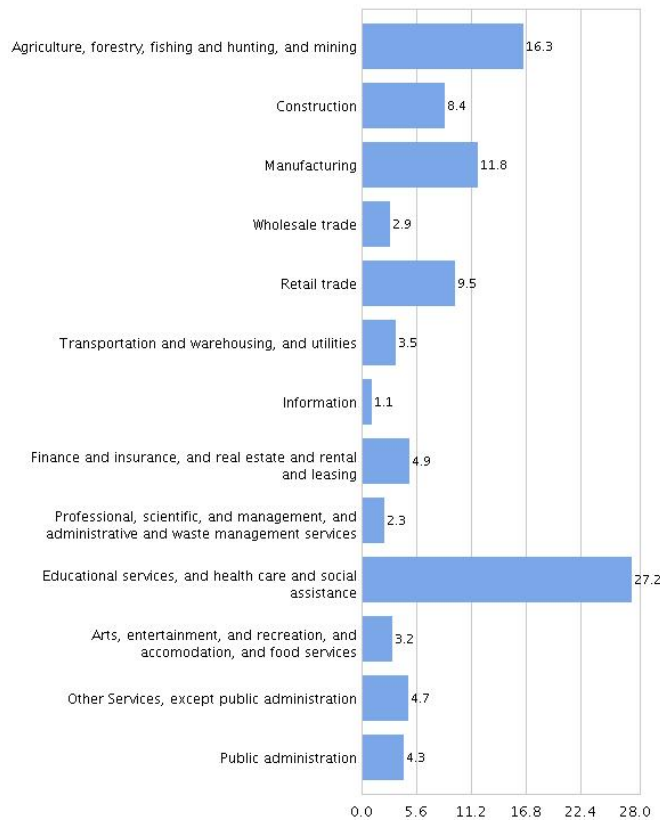

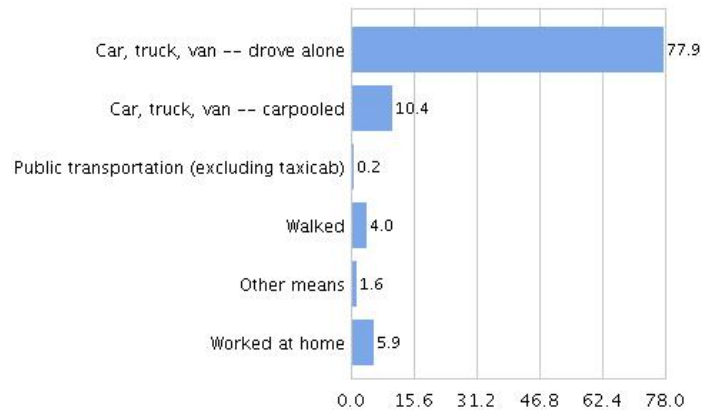

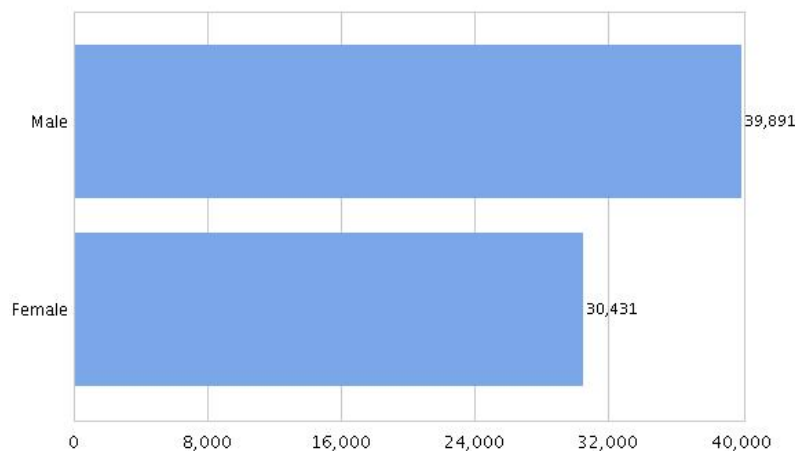
Percent of Workers 16 and over Commuting by Mode in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

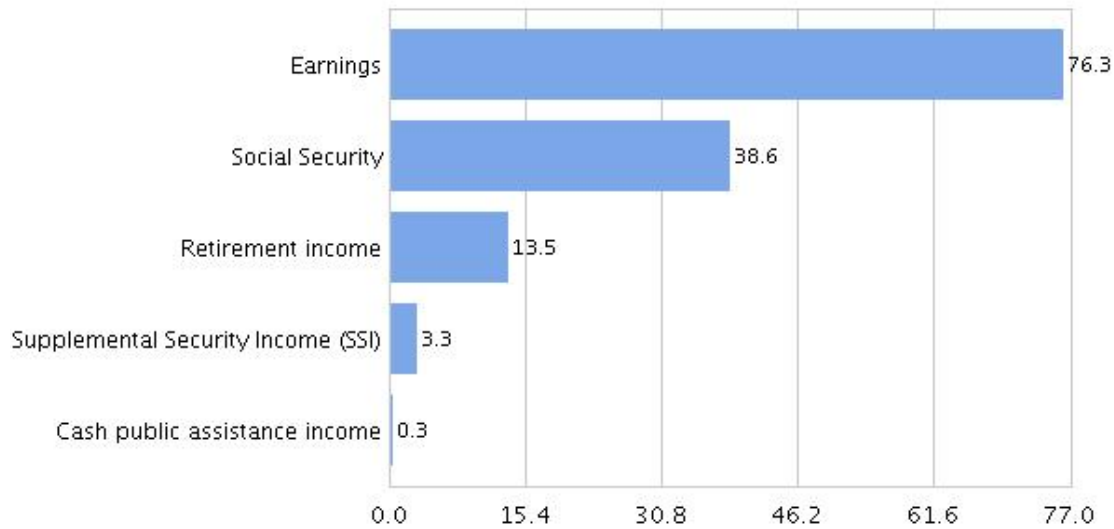

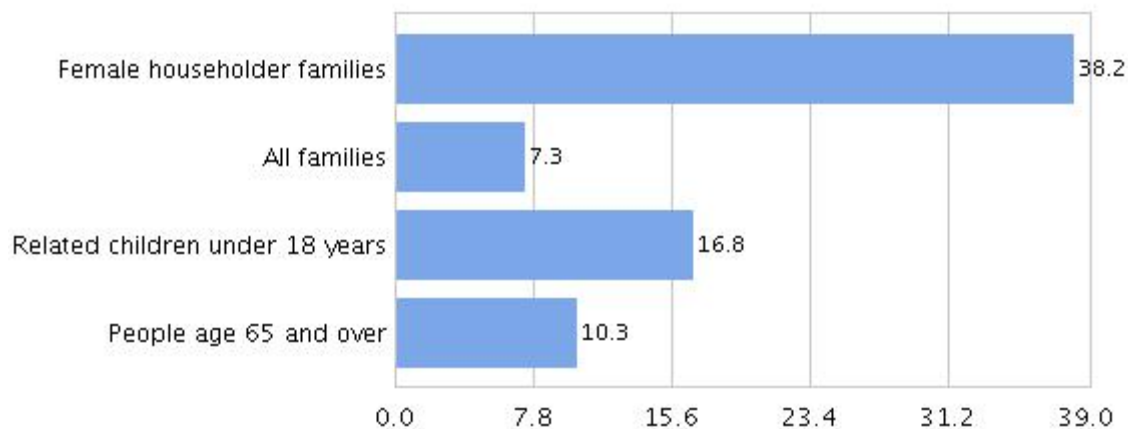
Proportion of Households with Various Income Sources in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

Poverty Rates in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015



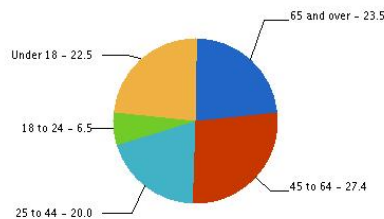

Age Distribution of People in Washington County, Kansas in 2011-2015

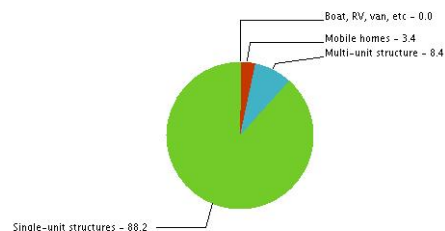

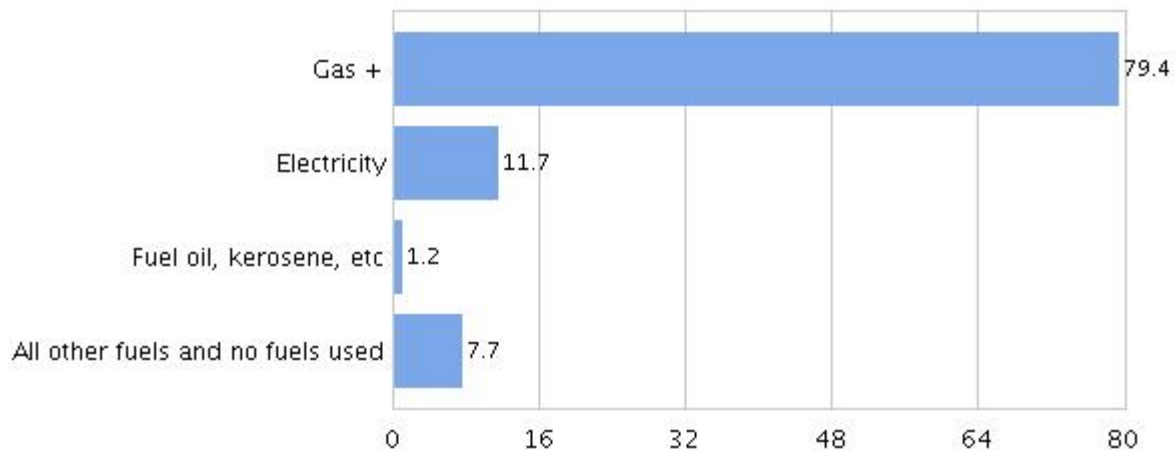

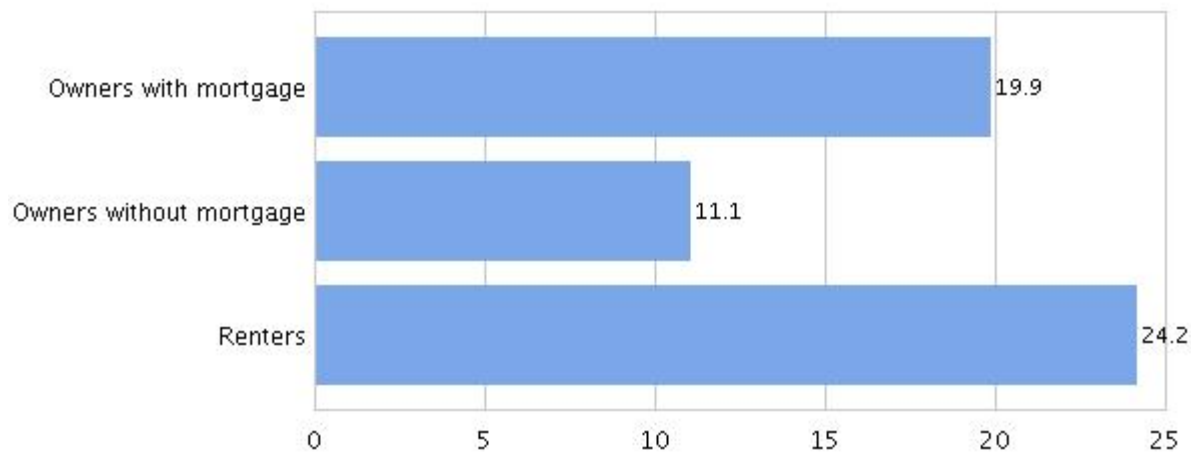

Per Capita Income by County, ACS 2011-15

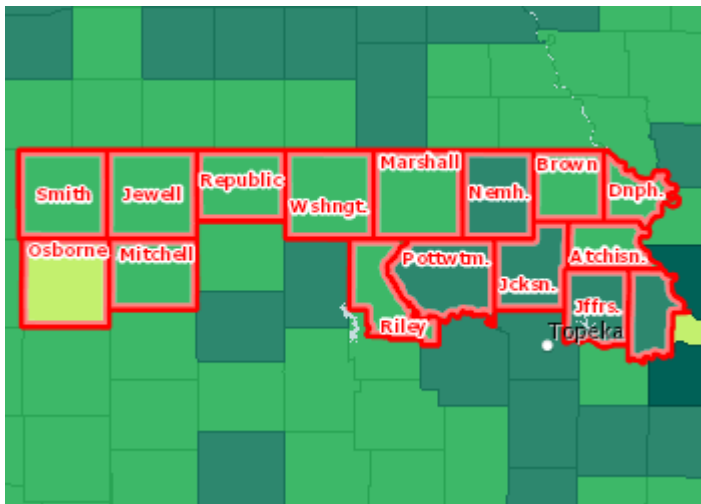
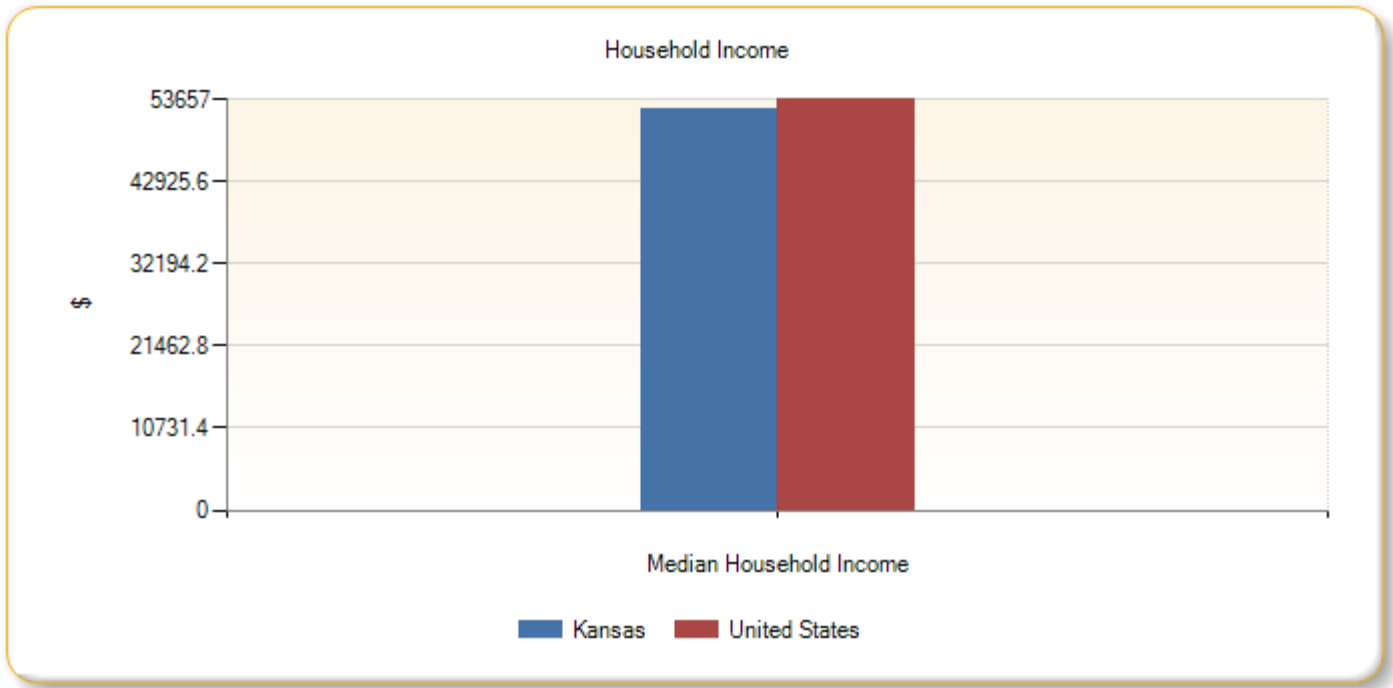

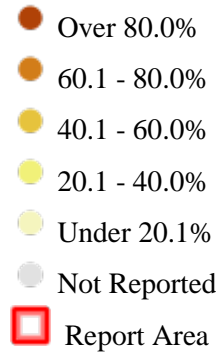
Percent Students Eligible for Free or Reduced Price Lunch

Students Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch, NCES CCD 2013-14

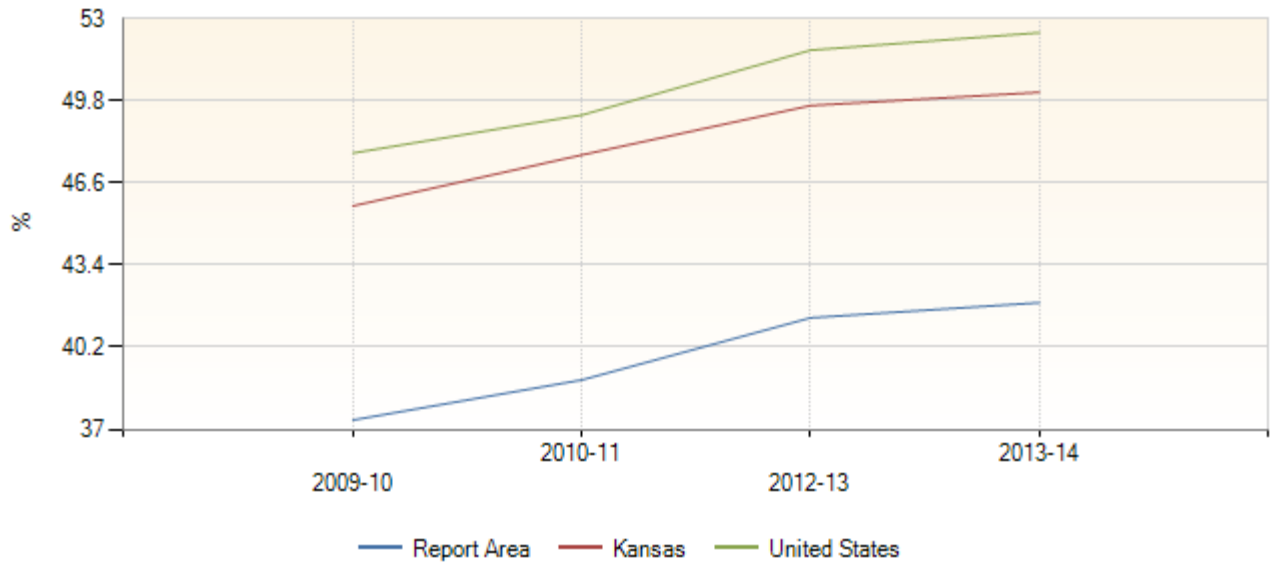

Children Eligible for Free Lunch (Alone) by Year, 2009-10 through 2013-14



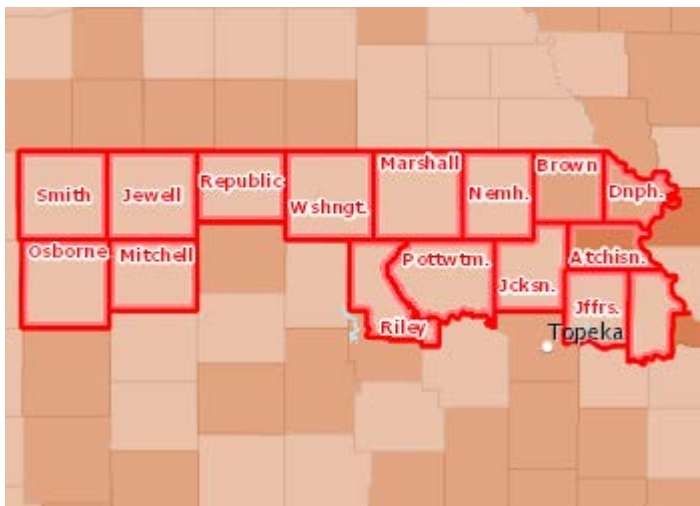
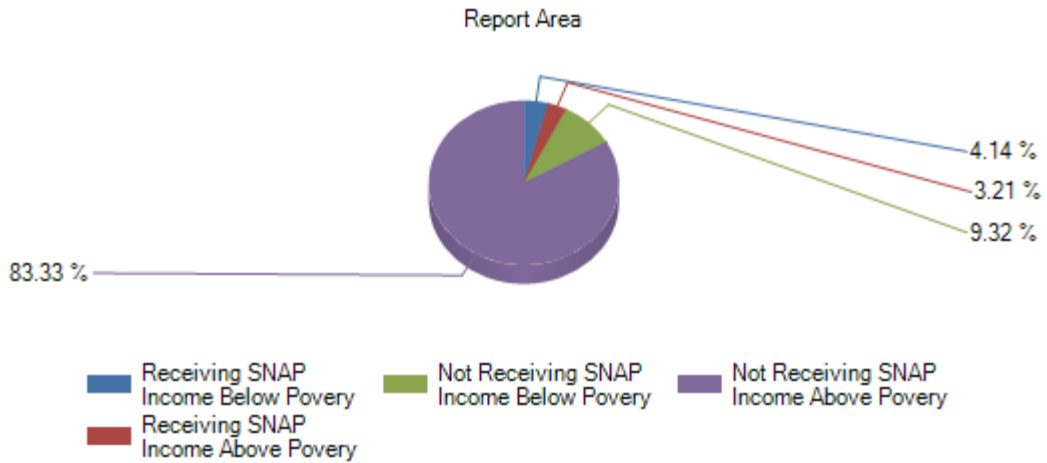

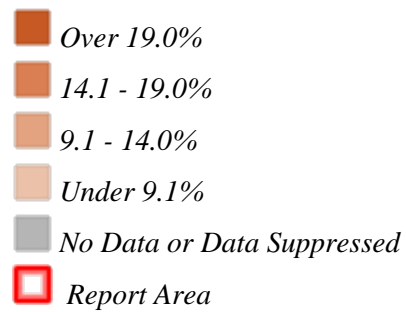

Households Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by County, ACS 2011-15



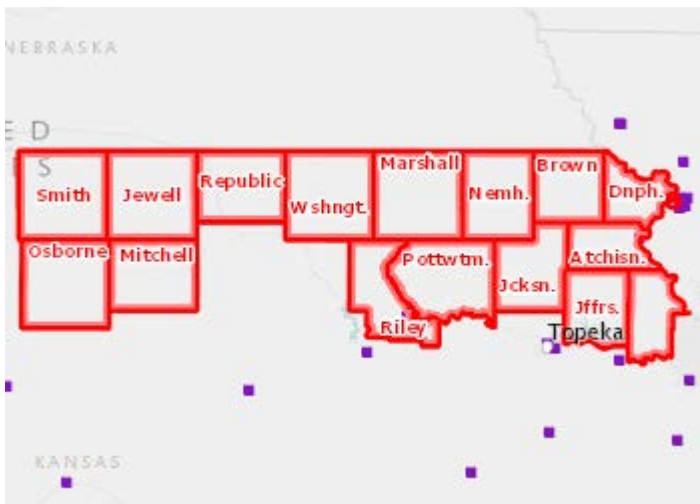

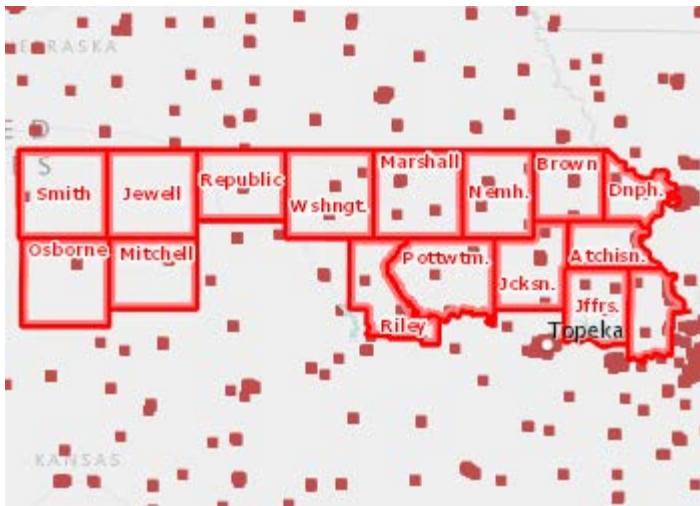

Insured, Medicare, Percent by Tract, ACS 2009-13

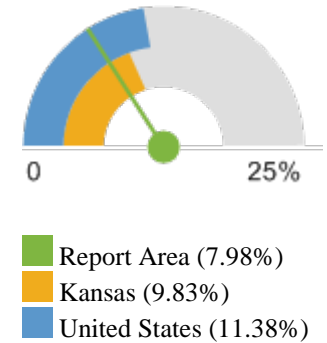

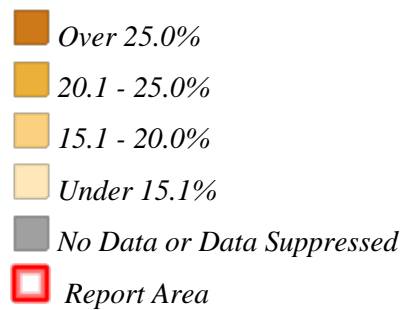

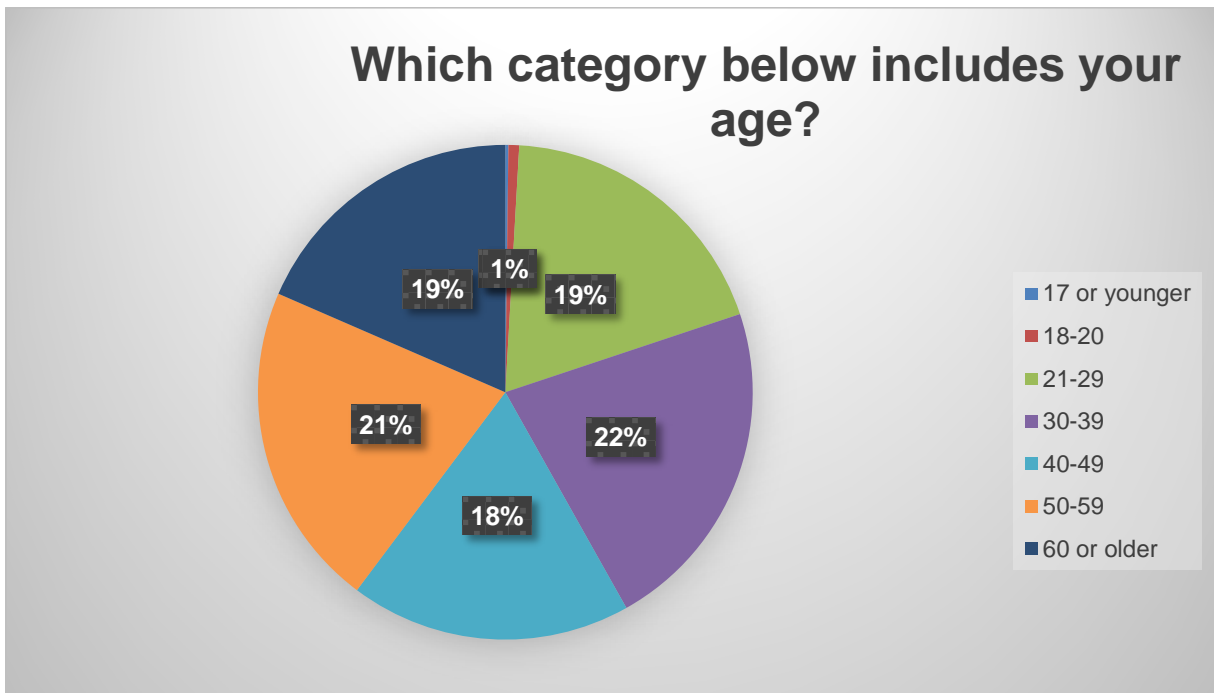

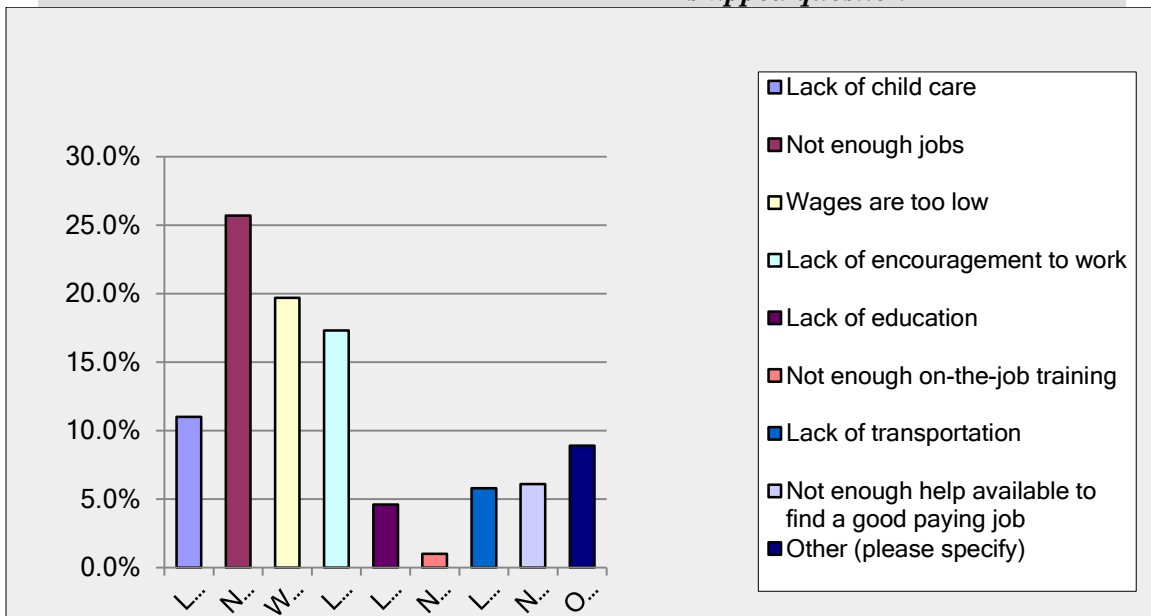

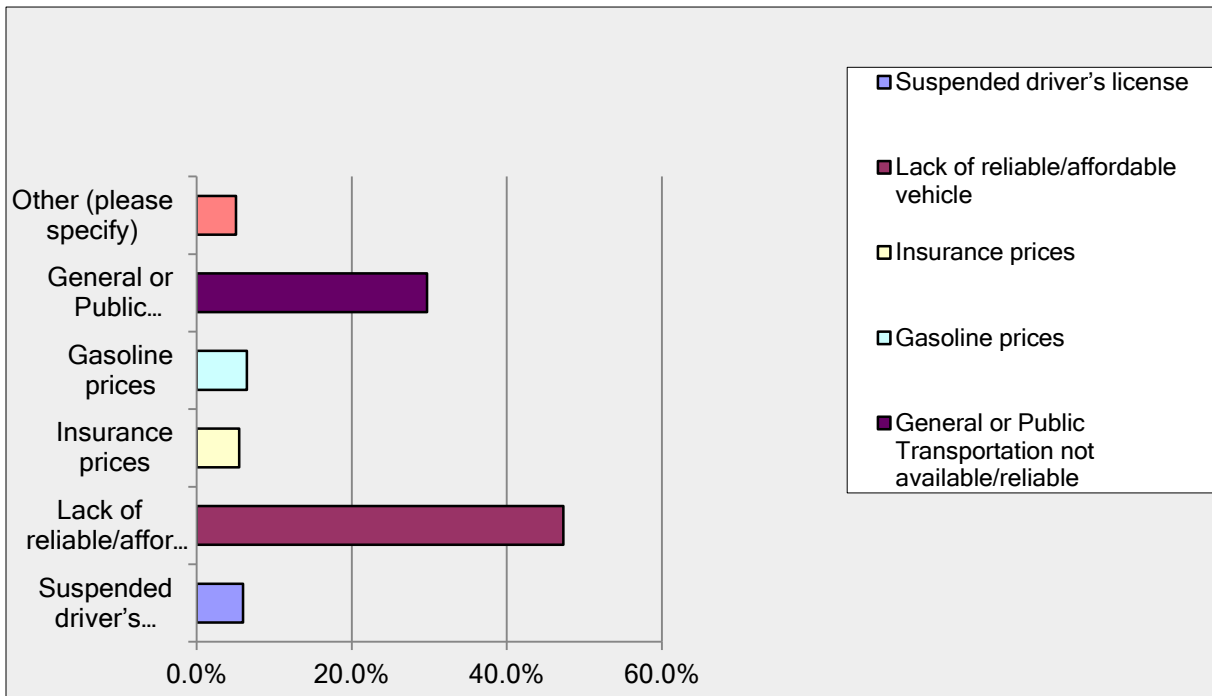
What do you feel is the primary cause of unemployment in this community?

What do feel is the primary cause of transportation barriers in this community?

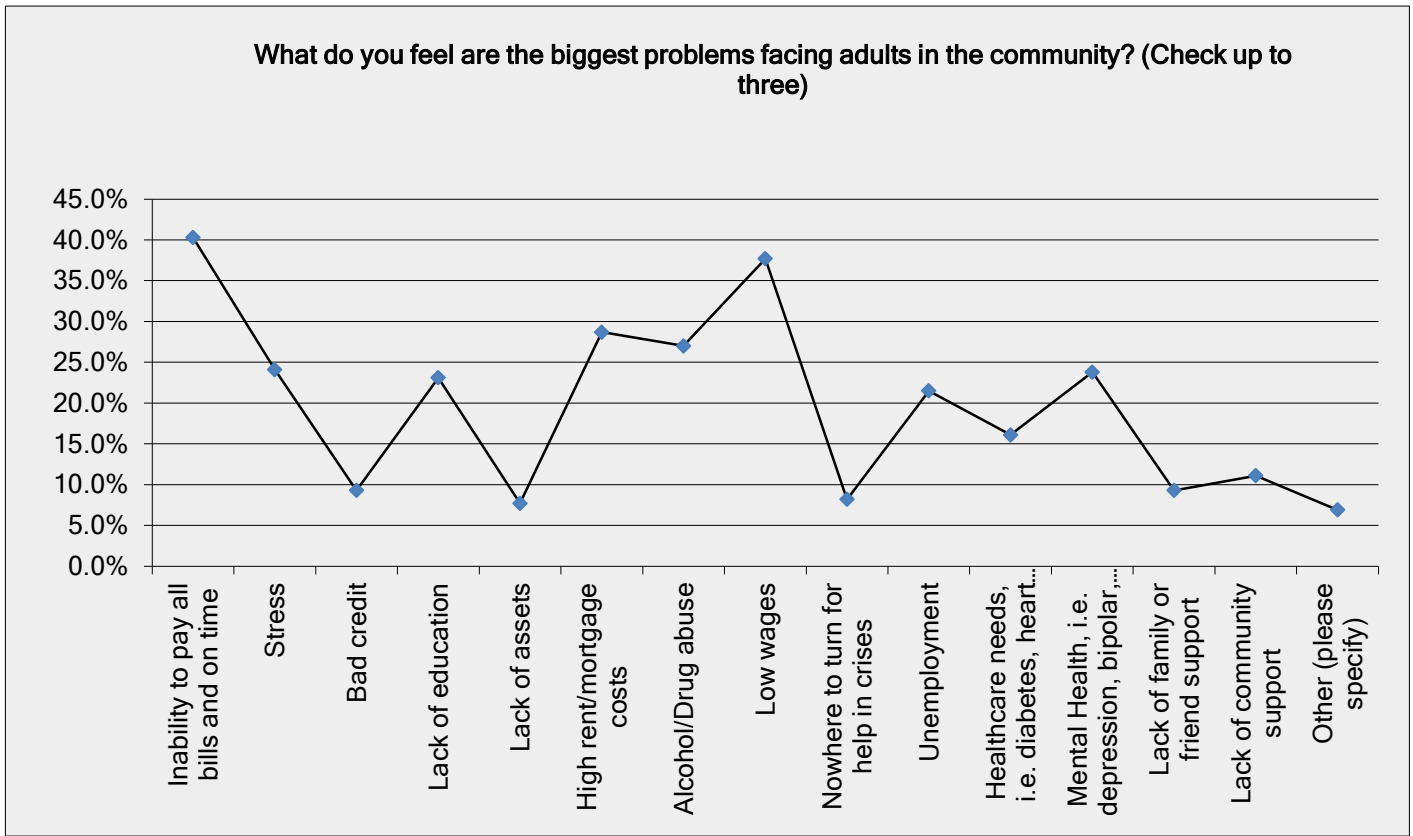

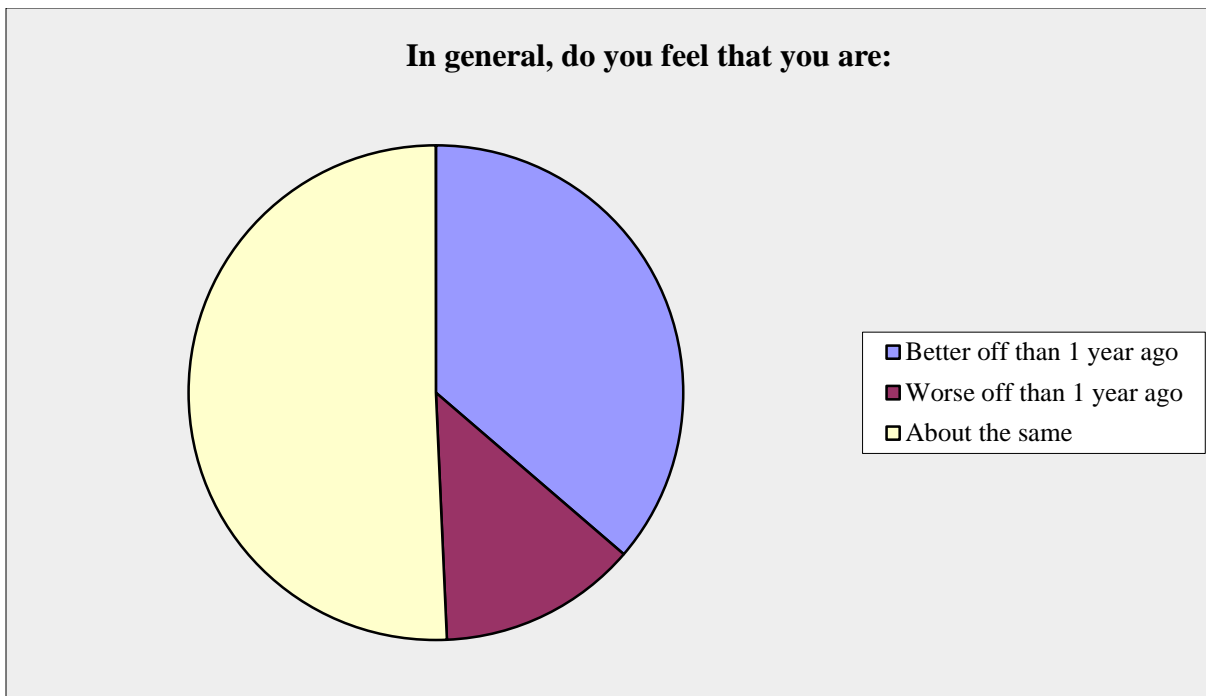

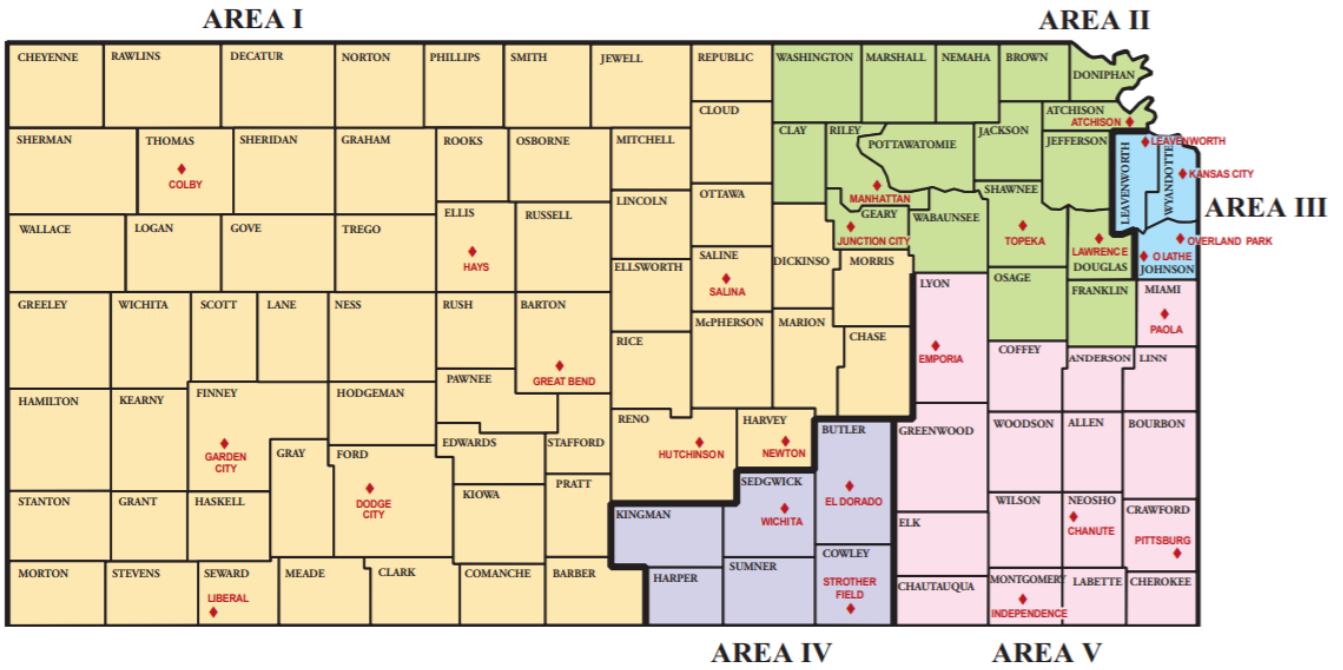

Purpose

NEK-CAP, Inc., a private non-profit Community Action Agency created in 1965, provides services across a 11,000 square mile area to low income individuals, families and communities in sixteen northeast and north central Kansas counties – Atchison, Brown, Doniphan, Jackson, Jefferson, Jewell, Leavenworth, Marshall, Mitchell, Nemaha, Osborne, Pottawatomie, Republic, Riley, Smith, and Washington. These counties represent frontier, rural and urban areas of the state of Kansas. In July 2017, the triennial Community Needs Assessment was completed to provide a basis for the organization’s Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) Performance System. The overall purposes were (1) to identify key findings related to the causes and conditions contributing to economic insecurity/poverty; (2) to assess community resources; (3) to determine any noticeable change from previous organizational needs assessments; (4) to assess opportunities for increasing economic security and improving outcomes related to Employment, Education and Cognitive Development, Housing, Social/Behavioral Development, Income, Infrastructure and Asset Building and/or Civic Engagement and Community Involvement(5) to analyze the agency’s capacity to address identified needs/gaps; (6) to determine potential community partners and (7) to develop the 2017-2020 NEK-CAP, Inc. Strategic Plan.

Methodology

Facebook, email and word of mouth were utilized to contact community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, private sector, public sector and educational institutions; customers, community members at large, staff and customers.

Demographic data, social and economic qualitative and quantitative data were collected to assess the causes and conditions of poverty at the county level. Qualitative data was obtained via focus groups of local stakeholders throughout each county in March 2017. Through group discussions participants were asked to (1) describe the causes and conditions of poverty in their county; (2) to select the top three to address; (3) to determine strategies for addressing the top three; and (4) to identify other stakeholders who need to be at the table to bring about community change. Quantitative data sources included: Community Commons; Community Health Needs Assessment; US Department of Agriculture; Kansas Department of Health and Environment; Kansas Department of Labor; Kansas Department of Education; Kansas Bureau of Investigation; Kansas Department for Children and Families; IRS; Social Security Administration; Kansas Action for Children; www.livingwage.mit.edu; Kansas Child Care Aware; US Census Bureau American Community Survey (2011 -2015); the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) 2012; the 2017 County Health Rankings; Kansas Action for Children Kids Count Report (2016); American Community Survey Population and Housing Narrative Profile (2011-2015); www.uselectionsatlas.org; Rural Health Report (Georgetown University); Kansas Center for Economic Growth; Kansas Health Matters; and Kansas Department of Commerce (2013 Revision) - *Broadband in Kansas: Availability and Use Among Residents*. In addition, an agency web-based survey was conducted across the service area. For further information please refer to the full 2017 Comprehensive Needs Assessment.

Data Analysis Planning Workgroup-composed of the Executive Director, Director of Program Operations, Early Head Start/Head Start Health and Safety Manager, Family and Community Resource Manager, Office/Data Coordinator, Housing Program Manager, Family Self Sufficiency Coordinator, and Housing Continuum of Care Coordinator analyzed the 2017 NEK-CAP, Inc. Community Needs Assessment for

data related to the causes and conditions of poverty through the defined domains of the 2018 CSBG Annual Report – Demographics and Poverty Data; Employment; Education and Cognitive Development; Housing; Health & Social/Behavioral Development; Income, Infrastructure and Asset Building; Civic Engagement and Community Involvement.

Findings of NEK-CAP, Inc. Web-based Community Needs Assessment Survey

Survey Respondents/Demographics – 609 Respondents. Respondents by % of total responses and number included: current client and former clients 10.5%/64; individuals seeking services 3.0%/18; parent/relative of clients 3.6%/22; NEK-CAP, Inc. employee 14.3%/87; Multi-County Board members 2.0%/12; other social service providers 13.6%/83; faith community member 8.2%/50; elected/public officials 2.1%/13; law enforcement personnel 1.6%/10; teachers/educators 20.7%/126; business community representatives 6.4%/39; visitors to website 1.8%/11; Head Start parents 7.2%/44; concerned community members 26.3%/160; and other 6.9%/42. Based on survey data approximately 14.54%/89 of respondents were male and 85.46%/523 female; primary age groups responding by response rate in order were populations 30-39/22%; 50-59/21%; 21-29 and 60 or older/19% each; 40-49/18%; and 18-20/1%. Population by race across the across the service area is approximately 88.98% white; 4.65% African American; 4.34% Hispanic; 1.13% American Indian; 1.81% Asian; 0.12% Native Hawaiian; and 3.70% Mixed Race.

Key Survey Responses

- The three primary causes of unemployment identified were not enough jobs; wages too low; and lack of encouragement to work.
- The three primary transportation barriers identified were lack of reliable/affordable vehicle; general or public transportation not available/reliable; and gasoline prices.
- The three biggest problems facing youth 5-17 years old identified were not much to do away from school; lack of adult role models; lack of opportunities to develop skills needed as an adult;
- The three biggest problems facing adults identified were inability to pay all bills and on time; low wages; and high rent/mortgage costs.
- Community resources identified as most needed were affordable housing; child care; and teen programs ages 13-18.

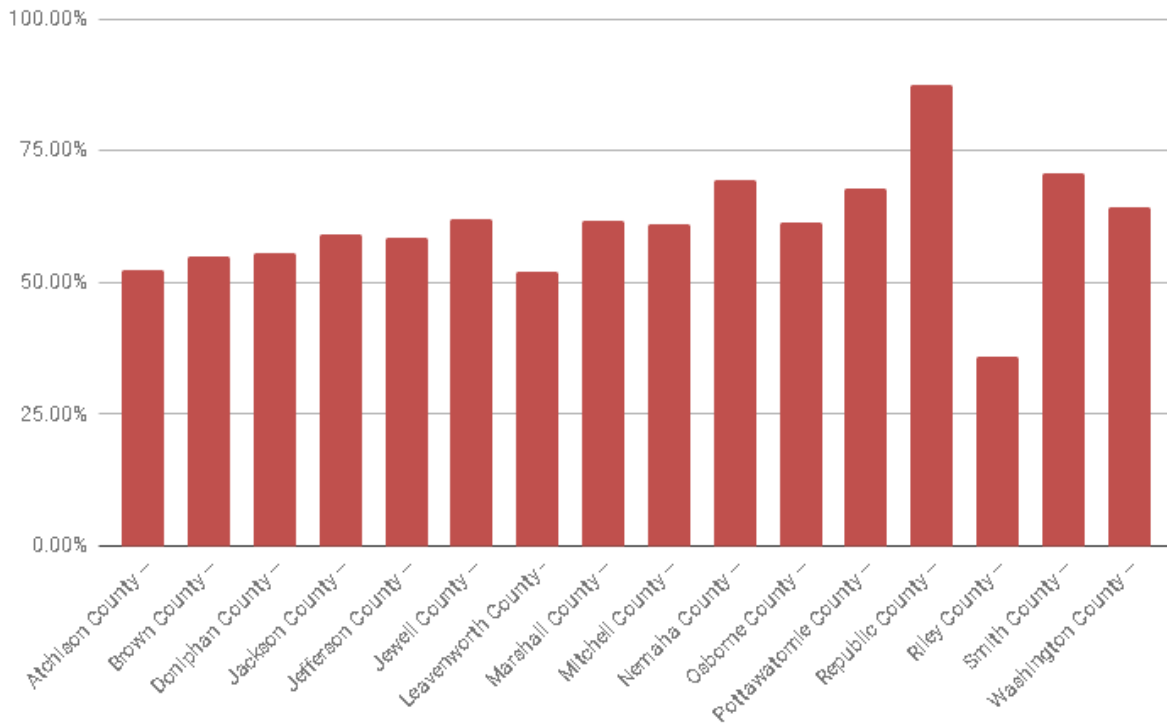

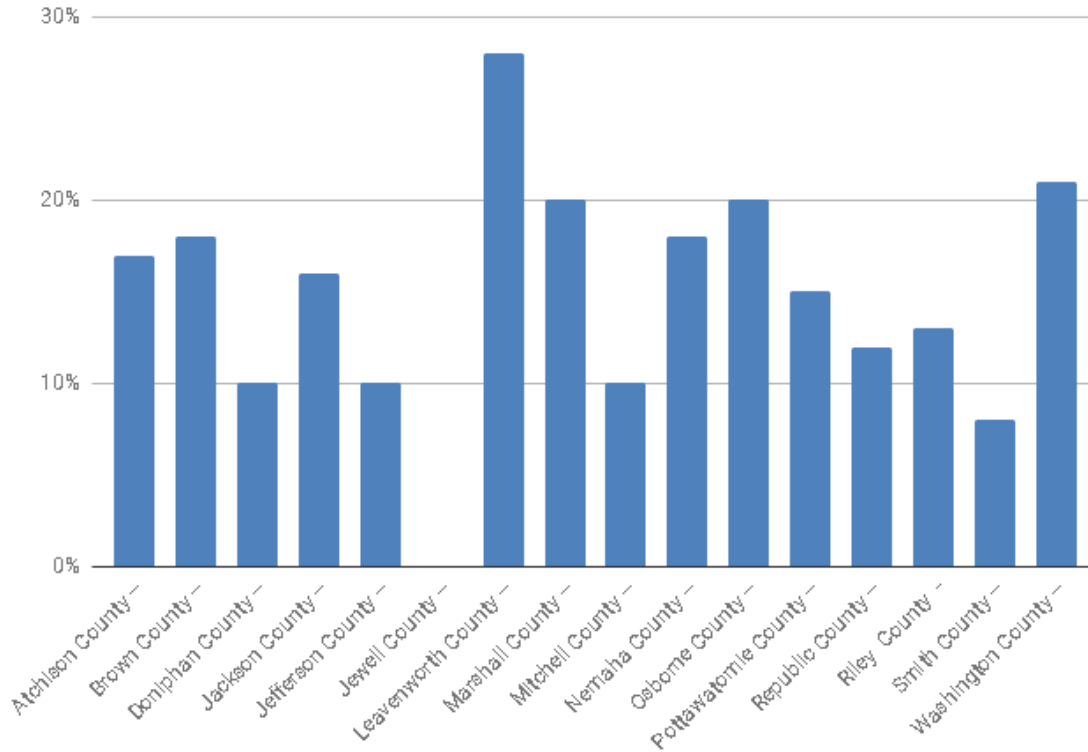

Figure 61: Internet Service by 2012 Household Income Level

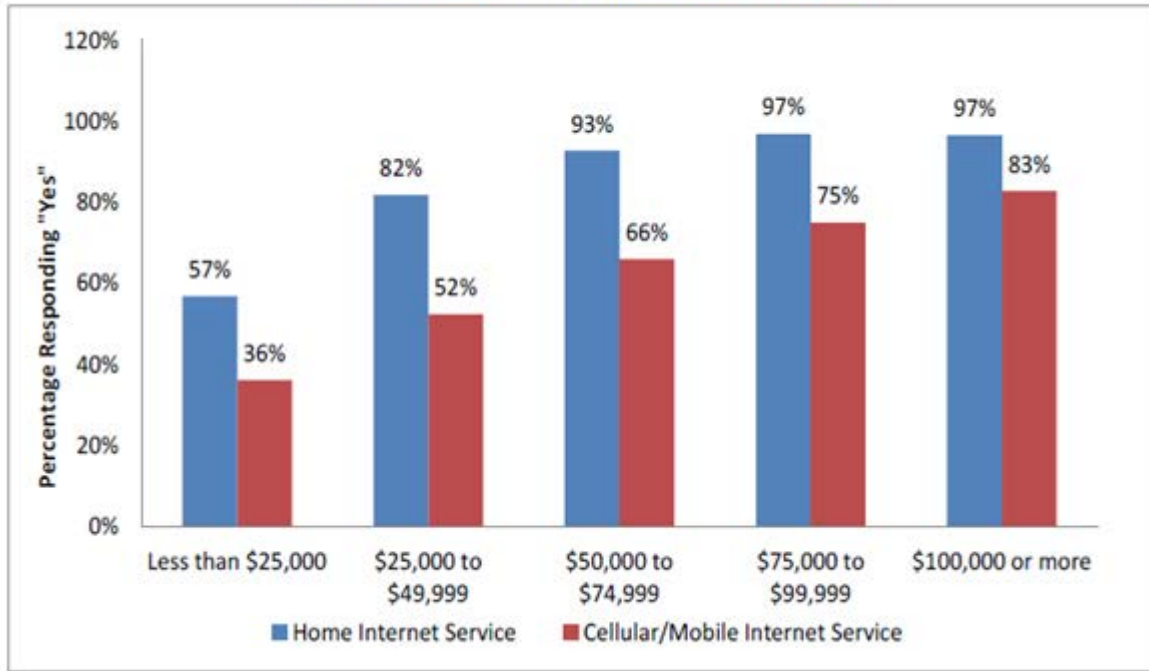
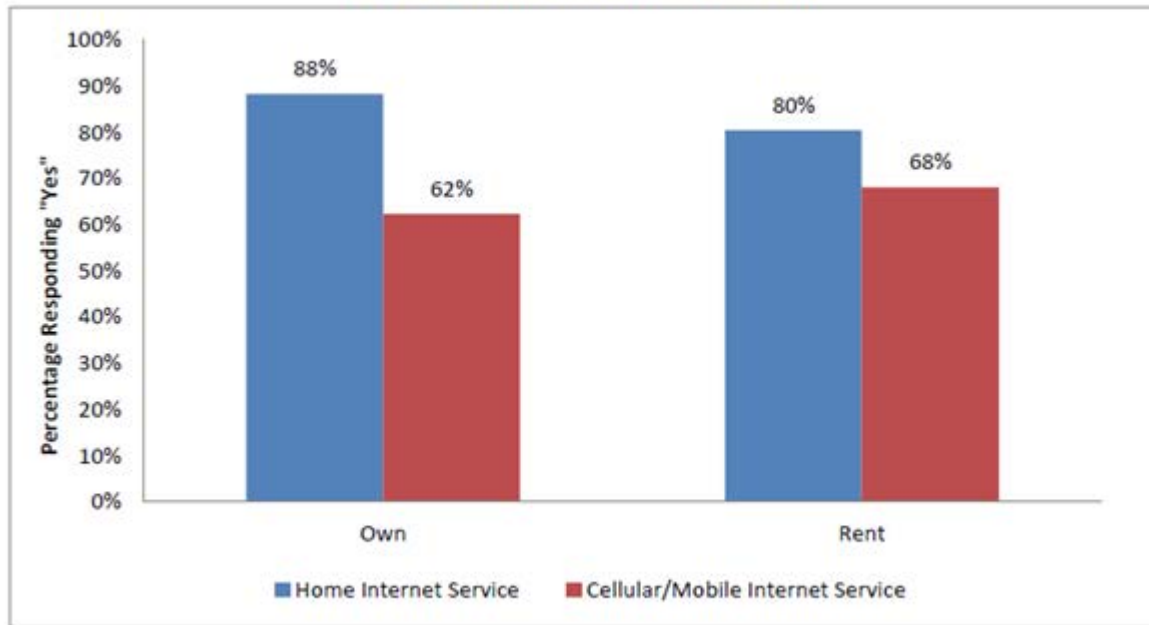


Figure 62: Internet Service by Home Ownership



Findings Early Head Start/Head Start Specific -

Children Experiencing Homelessness -NEK-CAP, Inc. participates in two programs (Emergency Solutions Grant & Continuum of Care Grant) serving those experiencing homelessness in the following counties: Atchison, Brown & Marshall. The number of children 0-5 served by those programs from July 2012-June 2017 has been: Emergency Solutions Grant 28/Continuum of Care Grant 110. Per the HUD 2016 Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance Programs across the state served 620 children under age 18. This Point-in-Time count does not break down children by other age groups.

Children Experiencing Disabilities - Kansas Infant-Toddler programs across the NEK-CAP, Inc. service area were contacted for data on the number of children with disabilities and types of disabilities for which services are being received. Responses were received from Infant-Toddler Services Network of Riley County which serves Riley, excluding the military base, and USD 383 and 384 in Pottawatomie County and Leavenworth County Infant toddler Services which serves Leavenworth. The number of children served were 196 in USD 383 and 217 in Leavenworth County. Types of disabilities for which services were provided included: language delays, motor delays, social emotional/challenging behaviors, feeding disorders, autism, spina bifida, cerebral palsy, Down Syndrome, chromosomal disorders, extreme prematurity, hearing loss, born drug addicted, visually impaired, Charge Syndrome, cognitive delays and at risk for delays.

Overall Conclusions

The largest number of individuals experiencing or at risk of poverty are the white population, however, those of mixed race, other minority races or of Hispanic/Latino ethnicity experience a disproportionate rate of poverty. Children 0-4 are typically the largest age group impacted, as well as, female headed households. However, in Jewell, Pottawatomie, Osborne, and Smith counties married couples represent the largest household type experiencing poverty.

There are several systemic, economic and social factors that negatively impact economically insecure individuals, families and households. They include government policies (high state sales and local property taxes, loss of state tax credits, a significant reduction in safety net benefits, and an increase in state income taxes); local political and social factors (lack of political desire to grow employment opportunities and social disengagement); employment factors (low wages, lack of health insurance and family leave benefits, few employment opportunities); infrastructure factors (extremely limited public transportation, lack of affordable/quality child care and preschool education); health and behavioral factors (lack of mental health and substance abuse services, high occurrences of child abuse and children in foster care, food deserts, and limited access to medical and dental providers); housing factors (high housing burdens for renters and a lack of affordable housing or subsidized housing, lack of energy infrastructure programs for renters/landlords).
